

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

When we awoke this morning, we found ourselves blessed with another day. It is Easter Sunday. As that thought crossed our minds, did we find ourselves saying "so what" or "alleluia"? For many, today is truly a day of alleluia. For others, it is just another day of "so what." Faith makes a huge difference. It not only makes a difference in how we understand today and the significance of what we celebrate, it also makes a huge difference in terms of how we understand ourselves.

Succeed, live well, be productive, find your niche, follow your dreams, make money, protect your social status, be politically correct, and keep your preferences to yourself are pretty good examples of the messages our secular life wants us to hear. In and of themselves, they don't sound all that harmful. But when really examined, they are. The life of resurrection embodied

in the Gospel tells us a much different story.

Life keeps us busy. We are always connected, distracted, occupied, and working. For many of us, an agenda awaits us before we even start our day, and unfinished stuff is brought with us when we retire at night. Make the best of life and "find your own road to happiness" are messages we all too easily believe. The "so what" response to the new life of resurrection is often the result of believing that life is only what I make it. What God has to say isn't important to me securing my next raise.

Sadly, we live as if the grave is the end. While we may give the wonder of heaven a blink now and then, its glory really doesn't impress us or matter all that much. It's all about the here and now and what I need to do today to get where I want to be tomorrow. We tend to put off consid-

ering the one significant "tomorrow" that will come the millisecond after we take our last breath. When that happens, will we want to be thinking "so what?" or "alleluia"?

There is only one Jesus, one mission, and one resurrection. There is also only one of us. Have you ever pondered what one solitary, humble human life can do? Faith, not our world, tells us how special we are. We are not robots. We are not replaceable. We have one shot. There are no doovers. Love is at our core and unites us together as one with the God of love who so desperately wants us to be with Him forever. This may not match our secular agenda, but it ought to make our true inner agenda leap for joy. There doesn't need to be an end. I can live forever. Alleluia!

Alleluia!! Christ is Risen!!

Dear Parishioners,

Praise God the Father for the victory over sin and death won by His Son, Jesus Christ! No matter what is happening in our lives, Jesus Christ is Risen! That fundamental truth should shape our thoughts and feelings above all else! When we keep

the reality of the Resurrection before our thoughts, all other things will fall into their proper place. Our biggest challenge is that we constantly lose sight of the Resurrection, and when we do we fall into sin and fear.

Today and throughout this Easter Season we want to turn to the Risen Lord to know His peace and courage. That peace and courage (and the Holy Spirit) changed the lives of the Apostles from fearful men hiding for their lives into fearless witnesses of Jesus. My faith is strengthened and deepened every time I think of the testimony of the Gospels. The Evangelists testify to their own lack of understanding, their own cowardice and their ultimate failure to stand by Jesus in His hour of need. They don't sugar coat or gloss over the truth of their shortcomings. These same thick-headed and weak-kneed individuals would be transformed by the Resurrection and Pentecost into brave witnesses who would suffer and die for the Name of Jesus.

Most of us would be tempted to minimize our shortcomings and emphasize our strengths when telling the story of our life with Jesus. It is precisely the raw witness of the Gospels that draws me into realizing and embracing their truth. Jesus Christ is



Risen and has opened the gates of Heaven to all who believe in Him. He has entrusted to us a way of life (The Gospel) that will guide our path in this life and prepare us for eternal life with God. Our faith is about living the best possible life here on earth while anticipating and hoping for the life of fulfillment with God.

The awareness of that promise of eternal life, that death is not a final reality, would spur the Apostles and Disciples to proclaim Jesus to the ancient world and convert it. The events that changed the world happened in obscure places: an upper room, a lonely hillside and a freshly hewn grave. But God's humility and humor would place those obscure locations at the center of history and as ground zero for the grace that saves. That grace is amazing, and for the next 50 days we are invited to let it saturate our hearts and awaken our minds to the victory of God's truth and love.






Read a fascinating early Church writing online: The Pilgrimage of Egeria





S - Shroud of Turin










Pope John Paul II called the Shroud "the greatest relic in Christendom."

E-Empty Tomb



















A- Appearances (Apparitions) of Jesus, immediately after His death and throughout history.

Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. The Month of April is traditionally dedicated – devoted to the Blessed Sacrament / Resurrection / Holy Spirit. 
April 17 - April 24

It was a quiet Monday morning in September 2053, when John awoke with a need to go to the bathroom. To John this wasn't just any ordinary day! This was the day he would open the last package of toilet paper his parents bought in the year 2020.

IF I GO TO THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE AND END UP REPEATING THE SAME SINS, DOES THAT MEAN I DO NOT HAVE A STRONG ENOUGH INTENTION TO AMEND MY LIFE?

There is a popular expression that says, "Be patient. God isn't finished with me yet!" Growing in faith and holiness is an ongoing, life-long project, and our struggle with sin is at the heart of it. As St. Paul says, the good he intends to do, he does not do. The evil he does not intend, he does! It is not always a lack of intention, but more often the allure of evil that makes it difficult to change.

When we confess our sins, we are to come with a fully contrite heart. You need to reflect on your true feelings toward your actions before approaching the sacrament. After confession, there are strategies you can make to avoid falling into the same traps of sin. First, pray for and seek out strength and perseverance through multiple sacraments, charitable work, and personal sacrifice. Second, avoid occasions of sin when you might fail or be sorely tempted. In doing these things, remind yourself daily that it is a spiritual war we wage, and with God's grace, we will succeed.

In the face of confusion and concern impart to us the calm of Your presence.

In You allow us to find hope and healing.

Be with those who serve the sick and give them Your caring hands.

Be with those who lead and give them Your spirit of wisdom.
