### Deeper Understanding of Scripture

The lens through which we view life makes a difference. It also determines who we choose to learn from and what we allow to shape our thoughts and feelings. For many, life is simply what it appears to be, a given that either through evolution or some other means just came to be. There is no apparent rhyme or reason to things and things can be dissected and understood only in terms of what they empirically present. To the person using this lens, a tree is a tree and a flower is a flower. Their composition and existence can be understood only to the extent that current human knowledge allows. Through this lens, what gives life purpose and meaning? This lens has an essentially unknown beginning and definite end. Once those are accepted, the middle becomes some kind of pursuit of happiness, with values and principles being things that are self-created and found acceptable.

But there is a Divine lens that also exists and deserves mention. It is found when one stumbles upon faith and begins to see things differently. This lens is of God and reveals a Divine Energy and Life that flows through and in all things. Faith then shows us that all that lives come from this one Source of Love. This is the only true lens that can give human beings the purpose and meaning they desperately need. From this perspective, all of life is much more than what is immediately apparent! It now tells and reveals a story about God's generous, creative, and unconditional love! The unfolding of the human story is the unfolding of God's story. What meaning our lives have when they are viewed as a part of God's love affair with humanity! We are indeed special.

The lens of our faith asks us to learn from Jesus Christ, Jesus, as the real Bread of Life, shows us our eternal destiny and completes and frames our lives. It is only in allowing ourselves to be taught by Jesus, that faith, hope, and love take on much greater importance. All the relationships in our lives are now structured and ordered using God's primary commandment of love. Jesus, then, is not just some man who lived at some point in history. Jesus is the incarnate Son of God who shows us the way, the truth, and the life. Using this lens changes things up a great deal. Looking at the creation that surrounds you and the special unique people you love, what is God trying to teach you about His love for you and the eternal life He wants you to have?

### September Changes

Dear Parishioners,

I hope your Summer has gone well thus far as it reaches its final stretch. About the middle of July when the first cicadas start making their calls I would remember how I knew as a child that summer recess was already half finished. The last half of July and all of August would pass so quickly. When September rolls around, there will be some changes in the rhythm of our parish life.

## Sunday Mass at 9:30 will begin now at 10:00 as of September 5th.

There will be some exceptions — on the Sausage Supper Sunday (say that three times fast in a Monster truck Announcer Voice) the time will revert to 9:30. Other parish events scheduled for Sunday will simply begin later.

### September 1st at 6:30pm we will begin a weekly Mass in addition to the morning Mass.

Wednesday Evening Mass will be an opportunity for us to come together during the week to celebrate the act that defines us as Disciples of Christ. One of my plans for this weekly Mass will be inviting our students and their parents to Mass. Families that celebrate the Sacraments together have the greatest hope of those Sacraments taking root in the future of their children's lives. One of my real hopes is that parents and their children will want to celebrate Mass together on Wednesday as well as taking advantage of the celebration of Reconciliation after Mass.

On the Fourth Wednesday of the Month we will have a focus on the healing power of Christ through the Sacraments and prayer of the Church. There will be healing teams available after Mass to pray for our parish family as well as anyone else who desires to celebrate the power of Christ and His mercy in individual prayer and intercession.

Jesus is waiting to meet us in His life-giving Sacraments. At every Sacramental celebration Jesus is calling His Church together in prayer and coming to be with her. In the Eucharist He is present in a Real and Physical way that surpasses the other Sacraments because of the permanency of the Blessed Sac-In the Eucharist there is an abiding presrament. ence, in all the other Sacraments there is an encounter with the Risen Christ for that moment. Jesus is the one who baptizes, confirms, unites, forgives, ordains and anoints through the minister in all the other Sacraments. In our Blessed Sacrament, Jesus gives us Himself. We eat His flesh and drink His blood. How wonderous to have the only food that joins us to Someone greater than us rather than just becoming part of our body. Become what you receive, that is one awesome challenge!

During the Great Depression of the 1930s, a monastery gave out plain sandwiches in paper bags every afternoon at 5:00. The line of people was always long. Finally, a few grumbled at the plainness of the sandwich and tossed it away. What Are the Odds? is a raw, authentic account by a man many thought would never rise above his serial, addictionfueled failures. Mike's gripping narrative transports readers from his small-town tavern with its colorful cast of "Regulars" to Mexico and a drug deal gone awry. From Las Vegas casinos, where Mike won and lost fortunes as a professional gambler, to a jail-cell beatdown. From failed rehabs to his 20-year marriage, an ideal union decimated by addiction. And

finally, to the redemption of the most shameful moment of his life. An unvarnished account of the ravages of cocaine, crack, and gambling addiction, <u>What Are the Odds?</u> tells the improbable tale of how a small-town guy with a dream somehow made it a reality. More importantly, Mike opens up about the God who relentlessly chased him down, turning him from a casual believer to a passionate evangelist with an absolute, mathematical certainty that God is real. <u>What Are the Odds?</u> will not only speak to entrepreneurs and those struggling with addiction, but also to anyone looking for a message of hope.

