

Rejoicing in the Lord

In the first reading, Ezra gets a strange reaction from the people to whom he reads the book of the law. First they lie down, with faces to the ground, and then they all are weeping. Remember the background of this reading. The people of Israel had returned from exile and needed to become a unified nation. Most had never heard the laws, so when they learned what was expected of them and realized how much of the Law they had broken, they wept from shame. Many probably didn't know that they had been breaking the law. Others might have been overwhelmed with all the requirements of the law.

Ezra and Nehemiah console the people by reminding them that their return makes this a day "holy to the LORD" (Nehemiah 8:10). He adds that they would draw strength from "rejoicing in the LORD." That may be good advice for us also.

We might find ourselves so trapped in sin that we think we could never be forgiven. We need to remember that Jesus loved sinners so much that he gave his life on the cross to free us from sin. No sin can be so bad that God's love cannot forgive it. In other words, God's forgiveness is only limited by our failure to ask for it. As the psalms say, God's mercy endures forever. In fact, the more I have to repent, the more God wants to forgive. So we can rejoice in the Lord's forgiveness and the Spirit will give us the strength to change our lives.

And what about those who find the law overwhelming? That usually means a lack of faith in God's willingness to help us or in our ability to do the best we can to live as Christians. It can also be because we have forgotten Jesus' saying that all of God's laws are contained in the command to love God and love our neighbor as we love ourselves. The more we come to accept God's presence in our lives and see God in others, the easier it becomes to keep the law of love.

What's at the root of every other value we hold dear?

We can discover it in ourselves and see it in others, but we can't grant it or take it away.

From an ethical perspective, things have greater or lesser value to the extent that they contribute to the survival and advancement of human beings, helping them to achieve the peace, harmony, and independence they need and desire.

Consequently, it's essential that the values we pursue in our lives be aligned with the truth about human nature — that is to say, that they be true values. Only true values can lead people to the full development of their natural capacities. We can say that, in the area of morality, a value is true to the extent that it is able to make a person more human.

This is the root of universal values, which are based on the absolute dignity of every human being. It is a dignity that — as can be deduced from its origin — cannot be relativized, and cannot be said to depend on any particular circumstance (sex, age, health, quality of life, etc.).

What is a principle?

In the ethical or moral sense of the term, a principle is a practical judgment immediately derived from the acceptance of a value. From the most basic value (the value of every human life, of every human being), derives the first, fundamental principle on which all others are based: the attitude of respect that every person deserves for the very fact of belonging to the human species — that is to say, human dignity.

Human dignity, a fundamental value

In modern philosophy and contemporary ethics, values and what is good are portrayed as subjective.

Starting with David Hume, there is a current of thought that proposes the idea that it is impossible to derive any kind of duty from the way things are ("you cannot derive an 'ought' from an 'is."). The logical next step is to conclude that values are reducible to our own impressions, reactions, and judgments, thus converting duty into the fruit of our own will and decisions, not any objective criteria.

Juridical positivism of the kind proposed by Austrian jurist Hans Kelson teaches that laws are the result of the will of state authorities,

who determine what is legally permitted — and licit — and what is not.

In the realm of ethics, positivism and empiricism state that "right" and "wrong" are merely irrational decisions, only the result of impressions and reactions — that is to say, entirely emotional. True, the idea of values continues to exist within the philosophical schools of positivism and empiricism, but only as a subjective idea or the object of consensus.

This leads to radical relativism, because for all of these theories, there is no foundation for value in the nature of things, and any point of view can vary from one epoch to another. There's no reliable barrier of values to protect against the arbitrary will of the state and the use of violence.

Nonetheless, our natural openness to others and our knowledge gained through experience allow us to recognize other people's power of intelligence and the greatness of their freedom. Through our intelligence, we are able to transcend ourselves and the world in which we live and of which we form a part; we are able to contemplate ourselves and the world as objects. On the other hand, the human heart has insatiable desires for love and happiness that drive it to give itself — more or less appropriately — to people and enterprises. All of this is an innate part of our very being, and it is always with us, even though at times it is hidden due to illness or lack of awareness.

To summarize: human beings are part of the world, but at the same time we transcend it through our unique capacity — due to our intelligence and freedom — to dominate it, feeling the impulse to action with that goal. Thus, we can accept that the value of every human being is of a higher order than that of all the other beings in the cosmos. And we call that value "human dignity."

The dignity of every human being is a unique value that is easy to recognize. We can discover it in ourselves and we can see it in others. But we cannot grant it, nor can we take it away from someone. It's something that is given to us by a higher power. It is independent of our will, and calls us to respond, recognizing it and accepting it with proportionate gratitude as a supreme value.

He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free the oppressed and announce that the time has come when the Lord will save his people." LUKE 4:16-19

U.S. presidents give an inaugural speech right after being sworn into office. The speech usually provides an insight into what to expect from them. Today's gospel is like such a speech. Jesus has been chosen by the Father for the office of Messiah. Jesus begins by standing up in public and telling us what to expect from him during his messianic ministry.





Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the Life of Christ and the Church. St. Thomas Aguinas: Feast Day: January 28th




Considered the greatest theologian of all time, St. Thomas Aquinas is known for his amazing intellect and the heritage of writings he has left the church. Wedding philosophy and theology in a brilliant synthesis that impacts both heart and mind, his influence is alive and well today, 800 years since his death. Ask any articulate defender, promoter, champion of the faith today and more than likely they would say that it was, is St. Thomas Aquinas whose writings have impacted them in a particular way. One thinks of Bishop Robert Barron. In the Catholicism DVD series section on the Eucharist, Barron recounts the history of Aquinas being asked by the Pope at the time to write the office for the Corpus Christi liturgies following a personally witnessed Eucharistic miracle. Some time after this, Thomas is granted a vision of Christ in which the Lord speaks to him personally. Whether it was this vision or others, Thomas would look upon all his writings as straw compared to such an encounter with the living God. We're thankful that such "straw" was saved by his disciples to hand them on to us today. While one can marvel at such a force for good in the intellectual life of the Church, there is more to make one marvel. Raissa Maritain is quoted in the chapter "Miracles of St. Thomas" in a 2009 book St. Thomas Aquinas for Children and the Childlike (Sophia Press). Recounting a series of miracles associ-

ated with St. Thomas, Maritain speaks of the papal inquiry into such happenings.

In ordering the inquiry upon the virtues and miracles of the great Doctor, Pope John XXII had said, "We believe that Brother Thomas is glorious in heaven, because his life was holy, and his doctrine alone is a miracle." Then, before an

assembly of cardinals, casting from right to left "a look gentle as a ray of sun," he spoke in these terms: "Venerable Brethren, it would be a great glory for us and for the Church if we could inscribe this servant of God among the Saints. Because alone he has done more to enlighten the Church than all the other Doctors put together. And in a single year one may profit more from reading what he has written than by studying for a whole lifetime the other theologians." The inquiry was finished. Numerous miracles had been proven with certainty. The holiness of the life of Brother Thomas Aquinas was attested by many witnesses. The story of his life was written, and the inquiry regarding his miracles was conducted by William de Tocco, who in his youth had known Brother Thomas. Tocco, also, took the testimony of Reginald, the faithful companion of the saint. All was ready. It was for the Sovereign Pontiff to speak. Then, by a long letter, dated July 18, 1323, and addressed to the entire Church (such a letter, prescribing the cult of a new saint, is called a bull of canonization), Pope John XXII proclaimed the sainthood of Brother Thomas Aquinas.
