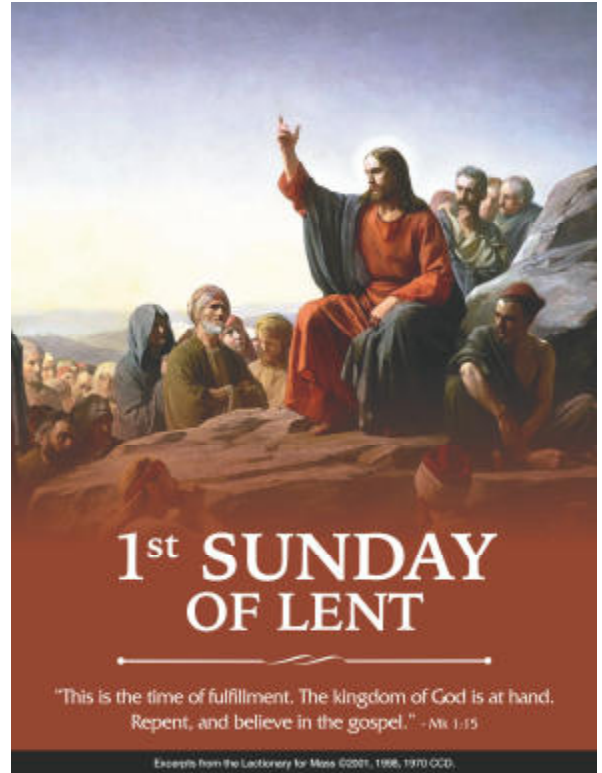

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

The Church, as a voice of the Gospel, proclaims the sacredness of all human life. Everyone created by God is fashioned in God's image and has Divine DNA at the center of their soul. God never leaves what God creates but always remains intimately bound to what he has given form. Everyone has a place and because they have received the gift of Divine Blessing, nobody deserves to feel inferior, unworthy, unwanted, unclean or marginalized. Even the most broken of souls has a place. We, the Body of Christ, have the privilege and responsibility to give voice to the voiceless. The cries of the little one in his or her mother's womb are just as sacred as the cries of one who is homeless and hungry. The migrant deserves our attention as much as the forgotten elderly and even the prisoner, with a heart hardened by anger and resentment, deserves respect and dignity.

The Gospel of Life is often hard to swallow, and we would rather keep those we con-

sider unclean, different or unfixable in a place by themselves. It is hard to see them with us, but they deserve to be. There is far too much violence in this world and the result of that violence is the assault on human life. Many are forced to leave the place they call home in search of safer ground, finding few if any along the way who will help them. How different today's Gospel story would be if Jesus gave in to what was politically correct at that time. The leper would have been turned away and a soul, already beaten down by disease and fear, would have experienced an even deeper wound. Jesus wouldn't have captured much attention from anyone, nor would he have mirrored the Father's compassion and love.

Where do we stand with all of this? Do we at least understand that God's vision is often in conflict with the vision put forth in our world and even the one we advance ourselves? There is no doubt that it is incredibly

challenging to find a place for everyone at the table. This challenge is compounded when the systems of operation and structure that are so ingrained in us affirm power and privilege rather than inclusivity and justice. Everything really goes askew when the powerful begin to control who is entitled to wholeness and inclusion, and greed becomes a driving force. Prejudice and entitlement raise their ugly heads and we find ourselves with quite a mess. It's time to admit that things have been a mess for a very long time. The mess needs to be healed, not by erasing it but by allowing God to touch it and make it whole. We need to bring God back to the center of life where God belongs. There are no easy solutions to the world's dilemmas. But, knowing that wholeness, healing, and dignity are worthy pursuits, we can more confidently labor to achieve God's vision.

Campaign of Christian Service

Dear Parishioners:

As we enter into Lent the Church urges us to make it a season of service and sacrifice for God and neighbor. All of our Lenten disciplines should free us to love God and neighbor with greater joy and zeal. May our fasting and abstinence increase our hunger for God. May our prayer challenge and encourage us to seek God always. May our almsgiving make us more aware of God's bountiful blessings to us. These common Lenten disciplines are meant to make God the center of our lives and the focal point of our desires. They are to deepen our love of neighbor and ourselves.

Any Lenten practices that make us less patient, more irritable, and more prone to a general "Lenten crabbiness" are dumb and pointless. The readings on Ash Wednesday invite us to do such Lenten disciplines with an attitude of humility and gratitude. Spiritual exercises, privations of diet or leisure ought to discernably make us more generous and charitable in our daily interactions with our neighbors. If not, we are better off dispensing with them and finding something else to do for Lent. If you do nothing extra or deny yourself nothing during Lent, expect to find even less at Easter.

One of the greatest things about being Catholic is the immense spiritual treasury that lies under our proverbial feet. In a world that is constantly inviting us to embrace the new and rush blindly onto the "next big thing" the Church humbly beckons us to pause, discern and receive from Her vast treasury of teaching and spirituality. Here is a prayer that I



shared a few years ago and its worth repeating as we enter into this holy season.

