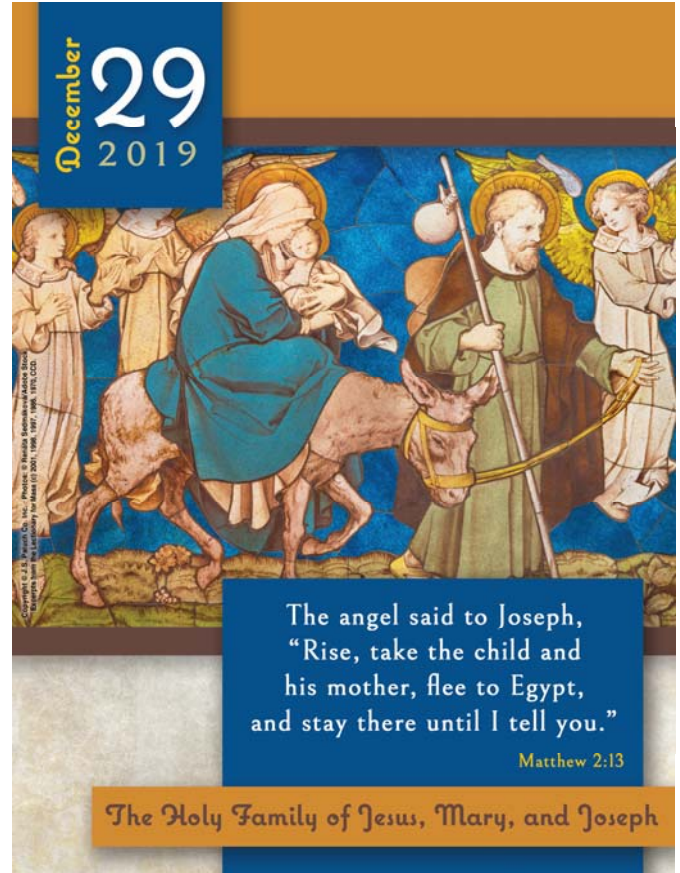

Loving Obedience

One theme common to all three readings today is obedience. Sirach commends the son who obeys his father. St. Paul tells children to obey their parents "in everything." And the Gospel shows Joseph obedient to the warnings of the angel. Yet all three put obedience in terms of a larger relationship.

Sirach says that obedience is part of what makes a happy family. As we saw last Sunday, it shows trust in the one who is obeyed. Children trust that their parents have good reason for telling them to do something. Children also learn both discipline and how to contribute to family life. Spouses trust each other not to ask them to do something harmful. Obedience is also a sign of respect for an older family

member. Americans tend to look at older people as if they were useless, but Sirach reminds us of the wisdom they can share with us.

St. Paul continues this theme in the second reading. He shows how love of Christ transforms a family. When he talks about wives being subordinate and husbands loving them, he means that husbands and wives should defer to each other and love each other. Children and parents have duties to each other: Children are to obey parents and parents are to be reasonable ("do not provoke") and loving.

Parents might look at the Gospel for support in encouraging obedience. Joseph obeyed the messages from the angel and saved the life of the infant Jesus. So families can learn that stress-

ing obedience can protect the child as well as teach. Parents can also remind children that God asks for obedience for our good, not on a whim. When we obey God's law, we learn to trust God more deeply and to appreciate that God's law enables us to live more freely. As children we think that rules restrict us, but as we mature, we learn that we are more restricted by our misguided desires and beliefs. We learn to adjust those desires to be in line with God's plan for us. We grow by replacing misguided beliefs (i.e., that material things bring true happiness, that revenge is sweet, etc.) with faith in a loving God who wants the best for us and who doesn't magically take away our sufferings, but supports us through them.

Feast of the Epiphany—Year A

Early Christians followed Jewish custom of believing that the patriarchs died on the day they were born. March 25 was Pascha; therefore nine months later was Christmas. Early Church Fathers attest to this reckoning. But in the East, the Church believed that Pascha (and therefore the conception of Jesus) was on April 6; therefore the birth date was January 6. Sometime around the Fourth Century, East and West exchanged feasts. Thus came about the "twelve days of Christmas." Epiphany in the West still celebrated the three events, but Germanic and Latin countries concentrated on the coming of the Magi. In those parts of the world, the feast is still called "Three Kings."

Following the three kings, the Little Drummer Boy did not have much to offer the Lord. But he did what he could. He played his drum. What gift do I return to the Lord? Lord, what do you want me to do with all the gifts you have given me?

Scheduling Mass Intentions

Having a Mass said for the needs of a special person, for a special request, remembering the deceased (especially on the anniversary of their death), or in thanksgiving has a long history in the Catholic Church. The Church considers the Mass as the greatest possible prayer of intercession insofar as it is the perfect offering of Christ to the Father by making present the paschal mystery of his death and resurrection.

Because of the particular role of the priest as mediator between God and man, acting "in persona Christi" when offering the holy sacrifice of the Mass, it is usually considered that special graces may be obtained when he applies the Mass to a particular intention.

It's easy to schedule a Mass intention for a relative, friend or loved one—simply call the church office, send a note, put a request in the collection basket, make the request at the Information Station, or send us an email. Fr. Tom mentions the intention for the day during the Prayers of the Faithful at every Mass.

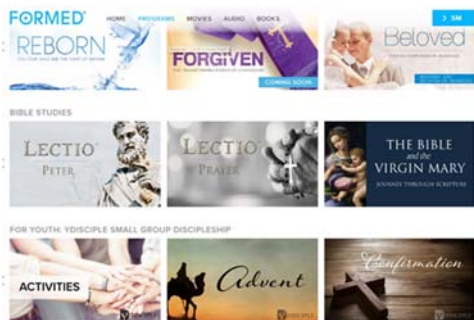

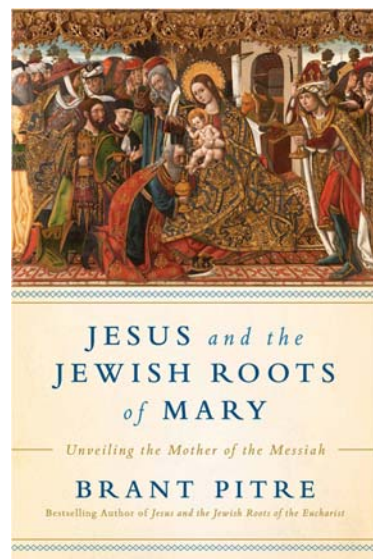

PSR Corner

We resume PSR classes here at the parish. Parents, please keep on top of the students and their online work, as often the beginning of the year (which is the halfway point of the school year) this tends to drop off a little. Here's a practical plan for staying on top of things that one family is doing: Sunday afternoon is the time set for "Faith and Life." The father takes the text and reviews it with the child, either reading it directly or offering a summary, and then having fun quizzing or speaking about it. On Monday, the mother makes sure the child has their online homework done and is ready to go for class on Wednesday. On Wednesday, the catechist reviews the lesson and builds upon it using the acronym PALMS (Prayer, Activity, Lesson, Media, Scripture). This 1-2-3 combo isn't a guarantee of success, but if utilized well, can be a good step towards the goal of each year, growing in faith and mastering the content covered for each grade level.