(Recommended by Josh Deters) Terrence Malik's latest "A Hidden Life" is not only a return to form, it may be his best piece ever. The film (based on a true story) concerns an Austrian farmer Franz who lives with his family in an idyllic village/farm up in the Austrian hills in the late 30s. With the rise of Hitler, citizens are heavily leaned on to sign an oath to Hitler. When Franz refuses, the repercussions to him



and his family slowly but palpably build both from the government and even the local villagers. The film is utterly heartbreaking and utterly beautiful at the same time. The cast is excellent though largely unknown to me except for Bruno Ganz in one of his last performances as a Nazi general on the tribunal formed to try Franz for his civil disobedience. The Archdiocese of St. Louis has developed a new system for safe environment compliance called <u>Prevent and Protect STL</u>. Everyone ministering to minors and vulnerable adults (clergy, employees and volunteers) in the Archdiocese are required and asked to register in the new system before December 31, 2020. This includes those new to service and those who are currently in service. For those who have already attended a Protecting God's Children workshop, your previous training date will transfer to this new system. In addition to attending a live Protecting God's Children workshop, all clergy, volunteers and employees will register for an updated background screening, view two new online training modules on abuse reporting and the Code of Ethical Conduct, and agree to the updated Code of Ethical Conduct. # SPIRE (Memory Aid) for a Catholic Plan of Life (Part 5 of 7)

How does one unpack and simplify in a plan of life all that God has revealed in Jesus, Scripture and Tradition, all the Church believes, teaches and proclaims to be revealed by God? And how does one strive to live it out faithfully in a daily duty as a Catholic Christian? Here is an attempt by way of a memory aid: (SPIRE – Spiritual, Physical, Intellectual, Relational, Evangelical).



### Here's a few tips for R-Relational

An usher went up to a man with his hat on in church and asked him to remove it. "Thank goodness," said the man. "I thought that would do it. I've attended this church for months, and you are the first person who has spoken to me."

The best quote I ever heard on Relationships is this, "We are wired for relationship because we were made by a relationship." (That is, of course, the relationship of the Holy Trinity.) At the end of our lives, when we are on our death bed, the only thing that will really matter to us is our relationships. This is something to ponder. Who do I love? Who loves me? It's a sobering thing to ponder that 100 years from now, the only relationship that will ultimately matter, the only one who will truly remember me is......God. Yet, in the commun-

ion of saints and sinners, our relationships with others will also extend into eternity, whether in a heaven or in a hell. What am I doing to cultivate and foster good, godly relationships with those people I claim to care about? Matthew 25 and other Scriptures make it clear that my judgment before God will be based on how I loved and cared for my "neighbor" – first, my closest neighbors being my spouse, children, to my neighbor neighbors, my co-workers, acquaintances, on down the line, even to my own enemies. The only ship that I should worry about getting on in time and into eternity is the "relation-ship." While time limits us to develop deep relationships with only a minimal amount of people, the question is, "What am I doing to culti-



vate and deepen these relationships?" Really, who do I know more than on the surface? Who really knows me? Does anybody really care? When I'm in a conversation with others, is there an authentic dialogue of sincerely wanting to know the other as other? As it's been said, people don't care what you know, until they know that you care. Does anyone call you because they are engaging another immortal soul, made in the image of God, worthy of love and honor and respect.....or is it simply a question of "use" --- getting something? Pope John Paul II once made a simple, powerful statement that the opposite of love is not hate, it is "use." We are supposed to love people and use things. Today we seem to love things and use people.

Matthew Kelly writes that the happiest people on the planet are those who have deep relationships. Gift these relationships with carefree timelessness.

Plan it, schedule it. Do it. Let's figure creative ways to deepen a shared bond with others. This could be faith, this could be a hobby, this could be a craft, a sport. Bishop Robert Barron once commented on a principle of Aristotle called "The Transcendent Third." The basic idea is that two people in a relationship that have a shared interest will grow closer to one another as they grow closer to the interest. In terms of looking at this from a faith perspective, imagine a shared faith in Christ and how a couple would grow closer to one another by growing closer to the Lord. Want
