Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It's all so ordinary that we can easily miss it. The seagulls hunting and diving for mollusks at the beach offer a display of determination and precision as they gather their food for the day. It's simply what these creatures do. Yet, there's a magical artfulness and skill to their work that speaks volumes about the One who breathed life into their being. This is pretty much the way it is with God's presence. God comes in common ways through common things and ordinary people. Sadly, we are too engulfed in our little worlds of order and ideas to notice the beauty and wonder of it all. Many have numbed themselves to the Divine spark at the essence of all life because that's just the way it is. What's so special about it? A sunset is a sunset and a seagull is a seagull. That's precisely what they thought about Jesus, too. After all, isn't he just the carpenter's son? What merit can his words possibly have?

If we're looking for God to come in an event that is so dramatic and intense that it knocks our socks off, then think again. When pondering God's relationship with His people and God's action in our lives, we have to go back to the stable and the recurring, creative, unending power of God's presence. It was a quiet, run of the mill kind of night. There was nothing spectacular or extraordinary. To the naked eye, a woman gave birth to a child and there wasn't anything extraordinary to see. We have a hard time understanding God's ordinary-ness. Jesus grew up in an ordinary town, had neighbors and did normal human things. Perhaps that's why we don't always like the Gospel. It doesn't dazzle us with extraordinary things but simply challenges us to take a different look at our ordinary stuff. That makes us uncomfortable. We prefer things as they are. Our lack of faith can even cause us to take offense at

what Jesus says and does, dismissing it as folly.

God's life-giving presence continues to sustain that seagull in flight and keep all things in being regardless of whether we have the faith to see and understand this. Our personal agendas, preconceived ideas, misconceptions, and expectations can often cause us to be hardened and blinded to what God is doing or desiring to do. While God continues to do what He has done for all eternity, faith is needed for God's presence to bear fruit. The blinders we wear and the expectations we bring to life can often prevent us from seeing graced moments that radiate with God's graceful presence. They also prevent God's transforming, healing, and hope filled vision for our world from being realized. Without faith, God won't be able to do much for us either.

How to calm your soul during a stressful day

Each day can be a challenge, especially if various stressors continue to disturb the peace in our mind and soul. We desire peace, but feel like we are drowning in stress.

St. Francis de Sales provides one key that can help calm our soul throughout the day. He explains in his <u>Introduction to the Devout</u> <u>Life</u> that we can create little moments of recollection, retreating into our soul for a brief moment to recall God's presence.

Strive as often as possible through the day to place yourself in God's Presence by some one of the methods ... The birds have nests in lofty trees, and the stag his refuge in the thick coverts, where he can shelter from the sun's burning heat; and just so, my child, our hearts ought daily to choose some resting-place, either Mount Calvary, or the Sacred Wounds, or some other spot close to Christ, where they can retire at will to seek rest and refreshment amid toil, and to be as in a fortress, protected from temptation. Blessed indeed is the soul which can truly say, "Thou, Lord, art my Refuge, my Castle, my Stay, my Shelter in the storm and in the heat of the day."

Essentially this suggestion hinges on our ability to pause for a minute or two, close our eyes and find the presence of God in our soul. This can be done anywhere we are, whether at work, in the home, or while traveling.

Be sure then, my child, that while externally occupied with business and social duties, you

frequently retire within the solitude of your own heart. That solitude need not be in any way hindered by the crowds which surround you — they surround your body, not your soul, and your heart remains alone in the Sole Presence of God.

This is a simple practice, one that doesn't even require any words or prayers to accomplish. All one must do is actively recall the presence of God in our soul, crying out to Him and asking Him to grant us His peace.

St. Francis de Sales explains how even some of the greatest saints had to do this, unable to physically get away from the world and its pressures.

When Saint Catherine of Sienna was deprived by her parents of any place or time for prayer and meditation, Our Lord inspired her with the thought of making a little interior oratory in her mind, into which she could retire in heart, and so enjoy a holy solitude amid her outward duties. And henceforward, when the world assaulted her, she was able to be indifferent, because, so she said, she could retire within her secret oratory, and find comfort with her Heavenly Bridegroom.

Whatever our situation may be, in the midst of the storms of life, we can always find God within our heart and rest with him for a few moments of peace.

Two by Two

As we are seeing an end to the pandemic in the near future, many are wondering "are people going to come back to Church?" Maybe the question should be "what are we going to do to invite people back?" Some parishes have decided to contact parishioners that they haven't heard from in a while and invite them back. But, if we haven't seen them prior to the pandemic, what was changed at our parish to encourage them to return? Instead, let's use today's Gospel as a model—let's get out "two by two" and walk with people in their faith journey. Let's train our parish disciples to be disciple-makers. Instead of starting big and calling people that were lukewarm to begin with, let's start small and train our "on fire" disciples how to lead small faith groups and how to easily share their faith story with others. Then, encourage people in our small faith groups to go out and do the same—this is called spiritual multiplication. The key-we need to personally invest in a few people at a time and accompany them in their faith journey.





Armed with that confidence, readers will affirm what once seemed obvious to all of us-that living creatures, from single-celled cyanobacteria to orca whales and human beings, are brilliantly conceived, utterly beyond the reach of accident. Our intuition was right all along.

SPIRE (Memory Aid) for A Catholic Plan of Isife

There is a saying, "How does one eat an elephant?" The answer? "One bite at a time?" How does one unpack and simplify in a plan of life all that God has revealed in Jesus, Scripture and Tradition, all the Church believes, teaches and proclaims to be revealed by God? And how does one live it out faithfully in our daily duty as a Catholic Christian? Here is an attempt to take three core texts at the heart of the message of God's revelation in Jesus from Matthew's Gospel and put them in a memory aid. It is something that one can use in order to help us take one daily bite at a time.

Matthew 22:37 And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. ³⁸ This is the great and first commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself



Matthew 25:45 Then he will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to me.' ⁴⁶ And they will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Matthew 28:19 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you.

In summary, we need to love God with all that we are and our neighbors as ourselves in word and deed, what are known as the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

Focus on becoming the best version of yourself. Grow in Virtue, Knowledge, and do Acts of Charity. Stay IN-SPIRE-D

The memory aid is SPIRE, which stands for Spiritual, Physical, Intellectual, Relational and Evangelical. When one thinks about making a "plan of life" incorporating these 5 points, whether as a yearly, monthly or in daily goals, you can ponder how they incorporate the words of the Lord above. We will be unpacking each of these over the next weeks' articles.

The acronym is also fitting in light of the word itself, spire – think Church spire. It is something that points upward, to keep our hearts and minds set "on things that are above" as St. Paul says in Colossians 3, and not simply stay absorbed in the things on earth. We have to keep focused on the end game which is eternity. Our life in this world is but a breath compared to eternity. And as one billboard recently said, "Eternity is a long time to be wrong" when it comes to God's plan in word and deed.
