

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

If I only knew then what I know now, how different life would be. This sentiment, expressed in myriad ways, is found on every human being's lips at one point or another. Life may have brought us to a vulnerable place where we see some of the poor choices we made and the effects they are having. Perhaps we fell into some destructive and dysfunctional relationships or behaviors and are finding how they held us captive. Our zeal and passion for life may have drifted away and we are waking up to the reasons apathy has taken hold. Life can be hard. In fact, some would describe their lives as a drudgery. They walk through each day with an anxious unsettledness, wondering when their restlessness will cease. There is a temptation to believe that what I see is all I will get. Mortality and hopelessness await the dawn. If I could only have known what would come in the future. I could have made better choices and avoided all of this misery!

Really? While we can certainly give into weakness, sin, impulsiveness, and idiosyncrasies that cause us to stumble over ourselves, life is really a journey. If we don't make the mistake of wallowing in the mire of self-pity and realize the new life God is calling us to, then there are thrills, adventures, surprises, and soulsearching graces we can surely miss. We are not tethered to our past nor are we bound to the ills life can bring upon us. We are never hopeless or helpless. The problem is that our myopic vision only allows us to see the misery and misfortune that is before us, not the potential that can come from choosing healthier and more life-giving options. Jesus came that we might have fullness of life. We need to learn how to reach for Jesus' hand and let him help us to our feet.

We need to allow God into our pain and heal our past. We have to wrestle with our histories,

agonize and search and cry out for the Divine healing we need to restore our faith, hope, and love. Job could not see how his story would end or trust the guidance of the God who called him. We live in that same blindness and suffer from the same lack of confidence. Once we allow ourselves to be touched by God's healing power, we begin to see that all of the pieces of our lives are necessary parts of a greater whole. Along the way of our lives, God uses our omissions and failures to create new things and possibilities. When doors close, others open and we can be amazed by the joyful and unexpected surprises we receive. Once we know the power of God's creative, healing, lifegiving, forgiving, and dynamic presence, it is no wonder we want to put ourselves at the service of others and show them what life can be.

Take 48 A reprint from happier times in 2019

Dear Parishioners,

Take 48 is not a confession of age, a secret code or a new diet plan. 48 has become a sort of symbol for me of the needed patience that is in short supply these days. As I mentioned in a recent homily, the greatest aggravation many people face on a regular basis is the experience of inconvenience. Not that our lives are plagued with inconvenience, but rather that we come to expect things to be convenient, fast and efficient. We are so blessed in our daily lives, we can forget that life is actually difficult and demanding.

People who experience profound illness know that life is demanding. Those struggling with mental or emotional illness know the struggle. Any who have had periods of unemployment or financial trials don't take the convenience of life as a given. Those who have vocations of service and sacrifice know that life is demanding. But I suspect if we are not in the midst of our own trial, we become very accustomed to things go smoothly. Because of technology, we expect that things not only go smoothly, but quickly.

While technology can move at an incredibly fast pace, our thoughts and feelings are not designed to move at such a pace if one wants to exercise patience. Our 24 hours news cycle creates further demands for immediate information and snap decisions. It is difficult to keep things fresh when they are repeated endlessly. All of this contributes to an atmosphere of impatience that effects our daily lives and adds more stress to our relationships. There are no short cuts for growing in patience, it is something that only increases by it use.

Take 48 is a short aid for trying to interject more patience into daily life. I can't say that I practice it well, but I try to become more conscious of it.

- * Take 48 seconds to wait to respond while in a conversation
- * Take 48 minutes to return to a difficult conversation or situation
- Take 48 hours to process news be it TV, internet or face to face
- * Take 48 days to discern major changes in life.

Obviously I could have picked a different number, but 48 hours is where it all began for me and what I decided to use. The key is practicing patience in that time, be it seconds, minutes, hours or days. We will be happier with more patience in our lives and those around us will be happier as well.

Pope Francis Declared a "Year of St. Joseph" from December 8, 2020 – December 8, 2021 with His Apostolic Letter *Patris Corde* "A Father's Heart." It is the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the Proclamation of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church by Pius IX. Every day for 40 years, Pope Francis has challenged St Joseph. After saying Morning Prayer, Pope Francis writes in <u>Patris</u> corde, he recites a nineteenth century

prayer from a French prayerbook. Through this prayer, the Pope entrusts both "serious and troubling situations" to St Joseph. The prayer ends thus: "Let it not be said that I invoked you in vain".





Attention Employees & Volunteers

The Archdiocese of St. Louis has developed a new system for safe environment compliance called <u>Prevent and Protect STL</u>. Everyone ministering to minors and vulnerable adults (clergy, employees and volunteers) in the Archdiocese are required and asked to register in the new system before December 31, 2020. This includes those new to service and those who are currently in service. For those who have already attended a Protecting God's Children workshop, your previous training date will transfer to this new system. In addition to attending a live Protecting God's Children workshop, all clergy, volunteers and employees will register for an updated background screening, view two new online training modules on abuse reporting and the Code of Ethical Conduct, and agree to the updated Code of Ethical Conduct.
