
In the long form of the Passion from Luke's Gospel, Jesus refers to himself as "the one who serves" (Luke 22:27). He was chiding the apostles who were arguing about which one was the greatest disciple. This reminds me of today's second reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians. He says that Christ "emptied himself, taking the form of a slave" (Philippians 2:7). Jesus is not just being humble here. He gives us an example of how far God will go for love of humanity.

I suspect the apostles were confused when Jesus talked this way. Jews considered the firstborn son to be the one to inherit the bulk of the family estate. The youngest would get the least. Yet he tells them to be like the youngest: expect little reward for what



you do for others. Now the apostles might have thought, "Sure, I can do that. I'll preach about the Kingdom of God for free. Then I'll really look important and holy." So Jesus reminds them that the world looks at the person being served as more important than the servant. But he is one who serves, and if the apostles are to be leaders of the church, they will need to be servants, too. Why? Because that is how God comes to the people—as a child born in a manger, a man who feeds the hungry but goes for forty days in the desert without food for himself, a man who washes the feet of his own disciples, and who heals the sick but accepts the suffering of crucifixion.

In the Passion according to Luke, Jesus heals one of the men sent to ar-



"Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise." Luke 23:43

rest him. He even makes friends of those who were enemies, Pilate and Herod (Luke 23:12). Barabbas, a murderer, is set free so Jesus can be crucified. As he is led to the cross, he consoles the women who weep for him. And even on the cross, he is the suffering servant who asks the Father to forgive those who are killing him. He accepts the faith of the criminal who is also being executed and promises him a place in Paradise.

With the example of service that Jesus shows toward those who put him to death, can we at least be "one who serves" those around us? Can we at least forgive those who hurt us—maybe even pray for our leaders, especially the ones with whom we disagree?

Come Celebrate the Three Great Days

On the evening of Holy Thursday, Lent comes to an end, and we enter into the "Three Days" at the center of our year: The Easter Triduum. On these Three Days, our Church is at its best!

In scripture, ritual, and song we proclaim the heart of what we believe and celebrate throughout the year. We gather often – at church, at home – during the Triduum to reflect on the central reality of our faith: the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. During these Three Days, we renew our baptism and new Catholics are initiated. These are the "highest holy days" of Christianity.

You are invited to make these Three Days different from all the other days of the year.

All members of our community are invited to plan ahead so that the entire time from Holy Thursday evening until the Easter Vigil is a time of prayer and reflection upon what really matters in life

It is ironic that these aren't days of obligation, but rather days of intense and sincere desire. Either you get what they are about, or sadly—you don't.

Please consider joining us on this Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday for the three liturgies that are one continuous celebration of the Paschal Mystery of Our Savior

These liturgies contain the most powerful rituals and symbols of the entire year.

On **Holy Thursday** we celebrate the institution of the Eucharist and the attitude with which we must approach the altar: that of a servant who washes the feet of others.

On **Good Friday** we hear the story of Jesus' Passion, venerate the Holy Cross and celebrate our common priesthood in Christ through the Great Intercessions.

At the **Easter Vigil** we celebrate the victory of light over darkness, of life over death, of love over sin. We hear the salvation history of our people, renew our baptism, implore the Holy Spirit and celebrate the Most Holy Eucharist with renewed gratitude.

Plan now to celebrate with your parish family the Three most important Days in our year.




so devout and so certain that God heard his prayer. At the place of execution, he... climbed the steps to the gallows,



The Eucharist: What is so important about "Holy Thursday"?

On the night before He died, Jesus instituted a marvelous way of remaining with us, In the fullness of His humanity until the end of time.



Here are some passages of the Catechism to ponder more in depth of what the Lord has done for us and why. Ask a spouse or children what they think about these texts.

CCC 1323 "At the Last Supper, on the night he was betrayed, our Savior instituted the Eucharistic sacrifice of his Body and Blood. This he did in order to perpetuate the sacrifice of the cross throughout the ages until he should come again, and so to entrust to his beloved Spouse, the Church, a memorial of his death and resurrection: a sacrament of love, a sign of unity, a bond of charity, a Paschal banquet 'in which Christ is consumed, the mind is filled with grace, and a pledge of future glory is given to us."

CCC 1337 The Lord, having loved those who were his own, loved them to the end. Knowing that the hour had come to leave this world and return to the Father, in the course of a meal he washed their feet and gave them the commandment of love. In order to leave them a pledge of this love, in order never to depart from his own and to make them sharers in his Passover, he instituted the Eucharist as

the memorial of his death and Resurrection, and commanded his apostles to celebrate it until his return; "thereby he constituted them priests of the New Testament."

CCC 1366 [Christ], our Lord and God, was once and for all to offer himself to God the Father by his death on the altar of the cross, to accomplish there an everlasting redemption. But because his priesthood was not to end with his death, at the Last Supper "on the night when he was betrayed," [he wanted] to leave to his beloved spouse the Church a visible sacrifice (as the nature of man demands) by which the bloody sacrifice which he was to accomplish once for all on the cross would be re-presented, its memory perpetuated until the end of the world, and its salutary power be applied to the forgiveness of the sins we daily commit.


The Holy Shroud of Turin was called the greatest relic in Christendom by Pope John Paul II. In fact, the Shroud is the most stud-
