Jesus' intentions to "set the earth on fire" and to cause division were disturbing to His listeners, and may be disturbing to us, too. In the Old Testament, fire was seen as the means of God's purification and judgment, truly a gift to the people. The fire destroys our illusions about ourselves and our behaviors. It burns away obstacles to a loving relationship with God. God's fire melts any institutions, beliefs, or practices that enable evil and injustice.

Jesus came to expose evil and thereby force decisions about God's true nature and purposes. Divisions emerged because of the diverse choices people made. Does Jesus represent some demonic power, or

the true God? Do we fight to preserve current attitudes and behaviors, or do we enter the path offered by Jesus? In evoking fire, Jesus is certainly not suggesting violence or disrespect toward others. Jesus lights a fire, and then in His death, bears its results. It is a fire of sacrificial love, melting cold hearts and bringing light to a darkened world.

The author of the Letter to the Hebrews places Jesus at the center of faith. The author uses the Greek word *archegos*, translated as "leader." This rich word includes various meanings: pioneer, instigator, and captain. Jesus blazed the trail, showing us how to run the long -distance race of faith—with stead-

fastness and courage. To a community experiencing persecutions and discouragement, Jesus is known as the exemplar of faithful endurance.

In "keeping our eyes on Jesus," we confront what often is the most persistent obstacle to our faith discouragement. Our faith-filled focus on Jesus enables us to see reality as filled with the presence of God. God is neither distant nor indifferent; God is close and passionately loves us. Discouragement results in part from seeing mostly sin and darkness in our world and in ourselves. Jesus, God and human, reminds us of the divine activity within us and among us.

Music at Immaculate Heart of Mary

Dear IHM Parish Family,

Last week I spoke about our parish's adult choir who will be leading worship with traditional or occasionally gospel -style choral music. This week, I'm going to do a oneeighty in terms of musical genre and talk about praise and worship music, and its emerging role in our parish. What do I mean when I reference praise and worship music? Technically, P&W music is a defined genre of Christian music used in contemporary worship. The songs are frequently referred to as "praise songs" or "worship songs" and are typically led by a "worship band" or "praise team", with either a guitarist or pianist leading. It has become a common genre of music sung in many churches, particularly in charismatic or nondenominational Protestant churches with some Roman Catholic congregations incorporating it into their Mass as well. Because, in common with hymns, such music is sung communally, there can be a practical and theological emphasis on its accessibility, to enable every member of the congregation to participate in a communal act of worship.

At my last parish (where I had a similar role), I was also heavily involved in our vibrant and growing youth ministry program. Through this experience ministering to teens, I gained a profound appreciation for P&W music as a powerful tool of evangelization of young people. Eventually, I came to appreciate it as a valid form of worship which, when done well, can be very reverent and liturgically appropriate.

You may be wondering why I used that word "eventually". Quite honestly, when I was approached with the concept of supporting yet another "contemporary" ensemble at a parish already heavy with them, I, as a classically trained pianist, felt heavy skepticism. I had not yet been exposed to a situation where enough care was taken such that I found the music tasteful or spiritually uplifting. However, as I began to work closely with our new youth minister on the Life Teen program and building a worship band, something incredible began happen. The Holy Spirit opened me to the potential of this music to resonate with folks, especially young people, and move them to prayer. Parishioners began flocking to this particular Mass, our youth ministry program exploded, and I witnessed a conversion in tens of teens I had known for several years. These teens were taking their faith so seriously, and the role of P&W music in that was significant to say the least. I even started enjoying the music myself.

In this statement at Asian Youth Day, Pope Francis reminds us of the importance of the role of young people in the church: "As young Christians," Francis said, "you are not only a part of the future of the Church; you are also a necessary and beloved part of the Church's present. You are the present of the Church," whether at "work, study, have begun a career or have answered calls to marriage, religious life or the priesthood." "Wake up!" means being vigilant and requires that young people don't allow "pressures, temptations and sins of ourselves or others to dull sensitivity to the beauty of holiness, to the joy of the Gospel." Rather, the Pope said, God constantly invites his children "to be glad and sing for joy." "No one who sleeps can sing, dance or rejoice." So in addition to P&W music being this valid form of worship for people of all ages, I also see it as a way to help young Christians "Wake up". As Pope Francis so correctly points out, if our church is to thrive, we must consider the importance of young people in the present, not just the future of the church.

Informed by all of this, I have built a praise and worship band here at IHM over the last two months. The band consists of three professional vocalists, rhythm guitar, lead guitar, bass, percussion, piano, and pads. We have made significant upgrades to live sound in the church, and I have asked parishioner Steve Farber to help me by serving as worship band leader. Like Mary Sweetin, Steve considered the question of going deeper in his music ministry at IHM:

"Well, I have been performing music for over 40 years. When I was baptized into the church in 2012, I felt a call to do something with music, but knew I wasn't cut out for the choir. I was uneasy because I was always a performer and wanted to make sure I would be doing it for God and not myself. I didn't want Mass to become another show. So I laid back for a while until Betsy Struckhoff asked me to play guitar with her for a song at Mass. Shortly after that, I was approached with the idea of doing some contemporary music at Masses. I was still unsure about doing it but agreed to give it a try. That was about 4 years ago and things have evolved quite a bit since then... I now know that I am being called to bring people to worship through my music. I feel that music gets to people's heart and soul in a way that other types of prayer can't. Whether at Mass or elsewhere, I feel the Holy Spirit working through me when I am singing. I really enjoy the music that today's musicians are putting out...popular music with God as the theme...what could be better? I feel as though all the years I spent with my bands were preparing me for this. Although it's been decades, I feel like I am at the very beginning again. I am excited for the emergence of P&W music at IHM, and I am grateful to be a part of it."

This band is a skilled, faithful, talented, and passionate group of folks who I have asked to take on two main roles at IHM. The first is a permanent slot at the 4pm Saturday Vigil Mass every weekend except the fourth Saturday of the month, beginning September 7. This is

part of an ongoing effort to draw more folks – who have varied preferred styles of worship – into our IHM parish family. My hope is that between all of our weekend celebrations of the Eucharist there is something for everyone. (*As a side note, the 7:30 Sunday Mass will continue to offer the traditional and beautiful simplicity of a cantor and organist*). The other role is to serve as musicians for the monthly "ADORE" gatherings. These nights on the 3rd Wednesday of the month at 6:30pm are similar to the Nazareth Nights at Kennrick Glennon. They will feature adoration, a reflection from Fr. Tom, praise and worship, confession, night prayer, and benediction. Please see the full page flyer in this week's bulletin for information about the first one coming up this week.

The band has worked diligently on refining their sound and repertoire, mostly shying away from music that is more than fifteen years old. They truly are on the cutting edge of this genre, and I am excited to see the fruits of their ministry.

Due to prison requirements, cookies MUST be made according to a few simple guidelines (for example: no fruit, no nuts, no icing, no sprinkles). Cookies should be about 3" in size, packed in quart-sized Ziploc bags, one dozen per bag. All cookies must be ready by Friday, October 11 for the Kairos Weekend.
