

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It was a normal day by all accounts, but John just wasn't feeling himself. He was a little lightheaded and out of sorts. Later in the afternoon, he experienced a sharp pain in his chest and arm. Quick thinking and action brought John to the emergency department with a diagnosis of a significant heart attack. Surviving this ordeal, he found himself face to face with his cardiologist, having an honest conversation about things that needed to change. "I came close to death," John found himself thinking. Then came the remorse. He was a young man with a loving wife and children who were very close to facing life without him. John found himself with intense sorrow for living an unchecked and self-indulgent life that almost brought him to his demise. He wanted to change.

We all have our wake-up calls. We have experiences and encounters that force us to really think twice about choices we have made and directions we have taken. Often, we find ourselves looking at those we have hurt square in the eye and wallowing in our foolishness. We regrettably realize that we have allowed our needs to lure us into making some cruel mistakes. We impulsively say things and flippantly do things that reveal our unredeemed and unhealed self. It is a self we stumble over and try to tame but can't quite seem to master and control. Help!

We spin our wheels, naively thinking that we will somehow, perhaps through persistence, get ourselves unstuck. But, we don't. We just get out of the car, feeling very helpless, and ignorantly look at the mess we got ourselves into. Did we ever

think to ask someone for help? Or, taken the advice of One who is wiser and avoid this route altogether? "Come after me," are words that Jesus says to all of us. In order to heed his invitation, we must leave our ego-self behind and follow.

When we really see and understand the freedom, peace, justice, and love he offers, we find ourselves with such sorrow in our hearts for how foolish and silly we have been. All the misguided choices and sinful actions come full view and we see how risky our random impassioned behaviors really have been. Repentance is beautiful. When done with a sincere and contrite heart, it directs us to the glory that can be ours, ignites us with the challenge of living a life in service of others and reminds us that all is well.

Social Media

Dear Parishioners,

I have been aware and engaged with the internet since the early 1990's. A friend and classmate of mine was very tech oriented and gifted. My first experience of on-line discussion was the forums and bulletin boards that universities would create for various classes or communities. I was always on the sidelines, more of a spectator than a participant.

All that changed in 1995 when I joined AOL and started exploring their services. The main reason to join was e-mail and instant messaging to chat with my friends from high school that were still in my life. Much to my surprise were the chatrooms, which were the first real experience of social media for me. It was amazing to chat with people all over the nation and all over the world.

Chatrooms were an opportunity to connect with people you knew in real life as well as people you may never meet in real life but came to know through these conversations. The semi-anonymous nature of screennames exposed people's attitudes real quick. Someone people came in with good attitudes and behaviors, others became trolls. Trolls only come to disrupt, to argue and often to attack others. Some fragile souls I knew were marred by the "jerk-baggery" of their fellow visitors to AOL. I was pretty active on AOL from 1995 until 2003.

In 2003 various other "Social Medias" came into my life, MySpace, Facebook and Twitter. MySpace was a flash in the pan, and Facebook became my main experience of social media. I was on Facebook until 2016 and then returned after a break of a year or so. Since returning I have had mixed feeling about Facebook and its use of data, what it advocates and censors. It has the right and freedom to manage its platform as it sees fit. I'm still on Facebook and Twitter, but those are not places of engagement for me anymore.

If you want to ever connect with me on-line, I have started a community on Locals. I will provide the link at the bottom. Locals has a format similar to Facebook without all the adds, management of data and promotion or censorship of things that matter or don't matter to me. My Locals community is free at the moment, but may be subject to a monthly fee. If that comes to pass, I will make it as minimum as possible and any proceeds will go to the Vincent de Paul Society or some other charity. I am not there for additional income, but rather other opportunities to connect with parishioners, neighbors and anyone who might wander onto the community.





Year of St. Joseph

Pope Francis Declared a "Year of St. Joseph" from December 8, 2020 – December 8, 2021 with His Apostolic Letter *Patris Corde* "A Father's Heart." It is the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the Proclamation of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church by Pius IX.

St. Joseph Oil and Brother Andre



An ordinary Brother of Holy Cross, Saint André Bessette (Feast Day January 6th) spent most of his life answering the door for his religious community. Through his extraordinary devotion to Saint Joseph and his prayers for those in need, thousands of people were miraculously healed and helped.

Inspired by God to build the Oratory of Saint Joseph, Brother André Bessette is beloved in his native Canada and beyond. Saint André Bessette was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI in October 2010.

Brother Andre was inspired by a devotion that he heard was already being practiced in France. He took a bit of oil from a lamp that was burning in front of a statue of Saint Joseph. He offered it to sick people telling them to rub it on their aching body and to pray to Saint Joseph for relief. There were an estimated 10,000 people cured during his lifetime. This Canadian saint is one of the greatest conduits of healing the Church has ever seen.



Saint Joseph Oil is not a treatment. Nor is it a preparation with curative powers, to say nothing of a magical practice. It must be viewed as a gesture of faith. This tradition continues today at Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal. A basin containing ordinary vegetable oil is fixed in

front of a statue of Saint Joseph, and a wick, floating on the surface, burns night and day as a kind of perpetual votive lamp. The oil is then put in bottles and made available to pilgrims.

There are bottles of oil from the actual shrine in St. Joseph's chapel and in the office. You are welcome to stop by and bless yourself with the oil in faith, taking Andre's advice to Go to Joseph.

Question:

Why do Catholics genuflect?

Answer:

Genuflection is an act of devotion that literally means "to bend the knee." For many Catholics, it's an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection.

The practice of "bending the knee" is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. It has been said that the practice dates back to the time of Alexander the Great, but it became a common part of etiquette in the royal courts of the Middle Ages. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians, who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist.

Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during Eucharistic Adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel that we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. In churches or chapels in which the tabernacle is in a separate space, we are invited to simply bow toward the altar.

In addition to genuflecting before the Blessed Sacrament, we are also instructed to genuflect before the cross used for veneration on Good Friday (during the solemn celebrations of the Lord's Passion) and any time a relic of the True Cross is displayed for veneration. This long-standing tradition is a way of honoring the cross as the great sign of our salvation and of showing devotion to the passion of Jesus.


