

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A favorite motto of St. Teresa of Calcutta was, "do small things with great love." This is how it works in the kingdom of God. God can do tremendous things with the smallest gesture, especially when it is done in love. We can clearly see that our world is suffering greatly. People are struggling to find peace, navigate through conflicts, earn a sustainable living, find security and enough food to eat, and work through political tensions and conflicts. In the light of the magnitude of the difficulties that exist around us and even within us, we can find ourselves floundering to discover practical, effective solutions. How can something so large be helped by someone as small and seemingly insignificant as me? While whole systems and structures may be out of the league of our personal influence, are we really that helpless in the midst of all of the turmoil, sadness, and suffering?

If we believe that God is with us and that God is still working to bring about the glory of God's kingdom, then the answer is no. We are never helpless or without hope. Armed with a strong life of prayer, we can always flee to God and ask for inspiration, wisdom, and especially love. We are all blessed with unique gifts and talents and it often seems that considering all that the world lacks, love and charity remain at the top of the list. Life can easily become a battleground of hostility. Because life is challenging and difficult, anger is not far away. We see it on people's faces and hear it in their voices. There is a measure of frustration that permeates all avenues of life. It is even felt in the air.

As people of faith, we know that what we see here is not the end but only a part of something far greater to come. We know

that God's kingdom is where we are ultimately meant to be, and the Gospel is the way to get there. If love and charity can prevail in us, then God will be able to do what God does best. God will use us to scatter the seeds of his kingdom. Through our small gestures, those seeds can receive the nurturing attention that is necessary for them to bear great fruit. We cannot fall victim to the strife that is around us. We have to keep ourselves refreshed and focused so that even in small ways, we can become part of the solution, not the problem. Love and charity, which come from God, can help to heal the ills of the world. May we bring these simple gifts to the everyday simple tasks of our lives! Watch how big the plant grows!



Our piano in church is currently in need of extensive repairs, which prompted consultations with our piano technician and connections I



have at Steinway & Sons. At 111 years old, rebuilding is not cost effective. Both Steinway and our regular piano technician have now submitted proposals for the purchase of a different piano, and I have had the privilege of presenting all of the details to our finance committee. Options presented range from \$35k-\$80k.

The committee is now in the process of discerning an exact fundraising goal and investigating specific pianos. We would like to gauge the parish's enthusiasm about this project and willingness to give. Pope Francis declared a Year of St. Joseph through December 8th 2021 on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being proclaimed as Patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX in 1870. Throughout this special year we will include various insights, past and present about St. Joseph.


The Lord loves when we make a devotional pilgrimage. He came to us. Why not make a pilgrimage this month or over the summer to a shrine or location that involves St. Joseph? Here's a few to consider.

The Shrine of St. Joseph: St. Louis, MO https://www.shrineofstjoseph.org/



This beautiful old church, at the corner of 11th Street and Biddle in St. Louis has a vast and interesting history beginning in 1844. Read about parishioner Ignatius Strecker who was miraculously healed in 1864 through the intercession of Peter Claver, SJ. This miracle became one of two miracles needed for the canonization of Saint Peter Claver. Then in 1866, learn how a solemn vow to Saint Joseph saved the lives of parishioners during a cholera outbreak in St. Louis, which claimed the lives of 20 people a day from the parish. The Shrine was built in 2010 after more than 18 months of planning and was dedicated on October 9, 2010, by the Most Reverend Robert J. Carlson, Archbishop of St. Louis. Located near the center of the property overlooking a small lake, the Shrine promotes personal devotion to the Holy Family as a model of human virtue and love—human and divine—by providing a quiet place for families and people of all ages to pray and meditate on the life of the Holy Family.







Sometime during the Year of St. Joseph, why not plan a trip to New Mexico?

The Staircase St. Joseph built in New Mexico

The Chapel of Loretto in Santa Fe, New Mexico, is home to an exceptional work of carpentry

Three mysteries surround the spiral staircase in the Loretto Chapel: the identity of its builder, the type of wood used, and the physics of its construction.

When the Loretto Chapel was completed in 1878, there was no way to access the choir loft twenty-two feet above. Carpenters were called in to address the problem, but they all concluded access to the loft would have to be via ladder as a staircase would interfere with the interior space of the small Chapel.

Legend says that to find a solution to the seating problem, the Sisters of the Chapel made a novena to St. Joseph, the patron saint of carpenters. On the ninth and final day of prayer, a man appeared at the Chapel with a donkey and a toolbox looking for work. Months later, the elegant circular staircase was completed, and the carpenter disappeared without pay or thanks. After searching for the man (an ad even ran in the local newspaper) and finding no trace of him, some concluded that he was St. Joseph himself, having come in answer to the sisters' prayers.

The stairway's carpenter, whoever he was, built a magnificent structure. The design was innovative for the time and some of the design considerations still perplex experts today.

The staircase has two 360 degree turns and no visible means of support. It is said that the staircase was built without nails—only wooden pegs. Questions also surround the number of stair risers relative to the height of the choir loft and about the types of wood and other

materials used in the stairway's construction.



Over the years many have flocked to the Loretto Chapel to see the Miraculous Staircase. The staircase has been the subject of many articles, TV specials, and movies including "Unsolved Mysteries" and the full-length movie titled <u>"The Staircase"</u>, starring William Petersen and Barbara Hershey.

The Mustard Seed

The smallest seed becomes one of the biggest plants that many creatures can dwell in. So how does that relate to me? We all have received many gifts from God. All these gifts are critical in God's salvation plan. No gift is too small or insignificant! With God's grace, even the smallest of our gifts just may be the answer to someone's prayer. The seed also relates to our daily life because a seed must break or die before it can develop into a mature plant. The same is true for our life. We must renounce our sins before we can mature as disciples of Jesus. 


