# Deeper Understanding of Scripture

On December 10, 1979, a very petite holy woman known as Mother Teresa of Calcutta spoke these words in her Nobel Peace Prize Acceptance Speech, "But I am sure in the families and many of our homes, maybe we are not hungry for a piece of bread, but maybe there is somebody there in the family who is unwanted, unloved, uncared, forgotten, there isn't love. Love begins at home. And love to be true has to hurt. I never forget a little child who taught me a very beautiful lesson. They heard in Calcutta, the children, that Mother Teresa had no sugar for her children, and this little one, Hindu boy four years old, he went home and he told his parents: I will not eat sugar for three days, I will give my sugar to Mother Teresa. How much a little child can give. After three days they brought into our house, and there was this little one who could scarcely pronounce my name, he loved with great love, he loved until it hurt. And this is what I bring before you, to love

one another until it hurts, but don't forget that there are many children, many children, many men and women who haven't got what you have. And remember to love them until it hurts."

Living authentically and walking with holiness always involves sacrifice. It has to hurt. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even what is apparently a generous gesture can be nothing. It is no wonder that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus, and the young child in our story here the interest of Mother Teresa. It is easy to make the houses of our lives look like they are in perfect order when in fact they are in shambles within. Religion can sometimes make this hypocritical masquerade easy to accomplish. We can find ourselves in all the right holy places, reciting all of the correct prayers, participating in community collections,

and reciting the proper doctrines only to find ourselves empty, shallow, self-focused, and overly anxious about personal concerns.

The one who learns to discover their inner poverty, their spiritual poverty, is the only one who can truly place him or herself at the mercy of God. It is only when we allow ourselves to be empty that we realize Who we actually need to fill us. This is the real meaning of trust. Many of us are afraid to take the plunge. We allow ourselves to detach from only so much, always keeping a watchful eye on the protection of our securities. We understand the value of poverty, but we do not want to become too poor. As long as we are able to recognize this tension, our reluctance to let go and our struggle, we can continue our journey of humbly learning how to love so deeply that it hurts. God understands and waits.

## Tempus Fuqit, Memento Mori

Dear parishioners and friends,

**Time flies, remember death.** That simple Latin motto from the medieval church reminds us of the shortness of life and the inescapable reality of death. As moderns we spend a lot of time doing the opposite, we waste untold hours of time and practice a very unhealthy ignorance of death. We mistakenly think death is something destined for us only after a long life. As many of us know, death does not have a schedule or time frame that it obeys. It is something that can happen at any-time and to anyone. The mysterious nature of death is terrifying. Only the mystery of God and His love for us is greater. Cling to God, He wants us to trust completely in Him.

Often times when we lose someone to death, we try to wrap our minds around the mystery with a misguided understanding. Here are some common statements that mean well but often complicate our understanding of death and God.

 "It was his/her time to go." That statement acknowledges that God knows all our days and is very aware of every moment of our lives. However, it often makes God an arbitrary dealer of death. A God that randomly plucks people from our lives is not a God we would want to love. It is instead a God that we fear or resent. God does not take people from our lives, death does. Death is an affront to God's creation.

- "God wanted him/her." Another partially true statement. God does indeed desire us and our loved ones. But this statement makes it sound like we can only share a loved one with God after death. Right now as you are reading this, God is as present to you as He will be in heaven. Your awareness and mine is the great difference between this very moment and when we are before God at our judgment. Here we struggle under the veil of sin, there we will be freed by grace. The saints receive a glimpse of the beauty of redemption we will too if we grow in faith.
- "God never gives you more than you can handle." Yes and no. God never allows life to so overwhelm us that we don't lose hope if we keep our eyes focused on Him. At the same time, God never wants us to remain self-reliant and fail to call out to Him and our neighbors for strength. Self-reliance in the spiritual life is empty. We need God and others in order to fulfill our pilgrimage of life. God is not micromanaging our lives. He is very aware of every moment and even every decision we will make, but never imposes on our free-will. What does God always seek? Trust that leads to love.

