# Deeper Understanding of Scripture

The Church, as a voice of the Gospel, proclaims the sacredness of all human life. Everyone created by God is fashioned in God's image and has Divine DNA at the center of their soul. God never leaves what God creates but always remains intimately bound to what he has given form. Everyone has a place and because they have received the gift of Divine Blessing, nobody deserves to feel inferior, unworthy, unwanted, unclean or marginalized. Even the most broken of souls has a place. We, the Body of Christ, have the privilege and responsibility to give voice to the voiceless. The cries of the little one in his or her mother's womb are just as sacred as the cries of one who is homeless and hungry. The migrant deserves our attention as much as the forgotten elderly and even the prisoner, with a heart hardened by anger and resentment, deserves respect and dignity.

The Gospel of Life is often hard to swallow, and we would rather keep those we consider unclean, different or unfixable in a place by themselves. It is hard to see them with us, but they deserve to be. There is far too much violence in this world and the result of that violence is the assault on human life. Many are forced to leave the place they call home in search of safer ground, finding few if any along the way who will help them. How different today's Gospel story would be if Jesus gave in to what was politically correct at that time. The leper would have been turned away and a soul, already beaten down by disease and fear, would have experienced an even deeper wound. Jesus wouldn't have captured much attention from anyone. nor would he have mirrored the Father's compassion and love.

Where do we stand with all of this? Do we at least understand that God's vision is often in conflict with the vision put forth in our world and even the one we advance ourselves? There is no doubt that it is incredibly challenging to find a place for everyone at the table. This challenge is compounded when the systems of operation and structure that are so ingrained in us affirm power and privilege rather than inclusivity and justice. Everything really goes askew when the powerful begin to control who is entitled to wholeness and inclusion, and greed becomes a driving force. Prejudice and entitlement raise their ugly heads and we find ourselves with quite a mess. It's time to admit that things have been a mess for a very long time. The mess needs to be healed, not by erasing it but by allowing God to touch it and make it whole. We need to bring God back to the center of life where God belongs. There are no easy solutions to the world's dilemmas. But, knowing that wholeness, healing, and dignity are worthy pursuits, we can more confidently labor to achieve God's vision.

## Lenten Habits

Dear Parishioners,

This coming Wednesday we begin our annual Lenten preparation for Easter. There are a number of things I want to make you aware of as we enter this new liturgical season. Many of these are just a personal choice and are not mandated by the Church, but rather chosen by me as a way of enhancing our celebration of the season.

**Simple Entrance:** Since my early days as a priest I have liked the idea of processing into church by the sound of a simple chime or bell. My hope was that it would provide a more reflective state of mind as we enter the liturgy.

**Confiteor:** This form of the penitential rite can be done anytime, but it is especially fitting for Lent as we examine our sins in preparation for receiving the Lord. The penitential rite itself does not forgive sin, but rather calls to mind that we can approach God with confidence because He is merciful.

**Apostle's Creed**: During Lent we have the option to say the Apostle's Creed instead of the Nicene Creed. While the Apostle's Creed is older than the Nicene Creed it is not as complete in its explanation of the theological elements professed in a creed.

**Eucharistic Prayers for Reconciliation**: The last few Lent's I have made it a point to pray these Eucharistic Prayers as part of our celebration. They tend to emphasize the themes of mercy and reconciliation.

**Sacrament of Reconciliation**: During the Lenten season I will be offering additional times to celebrate the Sacrament. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday I will be in my Confessional from 7:00pm until 8:30pm or until the last confession is heard. Please know that if you have some hesitation about celebrating the Sacrament, I am more than happy to walk you through the Sacrament. Nobody wants you to be reconciled to God more than He does.

**Stations of the Cross**: While not part of Mass, the Stations invite us to reflect upon the last hours of Our Lord's life. This year we have a few different varieties to experience. Hopefully I can talk with the Deacons and will be able to let you know what version we are praying on a given Friday of Lent.



Pope Francis Declared a "Year of St. Joseph" from December 8, 2020 - December 8, 2021 with His Apostolic Letter Patris Corde "A Father's Heart." It is the occasion of the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Proclamation of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church by Pius IX. Every day for 40 years, Pope Francis has challenged St Joseph. After saying Morning Prayer, Pope Francis writes in Patris

*corde*, he recites a nineteenth century prayer from a French prayerbook. Through this prayer, the Pope entrusts both "serious and troubling situations" to St Joseph. The prayer ends thus: "Let it not be said that I invoked you in vain".



# Year of St. Joseph 33-day Consecration starts this week

All those who have obtained the "Consecration to St. Joseph" book by Fr. Don Calloway and have given us their email should have been contacted by someone here in the office or in the parish about a "game plan." We have been trying to set up various groups, whether in person or virtual. We are also encouraging folks, whether they want to be a part of a group or not, to still join along with many people throughout the world (not just in the parish) in making this 33 day consecration to St. Joseph.



The reason we are beginning on February 15<sup>th</sup> is because 33 days later it is March 19<sup>th</sup>, the Feast of St. Joseph. There is no rigid formula here, however. If you'd like to be a part of this local, worldwide movement, here at the parish and beyond, please let us know.

# Archdiocesan Lenten Regulations

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him."

### (John 3:16-17)

The Church has always helped us fulfill these words of Jesus by prescribing very definite penance for all Catholics, so that we too might have Eternal life. Accordingly, the Pope and the American Bishops have outlined obligatory fast and abstinence as follows:

Ash Wednesday (February 17), all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday (April 2) are days of *abstinence* (refraining from meat) for all Catholics *from age 14 onwards*. On these two days, *fast*, as well as *abstinence* is also obligatory for those *from the ages of 18-59.* Abstinence means refraining from meat. Fast means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals (liquids are permitted). No Catholic will lightly excuse himself or herself from this obligation.

We should strive to make all days of Lent a time of prayer and penance. Following are several resources that can aid in finding different forms of prayer and penance.



It's easy to schedule a Mass intention for a relative, friend or loved one—simply call the church office, send a note, put a request in the collection basket, or send us an email. Fr. Tom mentions the intention for the day during the Prayers of the Faithful at every Mass.
