

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Robbing A Bank

The second reading from the Letter to the Colossians goes well with the first reading and the Gospel. Those passages warn how useless material wealth will be when we die. St. Paul continues this warning by reminding us that we have already died with Christ in baptism and risen to new life. To live this new life we must put to death whatever tendencies keep us from Christ.

Wealth can be a gift from God. The abuse is not necessarily in the possession of wealth. More likely, we abuse wealth either in the ways we attain it or use it—or both. How do we abuse the attainment of wealth? I can give an obvious answer, such as robbing a bank, but this makes it too easy to justify myself. Do I work a full day for my pay, or do I spend a lot of time visiting with other employees, surfing the Web, taking extra-long breaks, or texting my friends? Am I honest with my customers, charging only for work I have done?

As for using our wealth, we usually think of family first. Do we spoil our kids, so they can "have the things I couldn't afford when I was young"? Or do we teach them to work for what they get? Do we also think of the poor and homeless? Do we teach our children to be generous to others?

Notice that Paul does not mention wealth. Instead he goes deeper, point-

ing out the thoughts and desires that lead to a life centered in wealth. In baptism, we put to death passion and greed, tendencies that push us to own more or to control another person. Paul uses the image of taking off these vices as if they were clothing and putting on a new self that shows Christ in us. When we have been renewed that way, then Christ becomes visible in all people. We no longer have reason to look down on anyone for being poor or sickly or of another race. We begin to see Christ in them, for as Paul says, "Christ is all and in all" (Colossians 3:11).

Music at Immaculate Heart of Mary

Dear IHM Parish Family,

I would first like to thank Fr. Tom, the staff at IHM, and all of you for the warm welcome into your parish family. During these first two months of serving you all, it has become clear that my journey to Immaculate Heart of Mary was led by the Holy Spirit. My experience here so far has been of a parish that is faith-filled, fun-loving, and dedicated to making disciples. The Steinway grand piano and Wicks pipe organ aren't too shabby either!

During the month of August, just before the business of the liturgical year increases, I'll be taking over Fr. Tom's column here to share with you all about some of our work/goals/hopes for music and liturgy at IHM. Over the next three weeks, I'll be providing updates on the activities of our Adult Choir, Children's Choir, Praise and Worship music at IHM, some new programs, and more!

To start, I'd like to talk a bit about the importance of quality music for Mass; music which is fitting of what we celebrate, spiritually stirring, prayer invoking, and most crucially, conducive to congregational participation (that means you). <u>Sing to the Lord</u>, a document published by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops offers the following, which speaks to why singing at Mass is so critical to our worship as Christians:

"Within the gathered assembly, the role of the congregation is especially important. The full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else, for it is the primary and indispensable source from which the faithful are to derive the true Christian spirit... God has bestowed upon his people the gift of song. God dwells within each human person, in the place where music takes its source. Indeed, God, the giver of song, is present whenever his people sing his praises. A cry from deep within our being, music is a way for God to lead us to the realm of higher things. As St. Augustine says, "Singing is for the one who loves." Music is therefore a sign of God's love for us and of our love for Him. In this sense, it is very personal. But unless music sounds, it is not music, and whenever it sounds, it is accessible to others. By its very nature song has both an individual and a communal dimension. Thus, it is no wonder that singing together in church expresses so

well the sacramental presence of God to his people."

As Catholics, we believe that our immense, aweinspiring universe was created by a mind - the source and ground of all being, who is the logos, who is God. But it doesn't stop there. The one who spoke us into existence also entered creation through the incarnation of Jesus Christ. He is the focal point at which the transcendent eternal source of everything that is became available to our senses. He is the moment at which heaven collides with this pale blue dot. And just before he was arrested and crucified, he gave us a formula and a format that would provide for the continual manifestation of this collision of heaven and earth. He gave us his body, blood, soul, and divinity; his incarnation, in the form of bread and wine consecrated on the altar of every Mass celebrated every day throughout the world.

If one had never been to a Catholic Mass, with all of that context in mind, that person might think, "If that's true, it must be an incredibly powerful and epic moment to witness." Indeed it is. And if we want to convince others this is true, why would we simultaneously garnish that moment with anything less than our best? We might also ask ourselves, "Why don't people believe, or why is the faith in decline?" Think about what we're asking people to believe and then consider how we present it to them.

There have been - and continue to be - instances where artistic and cultural expression find their stride in the context of the Mass. We can get glimpses of it, for instance in the way our Eastern Orthodox brothers and sisters practice their liturgy. To watch or participate is to know that the gravity of that moment is significant. Let us reclaim a sense of patronage of good music and art made by sincere, faithful, Catholics who appreciate the subject matter that they are communicating.

Now, I'm not suggesting we need to go back to the way things were or only use a particular style or particular instrument. We need quality, appropriate art and liturgy. Let us not chase cultural relevance only to drive our Church into a deeper state of cultural irrelevance. We must match the world in her beauty. Doing something entirely unique and set apart from everything else is how you capture people's interest, and I thank you for allowing me to join our parish's mission to reclaim it!

The retirement part is from Hartford, Connecticut where I was ordained and incardinated. I never requested any change to the incardination because of all the relocation made by me and my family. As a result, the rules of the Archdiocese needed to be followed. Their rule states that active Deacons incardinated in Hartford, but serving outside the Archdiocese of Hartford, must retire at age 75.



Month of the Ammaculate Heart of Mary



A great website that gives tips for families to live out the great days and feasts of the liturgical year is <u>www.catholicculture.org</u>. An excerpt from the site is below.

August is dedicated to the Immaculate Heart. Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. The month of August is traditionally dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The physical heart of Mary is venerated (and not adored as the Sacred Heart of Jesus is) because it is united to her person and is the seat of her love (especially for her divine Son), virtue, and inner life. Such devotion is an incentive to a similar love and virtue.

This devotion has received new emphasis in this century from the visions given to Lucy Dos Santos, oldest of the visionaries of Fatima, in her convent in Tuy, in Spain, in 1925 and 1926. In the visions Our Lady asked for the practice of the Five First Saturdays to help make amends for the offenses committed against her heart by the blasphemies and ingratitude of men. The practice parallels the devotion of the Nine First Fridays in honor of the Sacred Heart.

On October 31, 1942, Pope Pius XII made a solemn Act of Consecration of the Church and the whole world to the Immaculate Heart. (Pope John Paul II also did this in union with the bishops of the world on March 25, 1984) Let us remember this devotion year-round, but particularly through the month of August.

Consider the book <u>33 Days to Morning Glory</u>. From Fr. Michael E. Gaitley, MIC, author of the bestselling book <u>Consoling the Heart of Jesus</u>. It is an extraordinary 33-day journey to Marian consecration with four giants of Marian spirituality: St. Louis de Montfort

- St. Maximilian Kolbe St. Teresa of Calcutta
- St. John Paul II.
