

## Deeper Understanding of Scripture

St. Ambrose shares some wisdom on our need to prepare the way and open the door for Christ. "You see that when the Word of God knocks hardest on your door, it is when his hair is wet with the dew of the night. In fact, he chooses to visit those who are in tribulation and trial, lest one of them be overwhelmed by distress. So, his head is covered with dew, with drops, when his body is laboring hard. It is important to keep watch so that when the Bridegroom comes, he is not shut out. If you are asleep and your heart is not keeping watch, he will go away without knocking; but if your heart is alert for his coming, he knocks and asks for the door to be opened to him." When life gets overwhelming and difficult and we find ourselves feeling a bit downhearted and miserable, these words can bring great comfort.

We sometimes choose to remain stuck in our uncomfortable darkness and being stuck becomes our norm. In this time of self-focus our hearts are closed to the graces and life God desires to give us. Wrapped in the robe of mourning and misery, we fail to see the mercy, justice, and love the Bridegroom wants to bring. If we take seriously the need to prepare the way for Christ and open our hearts in preparation for his visit, we can hear God's gentle voice calling us deep within. It beckons us to seek out its source and discover the inner calm and peace that can prevail over the darkness of despair. Sometimes our darkness is so dark that it may seem unsurmountable. Trusting in the spiritual friends who journey with us, and God's promise may bring a glimmer of light even when it is most difficult to keep our hearts' doors open. Sometimes, the only

light in the darkness is found in trusting the faith of others both past and present.

We have to trust that God has already begun the accomplishment of good work in us and that humanity is on an incredible journey to something wonderful and awesome. God is not done. When we open the doors of our hearts, straighten the paths of our lives, and prepare the way, Jesus can come with God's simple gifts of peace, grace, and joy. Life throws a great deal at us. It is easy to get tired and confused. We have to train our hearts to keep watch, discern what is of value, and forge ahead. Not allowing ourselves to become so weighed down by things and brought out of focus is a tremendous goal to achieve this Advent season. God is knocking. Answer the door. You will see and understand life in ways you never thought possible before. **©LPi**

## Sweet Mercy

Dear Parishioners,

Advent is all about welcoming the Lord as He comes in glory and shifting to remembering fondly and celebrating joyfully His Incarnation. These two movements make up the spiritual realities of our anticipatory faith. We live in the present moment where grace is most potent and possible for our growth as disciples of Christ. Our attentiveness to the present moment is about using our time well and not squandering the precious time

we are given. And yet while we live in this present moment, our faith is all about anticipating what is to come, in particular WHO is to come.

We long for Jesus to come to us, be it at the end of time or the end of our personal pilgrimage here on earth. Jesus is coming to us. We want to meet the Lord as His free and faithful servants. We long to be brought into His presence to make a return on the gifts that He has entrusted to us. No one is more committed to your personal growth and maturity in holiness than Jesus. Holiness is not the treasured possession of the few, but meant to be the transformational reality for all of humanity. The Holy Trinity, Our God and the Love of our life, is personally committed to our future communion with them. The only path to that blessed communion is conversion and spiritual maturity, also known as holiness.

While we live in the present and joyfully anticipate the future, many of us are haunted by the past. The past is meant to remind of us two things, and two things only. We remember the past with gratitude for the blessing of God and the goodness of people in our past. The other lesson of the past is to grow beyond our sins and avoid those paths in the future. Unfortunately, many of us are

trapped by the past and often haunted by sins and memories of the past. How do we address this reality?

If our sins are still haunting us because they have not been brought to God's mercy, get to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and celebrate God's immeasurable mercy. Don't take it to your grave, give it to the One who has conquered the grave! Find a good Confessor and seek him out for a more complete and cleansing review of life. In the

Sacrament of Reconciliation we are minister's of mercy, not your "betters" entitled to pass judgment. We priests witness to the Lord who went to Hell for all of us so that we might be spared that terrible end to our life. We profess the work of the Healer who can soothe any wound or expunge every disease. No one is more patient, more understanding, and more hopeful about our future growth as holy disciples than our Lord. The Father wants us to become His beloved sons and daughters, and the Holy Spirit longs to dwell within us to accomplish the works of mercy.

