Independence from Common Sense – Part I

Dear parishioners,

I don't know if you are like me, but as we celebrate Independence Day this year I wonder if our Nation is leaving common sense behind and replacing it with quick emotional fixes and politically correct exaggerations. Let's look at the tragic shooting in Charleston this week and the recent ruling of the Supreme Court on marriage next week.

The recent tragic shooting in Charleston highlights the continuing racial tensions that plague our Nation. I do agree with our President that the specter of slavery casts a long shadow on our Nation. Unlike him, I feel that the last six years have done more to draw attention to differences and dissimilarities than create open dialogue and understanding. If you and I think that the young man who committed the murders in that church did so because of the Confederate Flag, we have missed the bigger picture and the harder solution. While the flag might be symbolic, that young man had bigger issues than a warped understanding of the Confederacy and its flag. Walmart, Amazon and others running from the sale of the Confederate Flag are using a quick emotional fix that makes some feel better but changes nothing. I don't care for the flag and the history associated with it, but I don't see how disassociation with it changes any attitudes. About the only thing I agree with is that states like South Carolina should not make it part of their state flag or state symbolism.

I realize that writing about topics like this are potentially inflammatory. It forces all of us to examine the biases and hatreds that may linger in our own hearts. Since the deaths of Trayvon Martin, Michael Brown and the victims of this recent shooting, we have all been called to examine our attitudes about race.

So how can we tell when we are actually racist? The Media would have us believe that if we fail to accept people of different culture, ethnicity or race we are racist. Failing to accept people of other cultures or races makes you close-minded, but not necessarily racist. The heart of racism is an ugly collection of lazy generalizations, fearful assumptions and pride-laden thoughts. When you and I think about "them," whoever they are, we are failing to address the individual and instead buying into lazy generalizations. When we let past negative experiences with a few form our opinion about the whole, we empower fear to blind us to the potential good of any one person. When I tell someone that "they don't know how those people are" I am letting a twisted form of pride replace any attempt at understanding. When those contaminants affect our words and actions, then we are racist.

Disagreeing with someone from another race or culture does not make you racist. Having opinions differing from those of the Media, people of another race or culture do not make you a racist. The label of "racist" is slapped around too loosely and freely these days and in such a way as to actually veil real racism and prevent the hard work of conversion from occurring.

It can be challenging to pray in public, but we need to have the courage to do so.



Excerpts of Interest from Pope Francis' Encyclical "Laudato Si"

Laudato si' (Italian for "Praise Be to You") is the second encyclical of Pope Francis. The encyclical has the subtitle On the Care for our Common Home. Some selected "good quotes" that should be reflected on from the document are below.

- **43.** Human beings too are creatures of this world, enjoying a right to life and happiness, and endowed with unique dignity. So we cannot fail to consider the effects on people's lives of environmental deterioration, current models of development and the throwaway culture.
- **44.** Nowadays, for example, we are conscious of the disproportionate and unruly growth of many cities, which have become unhealthy to live in, not only because of pollution caused by toxic emissions but also as a result of urban chaos, poor transportation, and visual pollution and noise. Many cities are huge, inefficient structures, excessively wasteful of energy and water. Neighborhoods, even those recently built, are congested, chaotic and lacking in sufficient green space. We were not meant to be inundated by cement, asphalt, glass and metal, and deprived of physical contact with nature.
- **47.** Furthermore, when media and the digital world become omnipresent, their influence can stop people from learning how to live wisely, to think deeply and to love generously. In this context, the great sages of the past run the risk of going unheard amid the noise and distractions of an information overload. Efforts need to be made to help these media become sources of new cultural progress for humanity and not a threat to our deepest riches. True wisdom, as the fruit of self-examination, dialogue and generous encounter between persons, is not acquired by a mere accumulation of data which eventually leads to overload and confusion, a sort of mental pollution. Real relationships with others, with all the challenges they entail, now tend to be replaced by a type of internet communication which enables us to choose or eliminate relationships at whim, thus giving rise to a new type of contrived emotion which has more to do with devices and displays than with other people and with nature. Today's media do enable us to communicate and to share our knowledge and affections. Yet at times they also shield us from direct contact with the pain, the fears and the joys of others and the complexity of their personal experiences. For this reason, we should be concerned that, alongside the exciting possibilities offered by these media, a deep and melancholic dissatisfaction with interpersonal relations, or a harmful sense of isolation, can also arise.
- **50.** Instead of resolving the problems of the poor and thinking of how the world can be different, some can only propose a reduction in the birth rate. At times, developing countries face forms of international pressure which make economic assistance contingent on certain policies of "reproductive health". Yet "while it is true that an unequal distribution of the population and of available resources creates obstacles to development and a sustainable use of the environment, it must nonetheless be recognized that demographic growth is fully compatible with an integral and shared development". To blame population growth instead of extreme and selective consumerism on the part of some, is one way of refusing to face the issues. It is an attempt to legitimize the present model of distribution, where a minority believes that it has the right to consume in a way which can never be universalized, since the planet could not even contain the waste products of such consumption. Besides, we know that approximately a third of all food produced is discarded, and "whenever food is thrown out it is as if it were stolen from the table of the poor."





ANSWERS TO CATHOLIC IQ

- **1. (d)** At the Council of Trent, on March 3, 1547, the Church officially named and defined the seven sacraments instituted by Christ as an article of faith. Although all seven had long been recognized and accepted, Christians until that time didn't always distinguish between sacraments and other sacred signs and symbols. For instance St. Augustine, spoke of the Lord's Prayer as a sacrament while St. Bernard of Clairvaux referred to the ritual washing of feet during Holy Week as a sacrament.
- **2. (d)** The permanent diaconate, which can be conferred on married men, was restored after Vatican II. The Churches of the East have always maintained it.
- **3. (b)** Many artists through the centuries have painted their idea of the Last Supper, where Christ instituted the Holy Eucharist. But the best known and loved painting was painted on the wall of a church in Milan, Italy by Leonardo (1452-1519).
- **4. (a)** Green is the color of hope, growth, and encouragement. Of course, at every Eucharist we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. But not all Sundays are high celebrations or feasts. The Sundays of Ordinary Time are so designated because they come between the Sundays of the Advent/Christmas season and Lent and between Pentecost Sunday and the Sundays of Advent. Ordinary Sundays are not extraordinary in their tone and mode of celebration. In other words, they are not the highest feast days of the Church Year. Depending on the calendar year, there are 33 or 34 Sundays in Ordinary Time
- **5. (b)** The blessing of the Easter Candle (the "Light of Christ") is part of the ceremony of the Easter Vigil.
- **6. (d)** At his mother's request Jesus changed water into wine at Cana (Jn 2:1-11). The Church sees this as a testimony to the goodness of marriage.
- **7. (a)** Jesus himself took the bread and gave thanks. We do likewise in remembrance of him.
- **8.** (c) Baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist were celebrated together when early Christian catechumens were received into the Church. Eastern Churches still preserve all three together, even with babies (who are given a tiny piece of host to complete the rite of initiation).
- **9. (a)** The words of baptism, said while pouring water, are "(Name), I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."
- **10. (d)** The many ways God saves his people in the Old Testament, especially those which involve water, are said to "prefigure" the sacrament of baptism. See the Catechism #1217-1222.



proach to "The Seven Deadly Sins, Seven Lively Virtues" --- it is a fine rendering of the meaning of Dante's magnificent "Purgatorio", and, more importantly, for both the Poet and the Priest, an inspiring expose' of the Gospel: The Sermon on the Mount! equally relevant models for understanding spiritual development. These six talks are probably the best I have heard.
