Perseverance

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives a clever example of why we are to persevere in praying, even if we think the prayer is not being heard. The crooked judge just wanted to get that widow off his back. She was lucky her adversary didn't pester the judge, too; he might have gone the other way. So we can pray to God with even more confidence, because we know that God loves us and will answer our prayers.

St. Paul carries that theme of perseverance even further. He is not just talking about prayer here; he encourages Timothy to persevere in proclaiming God's word as well. That command we may find more challenging than prayer. He tells Timothy (and us!) to "convince, reprimand and encourage through all patience and teaching" (2 Timothy 4:2). How can we do that?

"Convince" reminds me that our faith should be reasonable. Not that we can prove all that we believe in a scientific way, but our faith should be realistic; after all, God made the world, so God should know how it works. Jesus' command to love one another, for instance, can be taught much more convincingly by giving examples of love. A mother who hugs her child when he is hurt, forgives him when he is sorry, and encourages him when he feels lost is teaching that command in a way that will be remembered much longer than just telling him to love people. So we can convince others of our faith by showing them examples of love, forgiveness, and encouragement.

Paul also talks about reprimanding each other. That may be what he was thinking when he says that proclaiming the word can sometimes be inconvenient. Most people find it difficult to reprime and someone they are in charge of, much less one who is equal in status. That's where patience comes in. A reprimand can be made patiently and gently, as a sign of concern rather than authority.

Paul lastly mentions teaching. He probably was referring to teaching the Hebrew scriptures and how they were fulfilled in Christ. Parents can do their part by teaching the stories from the Bible, helping children to see God in creation, teaching them to pray, and being good examples of God's love for them. If you send your children to religion classes or the parish school, do what you can to support the teachers so that what the children learn at school is practiced at home. What the children see (or don't see) at home has a much greater effect than a few hours a week in a classroom.

Discernment & Liturgical Changes

Dear parishioners,

By the end of this month we hope to be able to provide you with the results of the survey taken in September. Surveys should not been seen as a vote for one thing or another, but rather as an expression of your thoughts or preferences. As pastor, I am interested in your thoughts and preferences as I seek the best ways to serve and shepherd you. I am fully aware of my limitations to please everyone with any given decision. Not even God can please us all, and God is perfect! But then again, God does not exist to please us, we exist to please Him. My first and your first desire should be to do our best to please God with our decisions. God's desire for our growth as disciples is urgent for our happiness in this life and for our hope for salvation in the next. Major decisions that carry that kind of weight are ones of grace or sin, of service or selfishness.

More often than not God leaves many decisions to our prayerful discernment and good will. I believe that God hopes our ordinary decisions are formed by the Gospel and flow from a desire to love Him and our neighbor. Decisions about Mass or elements within the Mass do not often carry the gravity of grace or sin, service or selfishness. Decisions about Mass do affect us because Mass is our act of worship as a family of faith. Every Mass should be our best effort to give God the glory and honor, praise and adoration that is His due. I am

thankful that so many of our liturgies are prayerful and beautiful. Worship is meant to draw us into deeper communion with God and one another. My Sundays always conclude on such a high note because of the beauty of our Masses and it culminates in the 9:30 Mass.

Beginning in Advent (December 1st) we will see a return of the 11:30 Mass. Please note that it is at 11:30 and that Mass will be focused on Praise & Worship as its liturgical musical expression. Our Contemporary Choir will also find a permanent home at this liturgy. Bryan and the P & W band have selected music that is beautiful and in keeping with Catholic doctrine. The Mass is not all about music, but music creates a defined expression and emotional connection. Everyone has their preference and favorite hymns. My hope is that our various Masses will offer something for everyone. I hope that the 11:30 Mass is able to draw others into the life of our Church and our parish family. Our parish family is growing and the return of this Mass will hopefully facilitate that growth.




A basic format for the day will be a diagnosis and a prescription (fitting for a "Doctor" helping us to "see"):