Dear Lord, we are now in the holy season of Lent. We begin to realize anew that these are the days of salvation, these are the acceptable days. We know that we are all sinners. We know that in many things we have all offended Your infinite majesty. We know that sin destroys Your life in us as a drought withers the leaves and chokes the life from the land, leaving an arid, dusty desert. Help us now, Lord, in our feeble attempts to make up for past sin. Bless our efforts with the rich blessing of Your grace. Make us realize ever more our need of penance and of mortification. Help us to see, in our ordinary difficulties and duties, in the trials and temptations of every day, the best opportunity of making up for past infidelities. Every day we are so often reminded in field and wood, in sky and stream, of Your own boundless generosity to us. Help us to realize that You are never outdone in generosity, and that the least thing we do for You will be rewarded, full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and flowing over. Then we shall see, in our own souls, how the desert can blossom, and the dry and wasted land can bring forth the rich, useful fruit that was expected of it from the beginning. Amen.

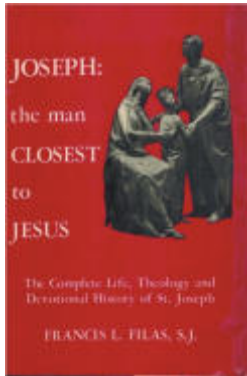

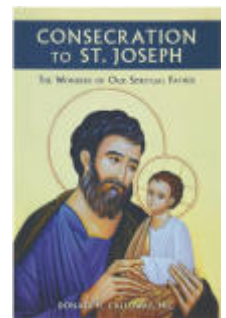
Located in St. Joseph Chapel: Year of St. Joseph



Never before has all this wealth of intensely interesting and little known facts about St. Joseph been compiled into a single book. This can truly be called a little Summa of St. Joseph, as the only survey existing in any language of the complete life, theology, and devotional history of St. Joseph. Four previous books of Father Filas are the basis for the present Joseph: The Man Closest to Jesus. The fifth section takes up the topic of Joseph's dignity, holiness, supernatural privileges, patronage, and possible advancement in the liturgy. The concluding section surveys the complete history of the devotion to St. Joseph, from the earliest years of the Church to the present, and quotes (with accompanying commentary) all modern papal pronouncements concerning St. Joseph. An appendix offers a new translation of all indulgences and other new prayers honoring St. Joseph. Fully indexed for handy reference.

Drawing on the wealth of the Church's living tradition, Fr. Donald Calloway, MIC, calls on all of us to turn to St. Joseph, entrust ourselves, our Church, and our world to our spiritual father's loving care, and then watch for wonders when the Universal Patron of the Church opens the floodgates of Heaven to pour out graces into our lives today. Definitely a book for our time, Consecration to St. Joseph is dedicated to meeting the challenges of the present moment and restoring order to our Church and our world, all through the potent paternal intercession and care of St. Joseph. This book has everything you need to take your love and devotion to St. Joseph to a whole different level: the first comprehensive 33-day program of consecration to St. Joseph; information on the 10 wonders of St. Joseph; and prayers and devotions to St. Joseph. Accessible, motivating, this book will kick off a great movement of consecration to our spiritual father and change the world.

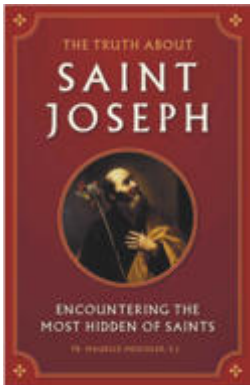

Year of St. Joseph



Pope Francis declared a Year of St. Joseph through December 8th 2021 on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being proclaimed as Patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX in 1870. Throughout this special year we will include various insights, past and present about St. Joseph.

In *Patris Corde* (With a Father's Heart) Pope Francis stated his desire to speak about Joseph increased during the pandemic when he saw **all the hidden, unnoticed people** who were helping in this time of crisis. "My desire to do so increased during these months of pandemic, when we experienced, amid the crisis, how "our lives are woven together and sustained by ordinary people, people often overlooked. People who do not appear in newspaper and magazine headlines, or on the latest television show, yet in these very days are surely shaping the decisive events of our history. Doctors, nurses, storekeepers and supermarket workers, cleaning personnel, caregivers, transport workers, men and women working to provide essential services and public safety, volunteers, priests, men and women religious, and so very many others."

How many fathers, mothers, grandparents and teachers are showing our children, in small everyday ways, how to accept and deal with a crisis by adjusting their routines, looking ahead and encouraging the practice of prayer. How many are praying, making sacrifices and interceding for the good of all". Each of us can discover in Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. **Saint Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation.**

St. Joseph might be said to be the "hidden member" of the Holy Family, just as the Holy Spirit has been called the hidden member of the Holy Trinity. They are the ones "behind the scenes" if you will. In recent times in the history of the Church, however, really only in the last 150 years, we see the Polaroid Picture (speaking of photos) of the Holy Family developing, and in particular, we see the earthly father of Jesus, St. Joseph, coming into clearer focus.



It seems as if in our day the Lord wants to direct our heart, families, parishes, dioceses and Church to St. Joseph in a major way. This action of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church has been gaining momentum for a very long time.


