

Holding on to Joy

Dear Parishioners,

We come together in prayer on this Gaudete Sunday to rejoice in God's abundant goodness. As people of faith it is at times hard to distinguish the difference between happiness and joy. Who doesn't like both happiness and joy? I know I often confuse/overlap the two because they share a lot of similarities. Both are good

experiences in our life, but one is dependent upon the circumstances and the other is a gift from God and an awareness that can exist independent of those happenings.

Happiness comes and goes in our life depending upon the happenings in our life. We know that is not an enduring reality because of the ever-changing circumstances of life. We can be caught by surprise with the changes in life and our happiness can suddenly evaporate. Given time and patience, those circumstances will change again and happiness will return. God is good and wants to see us happy, but in an imperfect world happiness is not a permanent reality. Happiness can be cultivated in this life by an attitude of gratitude. Gratitude does more than just open the door for happiness, it makes clear the highway for real joy.

Joy comes from a fundamental awareness that God is victorious and that nothing can separate us from the love of God that comes to us in Jesus Christ. Joy is both a fruit of the Holy Spirit and an attitude of faith that springs from a trust in God's providential goodness. I pray daily to abide in that awareness. Holding on to joy is difficult because we often allow the happiness of the moment to become the determining factor in our awareness of our joy. While unhappiness can make it difficult to remember our reasons for embracing joy, it is possible to be

joyful in your heart while experiencing sadness.

One can hold on to joy by remembering the deeper truths of faith that surpass the current experience of life. Feelings are not reality, but a response to experience. We pay attention to our feelings without letting them become the all encompassing means to interpreting experience. Our thoughts, feelings and faith combine to form an integrated response to experience. Joy draws life from remembered faith that places trust in God's enduring love. As St. Paul reminds us in his letter to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always! I shall say it again, rejoice! Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near." In these remaining days of Advent, let us cling to joy with a fearsome faith and cultivate happiness as we prepare to celebrate the beauty of Christmas.

Viktor Frankl was a Jewish psychiatrist when the Nazis arrested him and sent him to a concentration camp. In his book *Man's Search for Meaning*, he describes some of the sufferings that Jews endured in those camps. One was the pain of waiting—waiting to learn the fate of loved ones, waiting to learn one's own fate, waiting to be rescued. The pain of waiting also plagued Jews in Jesus' time-waiting to be delivered from the Romans, waiting for the Messiah to come. This pain affected Jews in different ways. Some lost hope; some lost faith. Others simply watched and prayed. What is one thing I am waiting for in my life? How is this affecting me?




In today's Gospel John the Baptist says, "Whoever has two cloaks should share with the person who has none. And whoever has food should do likewise."




Candlelight Rorate Caeli Mass 6:45am Monday, December 13, Church

The Rorate Caeli Mass is a traditional Advent devotion in which a Mass in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary for Advent is offered just before dawn, with no lighting other than candles on the altar, windowsills, and handheld. Those who attend can expect to be rewarded with a uniquely beautiful Mass.

The Mass takes its title, Rorate Caeli ("Drop down dew, ye heavens") from the initial Latin words of Isaiah 45:8. In the dimly lit setting priest and faithful prepare to honor the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun as our Faith is illumined by Christ.

We will have weekday Mass at 8am as usual.

St. Paul Library / Lighthouse CD Resources



The story told in this film is the story that happened to Juan Diego on December 9, 1531 at the hill of Tepeyac, Mexico, at the outskirts of what is now Mexico City. It's one of miracles, healings, and the foundation of the fastest growing religious movements, an estimated 9-10 million conversions in 7 years.

Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the Life of the Church: Our Lady of Guadalupe: Feast December 12

At right is the actual cloak (tilma) of Juan Diego from the apparition of our Lady to him in Mexico in the year 1531. Though made out of cactus fiber, the cloth has miraculously not decomposed and still hangs in the shrine at Mexico City to this day, 500 years later. The image of Mary has been called a "picture writing" for the Indians. Though there were some twenty-four languages and perhaps fifty dialects in Mexico at that time, all the Indians were able to understand Our Lady's message to them. The miraculous image produced on the tilma of St. Juan Diego is rich in symbolism, as one reads below. IHM Church has a faux-cactus replica of the image in which one can see such details close-up (picture lower right)



SYMBOL: Dress of rose overlaid with gold lace; fur-trimmed necks and cuffs; gold border on cape.

MEANING: Royalty, queen

SYMBOL: Golden brooch with black cross.

MEANING: Bearer of the true religion to Mexico. The Spaniards under Cortez had the same cross on their ships.

SYMBOL: Greenish-blue mantle or cape.

MEANING: The stars were worshipped as gods by the native people. Wrapped around the woman, it shows

that they are not gods, but are part of the creation of whom the woman is reverently bowing. A 1983 study concluded that the stars on the Lady's mantle in the image are exactly as the stars

of the winter solstice appeared before dawn on the morning of December 12, 1531.

SYMBOL: The girdle or bow around her waist

MEANING: The bow appears as a four-petaled flower, which to the native Indians was the "flower of the

sun: a symbol of plenitude. The high position of the bow and the slight swelling of the abdomen

show that the Lady is "with child."

SYMBOL: Fingers: three together, one farther apart MEANING: The Trinity: three Persons in one God.

SYMBOL: Surrounded by rays, standing in front of the sun.

MEANING: The sun was worshipped as the highest god, and here the lady comes forth hiding but not

extinguishing the power of the sun. She is now going to announce the God who is greater

than their sun god.

SYMBOL: Stands on a darkened crescent moon.

MEANING: This testifies to her royalty. To the Meso-American Indians only kings, queens and other dig-

nitaries would be carried on the shoulders of someone. She is queen of the angels, showing

that she has come from heaven.

SYMBOL: Hands folded, head bowed in reverence to someone higher: The Almighty

MEANING: The eyes looking down was a sign to the native people that she was not a god since in their

art, the gods start straight ahead with their eyes wide open. This shows that she is not God,

but belongs to him, and honors him, clothed in his light.

Christmas Tree

In the German Middle Ages, various plays at Christmas time within churches often featured as a prop an evergreen "Paradise tree" from which an apple was plucked. These plays were given on December 24, which as well as being Christmas Eve, is in some countries the religious feast day of Adam and Eve. To suggest the Garden of Eden, a tree decorated with apples (to represent the forbidden fruit) and wafers (to represent the Eucharist and redemption) was used as a setting for the play. The apples were replaced by round objects such as shiny red balls. In a later tradition, the wafers were replaced by cookies of various shapes. Candles, too, were often added as the symbol of Christ. Like the Christmas crib, the Paradise tree was later placed in homes.
