The Corporal Work of Mercy: Give Drink to the Thirsty

Pope Francis has decreed a special year of mercy (beginning December 8, 2015 – November 20, 2016) in which he is directing the faithful to reflect and act on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. He writes, "It is my burning desire that, during this Jubilee, the Christian people may reflect on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy." Here are some Scriptures and concrete ways or suggestions you or your family might reflect and act up this work of mercy.

SCRIPTURE PASSAGES

John 19:28 Jesus said, "I thirst."

Mt 25:35, 40 "I was thirsty and you gave me to drink." 40... 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me.'

James 2:14 What does it profit, my brethren, if a man says he has faith but has not works? Can his faith save him? 15 If a brother or sister is ill-clad and in lack of daily food, 16 and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what does it profit? 17 So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

SUGGESTIONS

- Nearly 1-billion people lack access to a supply of safe water. More than 3.4 million people a year die from water-related diseases. Every 21 seconds a child in the world dies of such diseases. Nearly one-fifth of all childhood deaths are caused by diarrhea, which kills more young children than AIDS, TB, and malaria combined. (Source: water.org.) The US Conference of Catholic Bishops partners with Catholic Relief Services on several clean water initiatives around the world. http://changingthepresent.org/nonprofits/show/55
- Another way to help Catholic Relief Services is through the Rice Bowl Collections during Lent. <u>http://www.crsricebowl.org/</u>
- An American taking a five-minute shower uses more water than a typical person in a developing country slum uses in a whole day. Conserve more water in a variety of ways to unite in solidarity with those who lack. Be creative in ways to raise funds to help become part of the solution to give clean water to others.
- Become more involved with the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Consider volunteering, working with, donating to a local food pantry or soup kitchen.
- Donate to, get involved with Cross Catholic Outreach, an excellent organization which "delivers food, shelter and hope to the poorest of the poor." <u>http://www.crosscatholic.org/</u>
- Offer up times of fasting on bread and water (giving up pleasurable food and drink) on Fridays and other days.
- Say family meal prayers with more gratitude. Have members ask, in their own way, for God's protection and blessing for all those who will go to bed thirsty tonight or without having clean water.

"IF PRAYING ALIENATED YOU, took you away from your real life, beware: it would not be true prayer," Pope Benedict XVI said. "On the contrary, dialogue with God is the guarantee of truth, of truthfulness with oneself and with others and, therefore, of liberty."

Have you signed up to pray for vocations? The sign-up sheet is in the narthex. When it is your turn, Fr. Tom will give you the icon, a candle, and a load of information to ponder. When you return it the next week, another family will take it home and continue praying. Let's keep it going!

He now has nothing to present to the Messiah when he finds Him. The story culminates on Easter Sunday as Artaban, old and dying, finally encounters the new King, bringing peace to his life. Catholic IQ Answers:

1. C. Read Matthew 2:9 The star did not stay stationary over the manger or the house. This verse makes it clear that the star moved "in front" of the magi and guided them till it "stood over where the young child was."

2. B. Read Matthew 2:2. They assumed Herod would know. I find it fascinating that although the scribes knew exactly where the Messiah was to be born (according to Micah 5:2), they were not interested enough to travel the four or five miles to Bethlehem to see for themselves.

3. E. Isn't it amazing how God divinely inspired these two gospel writers to write His exact words, but he used their interests and professions to recall different aspects of Jesus' birth. Matthew, a tax collector, records the genealogy of Jesus (used for taxation) and the "magi" – men of means from a foreign country. Luke, a physician, records the pregnancy and birth.

4. "A. to show forth". The Greek components are epi- (meaning "on" or "to") and -phainein (meaning "to show").

5. C. Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the next few weeks, if you were to stroll around Prague or Budapest or Kraków, you might see curious grafitti scratched in chalk over some doorways: "20 + C + M + B + 16." The families dwelling behind those doors have celebrated the Epiphany door blessing. They have gathered before the feast-day meal, probably after Mass, and the head of the family has traced the sign of the cross on the piece of chalk. Standing on a ladder, the leader traces the numbers for the new year, and the letters C M B for *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, Latin for "May Christ bless this house." The letters also point to the names that tradition has assigned to the mysterious magi, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar—although scripture tells us nothing of their number, their country, or their names.

The blessing speaks of journeys ended and journeys begun at the doorway, and prays that all journeys be as satisfying as was the magi's. It prays that the house beyond the door have the quality of love and peace that the magi marveled at when they at last arrived in Bethlehem.
