Jesus, Our Peace

You probably know that the Jews in the first century did not particularly like the Gentiles. Some of them who became Christians still looked down on the non-Jewish Christians. In the epistle today, Paul addresses this problem by reminding them that Jesus died for all people, Jew and Gentile. And just as Jesus rose from the dead to a new life, the converts to Christianity were given a new life also. That new life of baptism joined them all to Christ, who lives in them, forgives them, and brings them peace. So why was that unity so hard to accept?

One reason is that as much as we complain about laws and regulations, many people like to live by them. We even make our own rules: "I always eat breakfast at 7:15," or "I have to read the newspaper every morning." Even though our rules may not be bad in themselves, if we get angry at anyone who interrupts our routine, those rules lead us to sin. But some of the Hebrew Christians thought that they still had to keep the laws and regulations of the old covenant. There is nothing wrong with keeping the Ten Commandments: They are simply examples of Jesus' command to love God with all your being and to love your neighbor as yourself. So why not just do that?

The problem with only keeping commandments is that we can avoid doing evil things, but still not love

God or my neighbor. For example, we can avoid using God's name in vain and kick back and relax on the Sabbath, but still not really love God. We can keep from killing, robbing, or lying to our neighbor, without loving anyone. Fortunately for us, God loves us first; we need only respond to that love. And if we make the decision to love God and our neighbors, and base all our other actions on that love, we will not break any commandments, or even worry about breaking them. We will have the peace that Paul mentions in our reading, the peace that makes us all one in Christ.

This is what Jesus had to say about being charitable towards others

His words about charity are some of the most difficult to follow.

Instructions on how we should treat our neighbor are one of the hallmarks of Jesus' teachings. Countless people over the centuries, including Christians and nonbelievers, have looked to Jesus for guidance on how to be charitable towards other people.

On this topic, Jesus gave us a wealth of maxims to live by, and he challenges each one of us to incorporate them into our very being. Jesus hopes that we will take them seriously and strive to live up to them each and every day of our lives.

Below are several passages from the Gospels that invite us to examine how we exercise charity towards those we encounter.

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. (John 13:34-35)

"A Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where [the man] was; and when he saw him, he had compassion, and went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; then he set him on his own beast and brought him to an inn, and took care of him. And the next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, I will repay you when I come back.' Which of these three, do you think, proved neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed mercy on him." And Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise." (Luke 10:33-37)

He said also to the man who had invited him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your kinsmen or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return, and you be repaid." (Luke 14:12)

If any one would sue you and take your coat, let him have your cloak as well; and if any one forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. Give to him who begs from you, and do not refuse him who would borrow from you. (Matthew 5:40-42)

Jesus said to him, "If you would be perfect, go, sell what you possess and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me." (Matthew 19:21)

"Then the King will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.'" (Matthew 25:34-36)

The video uses the case of high school biology teacher Roger DeHart to introduce and frame a presentation on six of the "icons of evolution": Haeckel's embryos, Darwin's finches, four-winged fruit flies, homology in vertebrate limbs, bacterial resistance to antibiotics, and Darwin's "Tree of Life". These are referred to as "icons" because they are presented in biology texts as key proofs that Darwinian evolution has occurred. However, each of these is at best misleading (four-winged fruit flies) and at worst an outright fake (Haeckel's embryo drawings). Mr. DeHart was a popular teacher who had taught high school biology for many years. He supplemented the standard textbook presentation of the theory of evolution with additional materials from mainstream, peer-reviewed scientific publications illustrating that there was some disagreement in the scientific community over the interpretation of the purported evidence for evolution. This practice was challenged in the late 1990s (even though

teachers in other disciplines frequently used supplementary materials without any challenges) and led to public debate over how the theory of evolution should be taught. This video is produced from the perspective that the evidence against evolution should be taught at the high school level as well as the evidence for it. Students should know how science is practiced, which includes considering alternative interpretations of evidence and considering contrary information as well as supporting evidence for a theory.

Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the Life of the Church: St. Sharbel Makhlouf (Feast: July 24)

Most of us are familiar with European saints, such as St. Bernadette, St. Therese and Padre Pio. Less well-known, but still popular in his own area, is Saint Charbel, a monk from Lebanon (b. 1828) who lived much of his life quietly as a hermit, achieving fame only after his death.

Charbel lived a life of intense mortification. He wore a hair shirt, slept on a straw mattress with a plank for a pillow, and for his one meal of the day was content to eat the meager left-overs from the monastery. He displayed a remarkable devotion to the Eucharist, spending hours in preparation for saying Mass and hours in thanksgiving afterwards.

In 1898 Charbel suffered a massive stroke while saying Mass and died just eight days later on Christmas Eve. He was seventy years old. After three days he was buried in the monastery cemetery, and as was the custom, without the benefit of a coffin. Like many a holy monk before him he would soon have been forgotten were it not for a very strange happening. For the next forty-five nights his tomb was surrounded by a dazzlingly bright light. Word began to spread and many sought the intercession of this holy man from Lebanon.

In 1950, the monastery started keeping records of miracles attributed to Charbel. In less than two years it accumulated more than twelve hundred such claims.

As early as 1925 the monk's name had been put forward in a petition to Pope Pius XI to begin canonical proceedings leading to his beatification, but this did not happen until 1965 during the reign of Pope Paul VI. Two cures accepted as being miraculous were necessary and both selected for the purpose had taken place in 1950. The first of these concerned a nun by the name of Sister Maria Abel Kawary. She had suffered serious intestinal problems for fourteen years and had been given up by doctors as a hopeless case, but after praying all night beside Charbel's grave she was cured instantaneously. The doctor who examined her at the time recorded her cure as "a supernatural happening which is beyond man's power to explain."

The second miracle accepted by the Sacred Congregation was the restoration of sight to a blacksmith named Iskandar Oubeid. He had lost the sight in one eye after suffering a blow to it while at work. Eminent eye specialists announced that the damage to the iris was so severe that he would never see through it again. Thirteen years later he took the advice of friends to visit the tomb of Father Charbel. On returning home he had a dream in which a monk appeared, promising to cure him. The next morning he found he could see perfectly out of both eyes. No medical explanation could be found.

Hear the testimony of Dafne Gutiterrez, a woman from Arizona who was healed of her blindness after touching the relics of St. Charbel when they came to her parish Church. Within 48 hours after visiting the relics of St. Charbel, her eyesight was completely restored to 20/20 vision. To Love Is to Will the Good of Others

[Married love] is above all fully human, a compound of sense and spirit. It is not, then, merely a question of natural instinct or emotional drive. It is also, and above all, an act of the free will, whose trust is such that it is meant not only to survive the joys and sorrows of daily life, but also to grow, so that husband and wife become in a way one heart and one soul, and together attain their human fulfillment.

(Humanae vitae no. 9)

Reflection

In our modern times there is a great confusion about what it means to love another. Romantic love is portrayed as based primarily, if not entirely, on emotional highs and a feeling of intense attraction for the other. For many, then, when these feelings or attractions change, as they often do, the relationship ends.

Our Catholic tradition offers a different understanding of love: that to love is to "will the good of another." For Blessed Pope Paul VI to say that married love is "above all, an act of the free will," means that love is not only emotion or feelings of affection towards one's spouse, rather it is choosing to "will the good" of one's spouse in all times and circumstances. Love, in the view of the Catholic Church, looks beyond changing emotions and attractions to *will* – to choose – the good of the other.

What does it mean for spouses to choose the good for one another in everyday married life? How can you choose the good for others in your life, even when emotions or feelings fluctuate?

Intercessory Prayer to Paul VI

God our Father, fill all married couples with your love. Give them the grace to love one another every day, living out their promise to love, to "will the good" of one another in good times and bad.

Help them to imitate your freely given, sacrificial love, that they may choose each day to give of themselves, reflecting Your love for us when You sent Your Son to die for our sins.

We ask this through the intercession of Blessed Pope Paul VI, and in the name of Christ our Lord.