We have no greater advocate for life than our God. The Holy Trinity wants us to share in the fullness of life and communion.






# Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the life of Christ and His Church St. Francis Xavier Cabrini (Feast- November 13)

Mother Cabrini was canonized in 1946, the first American saint.

Four miracles had been credited to Mother Cabrini since her death on Dec. 22, 1917, at age of 67. The first two miracles essential to beatification, Nov. 13, 1938, were Sister Delfina, miraculously cured of intestinal fever after doctors had given up hope, and the saving of the sight of Peter Smith, a child, in Columbia Hospital in New York after he had been accidentally given a blinding solution of nitrate of silver. Both miracles occurred after prayers requesting intercession of the dead Mother Cabrini.

The two additional miracles both occurred in Lombard, Italy, near where Mother Cabrini was born. The first was the curing of Paulo Pezini, a chauffeur, of a chronic disease after doctors had given up hope. The other was the recovery of Ettore Paggetti, a locomotive engineer, from burns after medical assistance had been declared futile. Prayers for Mother Cabrini's intercession were offered in both instances.



In the book, <u>Nothing Short of a Miracle</u>, author Patricia Treece writes about the healing of the infant Peter Smith mentioned above. Almost immediately after the miracle (of his restored vision), the baby comes down with pneumonia. His jubilant doctors plunge back into fear once more for infant Peter's temperature, in this pre-antibiotic era, is so high at 107, it appears he will die. This time the summoned Mother Bacigalupo practically laughs at the anxious doctors as she says, "Mother Cabrini did not restore his vision for him to die of pneumonia." But again the Sisters spend the night in prayer. By morning, another miracle: fever down, pneumonia gone.

In 1938 Mother Cabrini is beatified by the Catholic Church, Several miracles are cited as signs from God in favor of this step, one being the healing of Peter Smith. Seventeen years old, he attends the ceremonies in St. Peter's, Rome, where onlookers notice his striking and expressive eyes that need no glasses and his smooth

-skinned face. Only those who know to look carefully for them make out the two tiny scars where deadly nitrate solution once burned a furrow down his cheeks.

All the way to his death in 2002, Fr. Peter Smith will love to talk about Mother Cabrini, whose prayers to God when he was an infant, as he put it, "show the age of miracles has not passed." https://catholicexchange.com/mother-cabrini-first-miracle

- 1. c The Divine Office takes its name from the Latin word *officium* which means duty. Catholic clergy have the duty of praying the Liturgy of the Hours daily.
- 2. c During cycle C, we hear the Gospel of Luke proclaimed.
- 3. c The titles in the hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" come from the seven "O Antiphons" prayed at Vespers during the Octave before Christmas. "Morning Star" is a title given to our Mother in the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary.
- 4. a *Caritas in Veritate*, which means "charity in truth," was promulgated on June 29, 2009, the Solemnity of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul.
- 5. d The word ambo refers to the pulpit or lectern from which the Liturgy of the Word is proclaimed at Mass.
- 6. b A maniple (a band of silk or other material about a yard long and worn over the left forearm) is an optional vestment for priests.
- 7. b The Felicians are formally known as the Congregation of Sisters of St. Felix and were founded in 1855 by Blessed Mary Angela (Sophia) Truszkowska in Poland. They follow the Rule of St. Francis.
- 8. d Indulgences can be plenary (remits all temporal punishment for sin) or partial (remits only part of the temporal punishment for sin).
- 9. c The incardination process theologically emphasizes the permanent association of bishops, priests, and deacons. In essence, priests and deacons represent the local bishop and, as such, are under his jurisdiction.
- 10. a Jewish people are obligated to say the Shema in the morning and at night (based on Deuteronomy 6:4-7).

## St. Vincent de Paul Greeting Card Forms


