Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Secular pursuits only bring a temporary amount of satisfaction and fulfillment. As much as we may think that achieving worldly success, economic security, personal well-being, and self-fulfillment are worthy goals to obtain, they all are dependent on external variables and can lead to emptiness. We are trained to be very pragmatic and productive. Unless we are able to check off all of the boxes or comply with specific measurable requirements, our value and worth becomes questionable. Corporations, educational institutions, systems, structures, and secular ideology rarely consider deeper, more spiritual, and human contributions a person can and needs to make.

To the secular mind, the wisdom and ideals of the Gospel are making less and less sense. Consider for a moment this question: "What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" While Jesus is asking this very challenging question to people who are considering his message, many in our world are in a quite different place. Whether we realize it, many folks are asking a much different question. Why would you not want to gain the whole world and secure your life? If you look at where a lot of folks are investing their time, energy, and resources, it becomes obvious where current priorities rest.

Modern day comforts and possibilities are backing us out of our relationship with God. The fire burning in every human heart is trying to find its satisfaction in the things that humans have created and not God. Being altruistic and offering compassion for those most in need becomes a political responsibility or responsible gesture. We realize that our hearts need to be centered on something and someone who calls us out of ourselves, but we struggle and battle with naming the source of that call. God places the desire to seek, find, and love Him in the core of every soul. We are not abandoned and left to fend for ourselves. But we can easily get confused. We know that when we extend ourselves to another self-sacrificially, we are doing what is just and right. We know that we can work through suffering and loss and come out better and more whole on the other side.

Our minds need to be renewed so that they can begin to understand that there is much more to who we are, and that faith plays a pivotal role in achieving our true and everlasting goals. It is when we see that it is only faith that can bring us to this heightened awareness of ourselves and God that it will begin to make sense. Then, we can put things in proper perspective and consider being a disciple.

Dear parishioners,

Many thanks to all who supported our efforts to upgrade our camera and projection system in Church. We raised a total of \$20,000 to replace the system and are currently moving ahead with it as I write this article. The broadcasting of Mass has been a tremendous blessing during these days of the pandemic. It has allowed us to communicate with and connect to each of you during a time when the virus prevented our gathering. The upgraded system will continue to be a blessing for those who are homebound, or away from our parish family, as a means of connection.

Spiritual Communion is a great thing. We should be striving to practice it at all times, not just when given the opportunity to watch a broadcast Mass. During the broadcast Mass it bears a particular importance because it allows us in real time to celebrate the communion we desire with God and one another. Spiritual Communion, like Sacramental Communion, is meant to change our hearts and minds through a life of conversion and spiritual renewal so that we may more faithfully serve God in the world and give witness to our faith.

God does all the heavy lifting in our life of faith. Our works are a small, but appreciated return that we can give to God. As Jesus reminds us, when people see our works they will give glory to God! We don't seek the glory for ourselves, but for God, then neighbor and finally to receive the blessing of coming to know ourselves as God's beloved daughters and sons. Sanctification is the second half of salvation. We cannot save ourselves, we are dependent upon the Sacrifice of Christ and God's amazing grace. God cannot sanctify us against our will. Only by cooperation with grace and living the life of discipleship can we hope to grow in holiness and be prepared to receive all that God has promised us.

Again, thank you to the generosity of those who supported our desire to upgrade and improve our system at IHM. I pray it helps all those who are homebound or away to connect with our parish family and the celebration of our faith.

22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time—Year A

[Jesus said to his disciples,] "I must... be put to death, but three days later I will be raised." Matthew 16:21

A woods surrounds a retreat house in Barrington, Illinois. Tucked away among the trees is a life-sized stone crucifix. It is especially striking at night, because it is floodlighted dramatically. It is even more striking on rainy nights, because then water trickles down the face and the body of Jesus. One rainy night a retreatant came upon the crucifix and was deeply moved. Going up to it and touching it, the retreatant prayed for a long time. Later, the retreatant said, "I touched only the cross because I wasn't worthy to touch the body of Jesus."

The retreatant's story invites me to ask: Why did Jesus die as he did? The cross is a sign, an invitation, and a revelation: a sign of Jesus' love, an invitation to love as Jesus loved, a revelation that love entails suffering.



22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, August 30, 2020

Archbishop-designate Mitchell Rozanski gave thanks at a press conference announcing his appointment as the new archbishop of St. Louis at the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Louis in St. Louis June 10. "Mindful of God's goodness, I wish to express my gratitude to our Holy Father for his trust that he has placed in me," Archbishop-designate Rozanski said. He also thanked Archbishop Carlson for his 11 years of service as shepherd of the Archdiocese of St. Louis, and for "his steady leadership and living out the Gospel message in such a beautiful, humble way."

Prior to being named an auxiliary bishop for the Archdiocese of Baltimore in 2004, Archbishop-designate Rozanski had 20 years of experience serving in various parishes in the



archdiocese. When he was named an auxiliary bishop, he recalled telling Cardinal William Keeler that he had no experience working for the chancery. Cardinal Keeler told him: "Well, that's not a bad thing."

Being a parish priest brought its challenges and joys, but what was important was building relationships and maintaining communication with the people he served. As a bishop, he sees himself still having the heart of a parish priest, but now his parish territory is a little big larger. "Parish priests are graced to be with people in such moments of their lives — weddings, baptisms, funerals, and that really establishes a relationship," he said. "I miss those relationships I had as a parish priest ... but it's also taught me that being a bishop does not mean being removed from that sort of interaction of ministry, of being involved in the lives of people and reaching out."



Archbishop-designate Rozanski also spoke about his episcopal motto, "Serve the Lord with Gladness," which he chose after reading from Psalm 100. He wanted something with an action word, that would serve as a reminder of living the faith in concrete ways. "If we do live our faith concretely in serving the Lord, then we will certainly have hearts that are joyful," he said. "It means that if we put our faith into action, and we live the Lord's words, then we're joyful."

"Jesus has entrusted to us His Church to be His presence in our world," Archbishop-designate Rozanski said. But Jesus did not avoid situations that were uncomfortable, he said, but rather faced them head-on, bringing the healing presence of God to others. "It is my hope that, called to lead this Church of St. Louis, God's grace will be in abundance in helping me to be part of that healing process and resolution to all of the daunting issues that we face," he said. "No leader, though, can do this alone. We must work together if we truly want to realize the mandate of Jesus to bring justice and peace to our families, our communities, our nation and world."

Archbishop-designate Rozanski said he looks forward to getting to know the people of the archdiocese, including the many priests, deacons, women and men religious and laypeople. He said the people of the archdiocese should expect to see him spending much of his time learning about the Archdiocese of St. Louis. "I need to be out amongst the people meeting them," he said. "My first months here will be a lot of learning. I don't want to make any decisions or have any preconceived notions" right away. "It's a very relational time, because people share their thoughts and their feelings, their insights with me. I am looking forward to that."


