# Deeper Understanding of Scripture

What does it take for our eyes to be opened? Every day, a man laboriously walks down Main Street of town. With great difficulty but graceful determination, he places one foot in front of the other, uses a crudely made staff for support, and walks. His pace is slow, but he walks. What does he hope to see? Where does he want to go? What does he find? We all walk through life. The type of "walking" life requires is not always physical but is most assuredly emotional and spiritual. We walk, we look, we encounter, and we seek. How we do these things and what we actually find is determined by what we carry and what we allow ourselves to discover along the way.

If walking is too challenging for us, we

may choose to isolate and stay alone. If we are afraid to walk, we may become overly dependent on others providing for us and abandon the journey. We can walk and pay attention only to what is in front of our feet and never notice the immensity of what is happening around us. The road is never the same twice. The journey is always different. What kinds of things do you notice as you walk through life? It seems that the disciples of the Road to Emmaus missed a lot at first. We do as well.

We are called to walk with purpose, to listen, and to notice things that may not at first be apparent. We have to allow the One who has a special claim on our soul to enlighten, instruct, and

inspire us. The incarnate mystery of God is pulsating in and through all of creation, where the presence of the Word who became flesh can be discovered. He has been with us all along. How could we have missed Him? Our journey brings us back to the breaking of the bread, and something begins to stir within us. We begin to understand, and things look differently. Bread, body, wine, and blood bring us to see that everyone and everything is a "Eucharistic" encounter. We become what we eat and we see what we eat. We continue to walk. Our eves are now opened, and we recognize Him. Our hearts burn. Stay with us. Please stay with us.

How else but through a broken heart may the Lord Christ enter in? OSCAR WILDE



# St. Paul Library 1 Lighthouse CD Resources



### From the Parish Library (Grand Hall)



God was dead to Kevin Vost for most of his adult life. Baptized, confirmed, and raised Catholic, at age 17 Vost left it all behind as he immersed himself in atheism for a period that lasted over two decades. Paralleling a successful career as a psychologist and professor, Vost allowed his clinical perspective to drive his faith perspective as well, falling into a common trap for many Catholics. This timely book's unique approach gives credit where credit is due, as Vost describes the good elements in the thinking of several famous atheists. But then, from experience and logic, he shows how each of these thinkers falls short. From there, Vost opens the doors to the philosophers and psychologists whose work, implicitly or explicitly, has paved the way toward belief in God, and even in Jesus Christ. And finally, from the perspective of a clinical psychologist, Vost unveils how theologians, popes, and Catholic philosophers persuaded him to abandon this atheism and embrace faith in Christ and the Church.

From a review on Amazon: I first read Saint Faustina's book Diary: Divine Mercy in My Soul when she was plain old Sister Faustina. The book freaked me out in several places, especially the locutions from Jesus and the visions of the afterlife. I was drawn to the book, but it frightened me, when I had just come back to the Church after a period of atheism. This was the mid-1980's also, when visionaries, mystics and classic Catholic spirituality was on the wane in the United States. Devotional books as intense as Saint Faustina's had given way to more careful, distanced spirituality. So I put the book away. I came back to it several times over the years, and always found much to intrigue, inspire and challenge me. I found it again in a Eucharistic Adoration chapel a few months ago, and bought it for myself after using it to great effect in prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament exposed. At this point, in my sixth decade of life, with classic Catholicism in full bloom wherever I look, I am finding it a wonderful book to deepen my knowledge of and relationship with Christ. I highly recommend it to Christians, especially Catholics, of all ages. When I first picked the book up in the 80's, Eucharistic Adoration was a dream from the past, as were novenas, the rosary, Benediction, and other devotions and practices of my childhood.



Today's younger Catholics are fortunate to once again have ready access to all of the traditional and classic modes of prayer and devotion that have nourished the Catholic faithful over the centuries. This book was made for the ages -- and the Divine Mercy is now coming into Its own.





# Every Home is a Home-School

The coronavirus has created a shift in how society is thinking and practicing schooling. With the "public" schools shut down, the "private" schools of home life are front and center. For the minority of families who already practice home-school, nothing has really changed much, but for the majority of homes it can become somewhat of a challenge, as many funny memes and images on the internet have expressed.







One of the things that every Catholic Christian parent needs to recall is that the home has always been and will always be, the first "school" a child is to experience. While various educational "subjects" like math, English, biology, spelling, languages, etc can be taught, supplemented through the help of external schools, the main "subject" that is in the primary domain of mom and dad is Christ, the teaching and discipline of faith and morals, the active practice of the Catholic faith.

In a Catholic St. Louis magazine, Archbishop Carlson wrote, "Parents are called to be the first teachers of the faith. Our parishes, schools and religious education programs supplement what children learn at home. Catechetical programs can play an important role, but they do not replace the original faith formation that happens in the family. Christ should be at the center of what every child learns from his or her parents and / or guardians at home. As Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI said many times, Christian life is not about rules and regulations or a set of formulaic principles for right living. Christianity is about the personal relationship with Jesus Christ that allows us to live as free people who have experienced hope and joy in him." The Archbishop concludes, "A Catholic family is alive in Christ when Jesus is present – as the chief teacher, as the primary subject and as the foundation for all that is taught and experienced by parents, children and extended family members."

No easy task to be sure, but as Mother Teresa said, it is not about success but striving to be faithful to the task. Some questions for all of us, particularly those with school aged children at home are, "What does my home life look like? Is Christ at the center? What would my own kids say? How can we strive to make it so? Lord, how can we make it so? You know, Lord what we're up against in the culture, with laziness, indifference, stubbornness of kids, teens.....and the difficulty of prayer and spiritual works. Show us the way.
