

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

When earthly lives end, especially when the person is younger, we tend to focus upon and consider what was lost. We think of lost opportunities — things they won't be able to see, babies they won't be able to cradle, and adventures that now must go undiscovered. Our minds create this chasm between earth and heaven that sees the losses of this life as permanent ones, never possible to achieve again. This perception causes many folks to remain stuck in their grief as they ponder all of the missed opportunities and regrets.

This is not resurrection thinking. All of the love that we can give and receive, the joy and elation that can be experienced, the adventures that can be undertaken, and the possibilities to be discovered are all part of a continuous journey. They are not ends in and of themselves but are all part of the unfolding of a relationship we have with God, who not only makes all of these wonderful things possible now but sustains them and fulfills them into eternity. The perception and experience of loss is really an illusion, because in God's eternal kingdom and in God's time, nothing is ever lost. Even the most intimate and tender of moments we can conceive of sharing with another human being are only part of a journey toward perfect intimate and tender moments to be shared with God in our resurrected life. We become like God and see God as He is in eternity. What greater joy, love, and hope can ever be discovered as we walk down our often dimly lit paths in this world.

This is an awesome wonder and magnificent news to behold. Call to mind someone you have lost in death. How do you see them now? How do you see yourself in heaven? Remind yourself, again, that God is the Way, the Truth and the Life. Our happiness is not going to be fully realized in this world, and there is nothing we can find here that cannot be found one hundred fold in eternity. It's all about relationship, and not solely about the relationships we have with each other, ourselves, and the world in which we live. It's about our relationship with God. If we realize how special that one relationship really is, then there is only one particular of heaven and life eternal that really matters: namely, that we fall into love eternal and discover truth. For when we finally close our eyes in death, then all will be well as long as we are with God. There are no losses, only gains.



Catholics praying the Rosary create a "Map of Hope" amidst COV9D-19

Throughout the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, many around the world have looked to particular "maps" to track the spread of the virus. For many weeks these maps displayed a disheartening trend as the virus spread to every part of the globe.

The maps caused many people to lose hope, seeing the virus wreak havoc in every country it touched. To counteract this feeling, a group of friends created a website called, "<u>Map of Hope</u>," which tracks the spread of the Rosary, instead of the virus.



According to the website's description, "Like many people, we looked at maps tracking all the coronavirus cases every day (and sometimes multiple times a day!). These maps kept getting worse. More and more red dots appeared, showing how the pandemic — and fear — was taking over the world. So we asked ourselves, 'What if we could create something that gives people hope?' It would be simple. It would track something inspiring. Something that gets better and better every day. A movement of people around the globe. Immediately, we thought, 'It should be the Rosary!'"

Anyone can check out the website and add their Rosary intention. Since its inception, the map has recorded over 5,000 prayer intentions! Social media users can, "Post on social media with #mapofhope to join the global movement," showing their Rosary and to give hope to others.

This focus on the Rosary coincides with Pope Francis' recent appeal to pray the Rosary in the month of May, specifically for the end of the pandemic.

During a time when there are many "negative" maps around, it is refreshing to see a "positive" map tracking hope around the world.


As that tiny fuse was the passageway by which power went forth to the United States and Canada, so Jesus is the tiny passageway by which we go forth to the Father."



We do all of this, and more, because when Jesus Christ took on flesh for the salvation of our souls he also bestowed great dignity on our bodies.

In Hope to Die: The Christian Meaning of Death and the Resurrection of the Body, Scott Hahn explores the significance of death and burial from a Catholic perspective. The promise of the bodily resurrection brings into focus the need for the dignified care of our bodies at the hour of death. Unpacking both Scripture and Catholic teaching, Hope to Die reminds us that we are destined for glorification on the last day.

The apparitions in 1917 of the Blessed Virgin Mary to three peasant children in Fatima, Portugal, are perhaps the most important private revelations in the history of the Church. At the height of World War I and on the eve of the Russian Revolution, Our Lady appeared in Fatima to warn us of another even greater world war, the spread of Communism, and a terrible persecution of the Church unless people returned to God. She asked for us to offer daily prayer and sacrifice for conversion of the world and salvation of souls.

How much do 9 really know about the Life of Christ? What about my children?

Here's a simple test question that Frank Sheed (a Catholic lay evangelist for 50 years) would frequently give to audiences. He would ask, "Where did Jesus live as an adult?" Does the answer come to mind right away? Obviously, such "trivia" may be "trivial" in the big scheme of things, but if Jesus is important to us as both Lord and Savior, the center of life's meaning, then would it not be odd to know some of these basic details about his life and person? And surely, all Christians should be able to answer this simple question about where He lived, where his "headquarters" were during His public ministry, right?





If you don't know the answer, we won't reveal it here, but leave it for you to look up. (Hint: He lived in Peter's house, located in this town. Importance for today? He still "lives in Peter's house" only this time it is "headquartered" in Rome, thus why we call ourselves "Roman" Catholics).

Dr. Scott Hahn was the recent keynote speaker at a "virtual retreat" Catholic family conference. He spoke on the themes of his new book "Hope to

Die" (mentioned on page 4). He also commented on what his family has been doing during this time of quarantine, how they attempt to pray together, watch Mass together, and the like. One of the things he recommended was a video series they watched together as a family. Stating up front he's not a typical fan of "Christian movies" he was glad to endorse this one. It is called "The Chosen." It is a series that

has recently come out about the life of Christ. One can watch it for free using various media tools. (Google how). It's been said of such movies in the past, "If you liked the movie, read the book."
