

HAVE WE SEEN WHERE CHRIST IS GOING?

May the eyes of your hearts be enlightened, that you may know what is the hope that belongs to his call, what are the riches of glory...

I've noticed this quarantine that many of my brother priests have used their time to take on long overdue cleaning and building projects. Whether they've been emptying old closets or applying fresh paint to worn rooms, these priests have been Marthas, "busy about many things..."

Every parish, for that matter, has been preparing to "open up." Every church has been sanitizing, hanging ropes, taping X's, clarifying protocol. These efforts and more have been in the name of safely welcoming parishioners back. Parishes have been working to offer as much protection and reasonable precaution as possible.

What is this work for? What is it really all about?

Our common worship, our gathering together is the proclamation to the ends of the earth that Christ is Our Lord. He is the Risen One, the true Son of the Father, who has defeated death.

Further, the same Jesus Christ has ascended to heaven, where he now reigns in glory at God's right hand.

We believe in these mysteries. We believe that this Jesus who has returned to the heavenly dwelling from whence he came has changed forever the horizon of our human existence. He gives our lives a new goal, a new end. He offers more than we could ever imagine.

I hope during this time that we have been reflecting on what is truly essential in our lives. I hope we have recognized the dignity and value of human life. That we have missed the worship which proclaims the most meaningful truths of our lives.

St. Paul prays for the Ephesians, "May the eyes of your hearts be enlightened, that you may know what is the hope

that belongs to his call, what are the riches of glory." This should be our prayer as we "open up."

What is all this business *for*? It is for God. It is for His glory. It is for the richness of his triumphant Son who now sits in heaven above.

The COVID-19 pandemic interrupted our days. It has affected everyone. Some have known great loss and suffering. Others may have felt more deeply the challenges of loneliness during these days of quarantine. Perhaps we ourselves have come to know some share of the abandonment felt by the disciples in those early days, especially before the Holy Spirit was sent.

And yet what we saw was still not the end. Each of us will die. The world itself will come to an end. These are basic facts of life, basic facts of the Christian faith.

And yet Christ will be there through it all. Time and time again people have testified to me, naming ways that they have seen Christ during this time. Our Lord was with us. Abiding in tabernacles, present in his body the Church, and dwelling in our souls.

What Christ offers is more than memory. His presence is not mere nostalgia nor is it a list of teachings to live by. He, Christ, is with us. Though memory fade and time continues its ponderous march, Christ remains.

No matter the threat, weakness, failure, division, wound, or sorrow, He will sustain. Christ alone offers victory. He alone offers true joy and lasting happiness. He alone can lead us to our heavenly home. When all is lost, when all is fallen, He alone will remain.

These folks have had their Easter vigil reception delayed and Pentecost is a fitting time. They are Elicia Schoenberger, Paula Minski, Trish Perkins, Cindy Deter and Sherri Meyer. There will be one adult baptism (Elicia), followed by 4 other professions of faith and



The Gospel in a Seashell

The Feast of Pentecost (50 days after Easter) marks the coming of the Holy Spirit in power, releasing spiritual gifts in and upon the Body of Christ, the Church. With the coming of the Spirit the fullness of the revelation of God as a Trinity of Persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit is made manifest. The Father is the Creator, the Son is the Redeemer, the Holy Spirit is the Sanctifier. A simpler way of understanding this is by stating that God the Father forms us (Creator), God the Son informs us (Revealer – Redeemer), God the Holy Spirit transforms us (Sanctifier). It is a progression of Divine Love, going from outside us, to beside us, to inside us.

This is how it works in the courtship of human love, (go figure) which is an echo of God's love. In courtship and marriage, the one become two, the two become one, and in the gift of a child the two become three in one, a family, a trinity, a communion of persons in a relationship of love.

All love tends toward an incarnation, even God's. The Father's love is made visible in Creation. The Word, the Son's love is made visible in the Person of Jesus. The Spirit's love is made visible in the Church, working through those who have become members of His Body through Baptism. St. Paul mentions that these members make God's love visible in the world through the gifts of the Spirit. He states in Galatians 5 what the "fruits" of this Spirit look like, virtues of "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control." God's love in creation "outside us," progresses to Christ "beside us," going deeper within our conscience "inside us" through His Spirit. The Spirit is the "love of God poured into our hearts" (Romans 5:5).

A simple way to share this "amazing grace," this progression of God's love outside us, beside us, working inside us, is the "Legend of the Sand Dollar." There are various versions of this story, but this one below highlights this Trinitarian love of God. It is a simple way to present the Gospel "in a nutshell," or, shall one say more accurately, "in a seashell.":-D

The "Gospel in a Seashell" The Legend of the Sand Dollar

Note: There are various poems, versions of the Legend of the Sand Dollar. This is one of them, meant to be read slowly.

God is the Creator, of all things great and small, and in a humble work of creation, He left a message for us all. For in a simple little shell, there is an imprint to behold, which recalls the birth and death of Jesus Christ, the greatest story eve told.

For when you look at a shell closely, you'll notice at first glance, five holes as of five wounds of One, whose body was struck with a lance.

On one side an Easter lily, in its center is a star,

a symbol of the light and truth, that the wise still follow from afar. On the other a Christmas poinsettia, whose leaves are soaked in red, to remind us both of His birth, and of the blood that He would shed.

Now break the center open, as He was broken for sin, to see revealed the fruit of His wounds, divine gifts offered from within. These are the signs of His Spirit, through the symbol of the dove, which are means by which His grace, is poured out on us in love.
