Behold the lamb of God

I wonder if anyone understood John the Baptist when he called Jesus the Lamb of God. Did they associate that name with the paschal lamb whose blood protected the Israelites from the Angel of Death? After Jesus' death and resurrection, the apostles began to understand that Jesus' blood, shed on the cross, freed us all from sin and death. Yet here is the Baptizer already acting like a disciple before Jesus has gathered any disciples or even begun to preach. In today's Gospel, John the Baptist gives us some hints about discipleship.

First, John trusts God with things he does not understand. He says twice that he did not know Jesus, yet he trusts God's revelation that Jesus would "baptize with the Holy Spirit" (John 1:33). We also may not always understand where God is leading us. If you have lost a loved one, are looking for work when no one is hiring, or are dealing with serious illness, this is the time to trust that God still loves and cares for you.

John also knew that doing God's work meant that God was working through him. Originally John baptized others as sign of repentance, but he soon came to see that his real work was to make Jesus "known to Israel" (John 1:31). When we try to do what God wants, it is good to remember that God is the one in control and who decides what the result will be. What looks like failure to us can be success in God's eyes.

John's third hint teaches us that a disciple shares his or her faith in God. So John testifies that Jesus is the Son of God. While that sounds obvious to us, it took courage to say that to people who would have thought it blasphemy. Even today, when Jesus is known throughout the world, we still need to share our faith experiences so those without faith may be attracted to it, and even those with faith can be encouraged by our sharing. You may be surprised to find that your own faith deepens the more you share it with others. As we point out the Lamb of God to those who don't know him, we get to know him better ourselves.

Year of Vizion: Clarity of Thought Rezignation or Acceptance

Dear Parishioners,

During this Year of Vision I want to invite you to consider some distinctions that can make a real difference in our understanding of faith and life. To discern the difference it is essential to maintain an attitude that is Christ-like instead of letting the spirit of the world oppress us.

Resignation and acceptance look very similar at the beginning. Something dramatic or traumatic happens to us and we typically respond with either resignation or acceptance.

When we become resigned to a situation we often see it as something that is so certain that we are doomed. We feel the weight of the problem as well as a sense of hopelessness. The spirit of resignation overshadows our thoughts and feelings to such a degree that we often become depressed. The fruit of resignation is despair. We cannot escape our situation, it will never get better and nothing good will come of it. This is truly unfortunate and it is a dire state of mind.

Acceptance begins exactly the same as resignation. Something dramatic or traumatic has happened and we feel the weight of the situation. The situation can be dire and seemingly hopeless. The first reactions can be identical to resignation, but at some point in our reacting, we turn to God and pray for His help and grace. We often pray for deliverance and strength to face the situation. There is nothing wrong with praying for deliverance, and yet we don't want to limit God to only a path of deliverance. We want the Lord to open our hearts and give Him freedom to act. The opening of our hearts to God can allow the Holy Spirit to guide us to acceptance.

The fruit of acceptance is trust. Acceptance does not sugar-coat the situation or pretend that things are going to be resolved in a way ideally pleasing to us. Acceptance gives God the freedom to act in a way that He sees as fitting and we believe that God will bring good out of any situation. God is waiting to surprise us with the power of His grace and the peace that He alone can give. This is not a situation of ignoring the circumstances that affect our life, but rather an expression of faith in the hidden and humble movements of God.

Our spiritual growth is two-fold. We have to overcome our sinfulness as part of our on-going battle for holiness. The other part of our spiritual growth is to trust God in all circumstances. God promises to be with us in all things, not to spare us of any trials in life. We possess faith so that we can weather the proverbial storms rather than being spared of them. We possess faith so that we can see the bigger picture of reality rather than being overwhelmed by the limitations of our current circumstances.

[One day John the Baptist was talking with some people. Seeing Jesus in the distance, he said,] "There is the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! This is the one I was talking about." John 1:29

John the Baptist touched people's hearts for two reasons: he helped them to see they were sinners who needed a savior; and he helped them to open their hearts to Jesus, who came to save them. This raises two questions for me. To what extent do I see myself as a sinner who needs a savior? And to what extent am I opening my heart to Jesus, who came to save me?

Many people do not recognize Christ because they do not recognize themselves as sinners. If I am not a sinner, I have no need of Christ. I won't celebrate the mystery of Christ in joy if I don't realize in sorrow that I am a sinner who needs a savior. The focus, however is not on sin, but on Christ who saves. —Killian McDonnell

COMMON GROUND: What Protestants and Catholics Can Learn From Each Other. In January we mark a time of Prayer for Christian Unity. *Here is a DVD that helps build some Common Ground.* Pastor Steve Andrews is the founding pastor of Kensington Community Church in Troy, Michigan. Kensington is a large, nondenominational, evangelical-Protestant church modeled after the successful Willow Creek Church near Chicago. Several years ago, some Kensington members who had left the Catholic Church to become Protestants were giving Catholicism a bad rap. Pastor Andrews thought there was a need to set the record straight, since he and other leaders considered Catholicism to be a significant part of Christianity. This DVD presents Pastor Andrews' interview of Father John Riccardo, pastor of nearby Saint Anastasia Catholic Church. The interview took place at St. Anastasia's sanctu-

ary, just in front of the tabernacle containing the Blessed Sacrament. Father Riccardo does an excellent job explaining Catholic beliefs and practices in a way that non-Catholics can understand. If you're looking for a video that you can share with non-Catholic friends who might be interested in learning what Catholics believe, this is an excellent resource.

(From a review on Amazon.com) As someone who has studied theology for a number of years and been exposed to every screwball theology out there, I found this book to be a corrective lens to refocus and correct my vision of who Jesus is and what following him means. What impresses me (and I'm not easily impressed) is that the Pope takes on the "screwball" (my term, not his) theologies in such a way as to making them seem silly (although he is incredibly charitable in his approach). This book will have a great effect on renewing the Church and centering it on an image of Christ that is Biblical and credible, erasing years of poor and faulty preaching and teaching.



If you are not Catholic, but a Christian you will love this book too. In fact I predict you will become a big fan of Joseph Ratzinger and will want to read his many published works to encounter someone rooted in Scripture and conversant with modern attacks on it. If you are a non Christian I think you will find in the book an excellent introduction to what Christians believe about the God-man from Nazareth. To all you parents out there who sent your kids to Catholic schools and now wish they would practice their faith, give them this book and reintroduce them to Jesus of Nazareth.

For easy recall, notes from the CD have been put in a memory aid called **P.I.E.S** (fitting for a New Year's Resolution don't you think?)

P=Physical: Exercise once a week every week for the entire year. You decide what the exercise is.

I = Intellectual: Read a good book for at least 10 minutes every day. Books are our friends. Consider the works of Dr. Peter Kreeft as a guide.

E = Emotional: Spend carefree timelessness with the most significant person in your life once a month. Plan it, schedule it. Do it.

S = **Spiritual**: Enter into the classroom of silence. When you go to Mass each Sunday, ask God to show you one word, one way in this Mass how to become a better version of yourself. Write this down.
