"It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name he may give you. This I command you: love one another." - Jn 15:16-17

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

"Remain in my love," and, "I call you friends," are powerful words that are found in John's Gospel. Most of us probably have them committed to memory or have at least heard them proclaimed dozens of times. They are words that can easily become trite and quickly glossed over without fully pondering and digesting their profound beauty. When we take the time to immerse ourselves in them, they can radically change our lives and our relationships. They can open up new doors of adventure and hold countless possibilities for meaning. The essence of love and friendship are things that can easily be taken for granted. They have always been there and are a significant part of our lives. Many would say that they could not live without love and friendship, and they put a great deal of care into preserving, deepening and sustaining them. Love and friendship share a mutual relationship with each other that deserves more reflection.

Where does love come from? We can consider relationships that have not succeed-

ed and conclude that they were somehow due to our "failures in love." In doing so, we assume that human beings are the ones responsible for love, its success and also its failure. While our weakness, emotional composition and sinfulness can easily impact our ability to love, its origin is not human. God is love. God is love's author and origin. When we love, it is God who loves in and through us. It is because of this divine closeness that Jesus is able to call us friends! It is not because of anything we have done but simply because of who we are. Realizing and contemplating this awesome reality becomes a game changer across the board. It gives us reason to clear the table of anything that can adversely affect the way we love so that we can open the door for its author to shine forth.

Coming upon this truth is what leads folks like St. Francis of Assisi to leave that which is comfortable and worldly and live a radical life. They relate with the love of God that radiates in and through all living things and appreciate their sacredness. It was having an intimate experience of God's love and friendship that propelled St. Francis and others to embrace simplicity, act nonviolently, pursue humility, love enemies, care for the earth and open up avenues for true justice. Understanding this profound truth will also help us find peaceful solutions to world's problems, restore relationships with our sisters and brothers, bring the grace of loving stewardship to creation and heal many wounds. Once we begin to see how wonderfully holy all of life really is, we discover joy. We lose our need for fear, develop a fierce fortitude, act prudently and seek justice. There is great power in love because it comes from God. It will never fail. It also enjoys the company of two other friends who are eager to become our friends as well: faith and hope. These are just as important to have and to share.

Parishes—the Heart of Faith

Dear Parishioners,

Thank you for so many expressions of kindness, faith and genuine concern as we marked the passing of Mom. All of your prayers and words of consolation are a real blessing in my life and a cause for constant gratitude to God for how blessed I am to be pastor of this parish family. I am so very thankful to our staff for all of their help in planning and celebrating Mom's life and marking her death. It was a great celebration. Sadly we are still trying to figure out the streaming issues, but hopefully they will be resolved soon enough.

Mom & Dad grew up in an era when the parish was the center of their lives. They loved their time at Notre Dame in Wellston. Their friendship began in kindergarten and continued through High School. They continued that experience of parish life at Sacred Heart in Florissant. That was their final experience of the parish being their life. Times changed and as we became busier and more free-ranging as Americans the parish really stopped being at the center of all things. While Sacred Heart in Elsberry was a good experience of church, it was not a community of belonging for my parents or family. I have fond memories of individuals from that parish, but as a whole it was one of being an outsider. I think Mom & Dad experienced more welcome from the non-Catholic neighbors than parishioners. I don't hold any resentment for that experience, various factors made it what it was. Shake the dust and move forward, but also learn so that such experiences can either be avoided or handled differently in the future.

As a pastor and spiritual father I strive to make our community one of welcome and belonging. It is not something that I can accomplish on my own, each of us in the parish family can be welcoming and hospitable in our own way. Not everyone that joins our parish may find it to be a parish of belonging, or a place of welcome. Many factors can contribute to the lack of that sense of belonging. It is far too easy to blame others than look at ourselves when don't find the belonging we desire. Sometimes communities are actually closed off to others, and in parish life that is lethal to the future of the community. I believe we welcome and integrate others better than many places, and I am very thankful for that experience. No one or no place is perfect, but we strive to do our best. It is the gift of communion with God and one another.

At every parish I have served there is always the potential for tension between the long term members and the new members. We have a love-hate relationship with change and growth. We probably all say we are open to change, but in reality most of us are only open to the changes we desire. We all like to see the parish grow and prosper, but such growth usually brings change in unexpected and unanticipated ways. I am not a fan of change for the sake of change, nor a fan of embracing the "new" solely because it is new. I, and perhaps you, like to at least know reasons for changes that come our way or the anticipated good that something new will bring to our lives. I am just rambling, but I thought you might appreciate how I think.

While the parish is no longer the center of life, hopefully it is the heart of lived faith. God calls us to make faith first in our life, or it might as well be last. He is rather jealous that way. When we do make faith first, and celebrate it sacramentally, we can bear abundant fruit for God's glory, our neighbor's good and our maturity. Thank you for being a parish family that I love and know that I am blessed to serve.

There is much evil in the world. It divides and scatters the members of the Body of





When tragedy hits home, these men are left wrestling with their hopes, their fears, their faith, and their fathering. Can a newfound urgency help these dads draw closer to God...and to their children? Filled with action-packed police drama, *Courageous* is the fourth film


The word matrimony literally means "at the service of motherhood." We think of the role of St. Joseph in serving the Mother of our Lord and Jesus Himself. Ponder the relationship Joseph had with Mary and Jesus, one human, one divine, both without sin. In his relationship with Mary we can say the old adage, behind every great man is a greater woman. True in Joseph's case to be sure. Any good father exercises his fatherhood by first of all loving the mother. By Mary and Joseph being united in love, Jesus is raised in a home filled with love. Joseph was the first one to

consecrate (dedicate) himself to Mary. Mary was the first one to consecrate herself to Joseph. Both were consecrated-dedicated to Jesus and had their lives and mission centered on Him. The human family is an icon of the Holy Trinity, a communion of persons in a relationship of love. Nowhere was this more evident than in the Holy Family. Pope John Paul II pointed out in *Familiaris Consortio* (a must read for parents) that "the prototype and example for all Christian families will be found in the home at Nazareth."



St. Paul to the Romans 12:9-10

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with brotherly affection; <u>outdo one another in showing honor</u>.



There is an interesting text in Venerable Mary of Agreda's mystical writings of the Holy Family. She tells us that there was almost like a holy contest between the two spouses as to which of them was to regard and treat the other as superior. Joseph in his humility esteemed himself as all unworthy of the treasure which had been committed to his care; and so great was his veneration for Mary that he would have desired to take the place of her servant, seeking only to know and obey her will in everything. She, however, in her humility was the victor in this loving strife; for the most holy Mary would not

consent that, the man being the head, the natural order should be inverted, so that it was her will to obey in all things her spouse. It was a great sacrifice to Joseph to have thus to assume the place due to him as husband, and in doing so he, on his part, was practicing the virtue of obedience, even as Mary was on hers.
