

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

The only way to know God is to love God. Our minds will never fully grasp the mystery of God, but our hearts and souls can learn to love the mystery. Years ago, when life had a more innocent quality to it, we believed what we were told or witnessed, unless there was direct evidence otherwise. This was especially true if the information came from someone in authority. In a sense, we were a bit more gullible on one hand but also more trusting on the other. The latter is an admirable guality that sadly can be eroded when we realize we have been duped. With education and technological advances, we find ourselves more skeptical and less likely to too guickly accept and believe what we see and hear.

For all of the good that social media can do, it can also easily distort reality and truth. Photoshop and a myriad other technological truths can add to, fabricate, and make even the non-existent seem real. It is amazing. How far do we allow this obviously justifiable skepticism to take us? Questioning and doubting are healthy elements of any good relationship as long as we don't allow them to turn us away from a deeper experience of love and encounter. If we cannot get our minds around something or empirically justify or prove it, we tend to declare it a hoax, untrue, or unauthentic and walk away. The very same trust that can quickly be eroded is exactly what is essential for all of our relationships, especially our relationship with God. With all things and people that make a profound claim on us, we have to trust in the absence of knowledge. Full self-investment involves plunging completely into the unknown!

Simon Peter said to Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Peter came to this knowledge, which is not "head knowledge" because of the relationship he shared with Jesus and what God was able to reveal in and through that relationship. Peter simply "knew" because of love that this is who Jesus really is. The silent exchange of love between friends, and not an intellectual exercise of the mind, brought Peter to this place. When we stop and think about it, there are many things in life that we simply know but do not completely understand. When someone sacrifices their own well-being for another, it may not make intellectual sense when examined. But it makes a world of sense when it is carried out. The vastness of reality and an encounter with incomprehensible mystery all lead us to profound silence where we simply know something to be true. Have you trusted enough to allow your relationship with God to bring you to this place or are you still too ©LPi skeptical?







St. Gianna's Daughter to help "Focus on the Family"

My wife Lynette and I are part of a prayer group with friends and acquaintances that meet regularly to pray a couple of scriptural rosaries along with open and other devotional prayers. With chaos and disorder around us and in us on multiple levels, it is a gift to share a moment of peace and order through conversation with God in personal prayer and with others in personal conversation.

Recently, one of the couples that is part of the group brought a surprise guest with them, none other than Gianna Emmanuella Molla, the daughter of St. Gianna and Pietro Molla. (Her presence takes a "first

In less than 40 years, Gianna Beretta Molla became a pediatric physician, a wife, a mother and a saint!

She was born in Magenta near Milano, the 10th of Alberto and Maria Beretta's 13 children. An active member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and a leader in the Catholic Action movement, Gianna also enjoyed skiing and mountain climbing. She earned degrees in medicine and surgery from the University of Pavia, eventually specializing in pediatrics.

In 1952, Gianna opened a clinic in the small town of Mesero, where

class relic" to a whole new level). Gianna Emmanuella is from Italy. She has been in the United States for some time, arriving just before the coronavirus pandemic hit. Having visited Wentzville, MO (2016) for an anniversary celebration of St. Gianna Church, she made friends with these folks who were glad to host her for a repeat visit. It was a privilege to be in her presence, pray the rosary with her and then listen to her speak to us about why she is in the U.S. at present. For those who may not be familiar with the story of her saint mother, a parish dedicated to her is five minutes away. One might visit the parish website from our neigh-

she met engineer Pietro Molla. Shortly before their 1955 marriage, Gianna wrote to Pietro: "Love is the most beautiful sentiment that the Lord has put into the soul of men and women."

In the next four years the Mollas had three children: Pierluigi, Mariolina, and Laura. Early in her fourth pregnancy, doctors discovered that Gianna had both a child and a tumor in her uterus. She allowed the surgeons to remove the tumor but not to perform the complete hysterectomy that they recommended, which would have killed the child. Seven months later in April 1962, Gianna Emanuela Molla was born at the hospital in Monza, but post-operative complications resulted in an infection for her mother. The following week Gianna Molla died at home, and was buried in the cemetery of Mesero.

Gianna Emanuela went on to become a physician herself. Gianna Beretta Molla was beatified in bors up the road at stgiannaparish.org. Here's a brief excerpt found from another website: www.franciscanmedia.org/saintgianna-beretta-molla/



1994 and canonized 10 years later. Her Liturgical Feast Day is April 28.

Gianna Emmanuela shared with us that she is in the U.S. to seek a place for a "family center" (my words) to spread word and devotion about her mother and to help aid in the building up of the family. I'm guessing that her potential saint father (d. 2010) may have something to do with this as well.

While she initially was hoping to have her parent's home and surroundings restored and centered in Italy, she believes that the United States is where it is to happen. She said that several key factors are causing Italy to lose much of its Catholic identity, and there is great hope that the U.S. is to be where this light can shine. We hope to soon have more details on where this might take place. Word is that the land of Lincoln may be it. More to follow.

The Choice of Stewardship

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained: Priestly Ordination of Men

Question:

Why are only men allowed to be priests or deacons in the Church?

Answer:

One of the most debated and — in some circles contentious teachings of the Church is that only men can be ordained as priests and deacons. Critics see it as a way of strengthening a patriarchal system in which women have little or no voice. Those who support this teaching look to New Testament teaching (where we read of Jesus choosing only men to be apostles) and the long-standing practice of the Church. This was certainly the perspective of St. John Paul II who, in his 1994 apostolic letter, Ordinatio Sacerdotalis, closed the discussion on the possibility of ordaining women as priests.

In the letter, he reflected on the dignity of women and their call to share in the life and mission of the Church, but he concluded by solemnly declaring that "the Church has no authority whatsoever to confer priestly ordination on women and that this judgement is to be definitely held by all the Church's faithful" (no. 4).

This position has been upheld by Pope Francis in interviews, most notably as he returned from his 2016 visit to Sweden.

The ordination of women to the diaconate is another question and one which is being studied. In 2016, Pope Francis created a 12-member commission to study the question from several perspectives (theological, liturgical, historical, etc.). The commission issued an initial report for Pope Francis who later said that the commission had not yet produced a "definite response" to the question because of a lack of agreement on the role of female deacons in the Early Church.

For now, however, regardless of what changes might come from ongoing study and debate, the Church continues to reserve ordination to the diaconate to men only, recognizing a vital link between the diaconate and the priesthood and the lack of certainty about the presence and function of female deacons throughout history.



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