If by chance you are haunted by sins you have confessed but still regret, ask for the Lord's continued healing. Sin always wounds us; the longer and greater the sin, the deeper the wound. Only mercy and gratitude can fill that wound with life and hope. Ask the Lord to help you remember past offenses and failings in the light of His mercy. When we do that, regret can be replaced by genuine thanks. Shame can be replaced by eternal hope. Jesus sees the whole person that we are, and loves us more than we will ever know until we stand before Him.

The lights of the candles on the Advent Wreath break through the darkness, reminding us of the Light of Christ that we anticipate during this holy season. The Advent Wreath is very symbolic. The evergreens used for the wreath itself are a reminder of continuous life. The shaping of them into a circle reinforces that meaning. The circle is also a sign of everlasting life as well as the eternity of God. The four candles used, three purple and one pink, mark the Sundays of Advent before Christmas. The purple candles are reminders that this should be a time of prayer and sacrifice to prepare us for the second coming of Christ. On the third Sunday, the pink candle is lit to announce Gaudete Sunday, a Sunday of rejoicing for Christ is coming near. With the lighting of that candle, the light has won out over the darkness (three candles lit vs. the one that remains unlit).

## Candlelight Rorate Caeli Mass 6:45am Monday, December 13, Church

The Rorate Caeli Mass is a traditional Advent devotion in which a Mass in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary for Advent is offered just before dawn, with no lighting other than candles on the altar, windowsills, and handheld. Those who attend can expect to be rewarded with a uniquely beautiful Mass.

The Mass takes its title, *Rorate Caeli* ("Drop down dew, ye heavens") from the initial Latin words of Isaiah 45:8. In the dimly lit setting priest and faithful prepare to honor the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun as our Faith is illumined by Christ.

We will have weekday Mass at 8am as usual.

Participants will receive a journal to use daily, recording their thoughts on Mary's Advent, and making it the center of Advent here and now. 
## St Paul Library Lighthouse CD Resources



## The Season of Advent: A Season for Reflection on the "Last Things"

Fr. George Rutler writes, "It would be hard to think of any writer in the last several generations who celebrated Christmas as heartily as G. K. Chesterton. It was precisely because of this, and not in spite of it, that he said with a severity not characteristic of his benign personality: 'There is no more dangerous or disgusting habit than that of celebrating Christmas before it comes.'"

Dangerous, that is, because the rush neglects the deepest mysteries of life which are the stuff of Advent meditations: Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell; and by that neglect we are abandoned to a life of anxiety, unable to know why we were made or what we are to become. Disgusting, that is, because rushing Christmas spoils the appetite for higher things and tries to replace holy joy with entertainments that quickly becomes boring.





The classic video based on Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol is a fitting movie to watch during the season of Advent. It highlights similar themes that the Church presents to the believer about the comings of Christ mentioned above. In the case of the movie, the focus is on the coming of Christmas 'past, present, and future.'

- 2. d Unlike the civil calendar year, the Church begins her liturgical calendar at the beginning of Advent.
- d On Christmas Eve in 1223, Francis recreated the birth of Christ in a cave with live animals and people. He hoped to inspire Christians to recognize Christ in their midst.
- c Matthew 2:1-2 describes how the magi came to Jerusalem after seeing a star in the east that indicated the birth of the great King.
- 3. b Churches decorate for Advent with purple altar cloths, vestments, and candles. On Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent, the candle is rose, signifying the joy of Christians awaiting the Messiah.
- a The Feast of the Holy Family celebrates Jesus' family and every family. The Church calls the family a "domestic church." the first place of prayer, catechesis,

- and moral teaching. The family is where the gospel is brought to life. The Feast of the Holy Family is celebrated between Christmas and New Year's Day.
- c Gold represents Christ's role as King. Frankincense represented His divine nature, since incense was used to worship God. Myrrh represented His sacrificial death for the sins of humanity, since it is a perfume for embalming the dead.
- This angelic song anchors the Gloria we pray every Sunday Mass except during Advent and Lent, the seasons of penance in the Church.
- 9. b Gabriel appears in Luke 1 to announce the births of John the Baptist and Jesus. Tradition suggests that Gabriel also was the one who spoke to Joseph in his dreams (Matthew 1:20; 2:13, 19) and to the shepherds in the field (Luke 2:9-10).
- 10. d Some families do not place the figurine of the baby Jesus in their crèche until Christmas morning to build anticipation for the coming of Christ into their home.
