# Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Archbishop Fulton Sheen said, "It takes three to make love, not two: you, your spouse, and God." Apart from the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ, nothing speaks better of God's incarnate love than marriage. God designed it this way. We place great value on love and rightly so. What we fail to realize, however, is that love, its very presence and place in our lives, is not simply part of the human package deal. Love comes from God. It is one of God's greatest gifts to human beings. When we begin to realize that our very ability to love is sacred, it changes up how we see the essence of life, and purpose and sanctity of marriage.

God is love. It stands to reason then that if we follow the path of unconditional, selfemptying love we will then stumble upon God. It is precisely this intimate wedding of God with love that gives such eloquence and honor to the love between husband and wife. As a living sign of Christ's love for the Church and for humanity, husbands and wives speak volumes of God's unconditional incarnate love for all of his children! The Divine power that brings unity and life to marriage is so strong that once joined, it really cannot be separated.

Admittedly, marriage covenants can be extremely difficult to negotiate and, at times, very painful to experience. God's perfect divinity always meets our broken and imperfect humanity. God is okay with this setup as he created it this way. Our loving is never as unconditional as God's and often tainted by our own imperfections, needs, memories, hurts, sinfulness, and weakness. All of this baggage negatively impacts even the most well-intentioned marriages, causing them to be hurtful and empty. We are love works in progress. God can succeed in perfecting our love only if we keep our eyes fixed on him as the source of that love. That's why marriage is always about three and not just two.

The Divine intimacy at the heart of marriage is what can make them celebrations of great union and happiness. Couples who are still madly in love with each other after many years, still looking at each other with that timeless twinkle in their eyes, best tell the story of God's oneness with humanity. Honor, celebrate, and support those who have accepted a vocation to marriage. Living in a world that easily pulls relationships apart, may they find hope and inspiration from their faith companions who are on the same journey!

# Social Media

Dear Parishioners,

I have been aware and engaged with the internet since the early 1990's. A friend and classmate of mine was very tech oriented and gifted. My first experience of on-line discussion was the forums and bulletin boards that universities would create for various classes or communities. I was always on the sidelines, more of a spectator than a participant.

All that changed in 1995 when I joined AOL and started exploring their services. The main reason to join was e-mail and instant messaging to chat with my friends from high school that were still in my life. Much to my surprise were the chatrooms, which were the first real experience of social media for me. It was amazing to chat with people all over the nation and all over the world.

Chatrooms were an opportunity to connect with people you knew in real life as well as people you may never meet in real life but came to know through these conversations. The semianonymous nature of screennames exposed people's attitudes real quick. Some people came in with good attitudes and behaviors, others became trolls. Trolls only come to disrupt, to argue and often to attack others. Some fragile souls I knew were marred by the pettiness of their fellow visitors to AOL. I was pretty active on AOL from 1995 until 2003.

In 2003 various other "Social Medias" came into my life, MySpace, Facebook and Twitter. MySpace was a flash in the pan, and Facebook became my main experience of social media. I'm still on Facebook and Twitter, but those are not places of engagement for me anymore.

If you want to ever connect with me on-line, I have started a community on **Locals**. I will provide the link at the bottom. Locals has a format similar to Facebook without all the adds, management of data and promotion or censorship of things that matter or don't matter to me. My Locals community is free at the moment, but may be subject to a monthly fee. If that comes to pass, I will make it as minimum as possible and any proceeds will go to the St. Vincent de Paul Society or some other charity. I am not there for additional income, but rather other opportunities to connect with parishioners, neighbors and anyone who might wander onto the community.

There is an increasing hunger among Catholics to study the Bible in depth and in a way that integrates Scripture with Catholic doctrine, worship, and daily life. In October 2008, a meeting of the world Synod of Bishops scheduled by Pope Benedict XVI focused on "The Word of God in the Life and Mission of the Church." Coinciding with that meeting was the launch of the Catholic Com-

mentary on Sacred Scripture (C.C.S.S.), a series that responds to the desire of Catholics to access the living Word of God. The Gospel of Mark is the first of seventeen volumes, which will cover the entire New Testament. Written by trusted Catholic biblical scholars, these commentaries interpret Scripture in the light of Catholic tradition. Accessibly written yet substantive, the C.C.S.S. fills a gap in the available literature by offering commentaries that cover more than brief study guides but are less daunting than scholarly commentaries.

# Statement of U.S. Bishops on 2021 Respect Life Month

"The month of October brings with it our annual observance of **Respect Life Month**. As part of the Year of St. Joseph declared by Pope Francis, this year's celebration highlights the example of that great saint.

"As the faithful protector of both Jesus and Mary, we find in St. Joseph a profound reminder of our own call to welcome, safeguard, and defend God's precious gift of human life.

"Despite the mysterious circumstances surrounding Mary's pregnancy, St. Joseph took her into his home at the word of the angel. He guided their journey to Bethlehem, found shelter, and welcomed the infant Jesus as his son. When Herod threatened the life of the Christ Child, St. Joseph left his homeland behind and fled with Jesus and Mary to Egypt.

"Like St. Joseph, we are also called to care for those God has entrusted to us—especially vulnerable mothers and children. We can follow in the footsteps of St. Joseph as protector by advocating against taxpayer-funded abortion, which targets the lives of millions of poor children and their mothers here in the United States. We can imitate his care and provision by helping to start *Walking with Moms in Need* at our parishes, 'walking in the shoes' of mothers experiencing a difficult pregnancy, especially low-income mothers in our communities.

"At times, we may feel uncertain of our ability to answer the Lord's call. But He invites us to faithfully respond, despite our own fears of weaknesses: 'My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness' (2 Cor 21:9).





### Answers to Catholic IQ

- 1. d) The early Church experienced persecutions until Constantine legalized Christianity in 313. Constantine called the Council of Nicaea in 325 to settle debates about Jesus' nature. The Nicene Creed we say at Mass comes from this Council.
- 2. a) The Ursuline Sisters, named after St. Ursula, were the first teaching order of women established in the Church. They received papal approval in 1544.
- 3. c) The Poor Clare Sisters were started by St. Clare of Assisi (1194-1253). They live in an enclosed monastery, embracing a life of community, contemplation, poverty, and joy.
- 4. d) The Gifts of the Holy Spirit are wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. These gifts are heroic virtues exhibited by Jesus. He shares them with us through the Holy Spirit so that we can live heroic Christian lives.
- 5. a) Jesus also says in John 14:6: "I am the way, the truth and the life." Catechesis promotes the truth that Christ teaches in His words and in His person.
- 6. d) The Magisterium teaches through creeds, laws, dogmas, and the doctrines. These teachings build up the Church, govern the administration of the Sacraments, and correctly proclaim the gospel in every age.
- 7. b) Dogmas, revealed by God and taught by the Magisterium, hold the highest authority and are the central truths of the faith. For example, the Resurrection of Jesus is a dogma. Catholics adhere to dogmatic teachings.
- b) The bishops, together with the pope, make up the Magisterium and share the authority to teach in Jesus' name.
  "...[T]he Apostles left bishops as their successors" (see CCC, n. 77).
- 9. c) Paul studied "at the feet of Gamaliel" (Acts 22:3), a celebrated scholar of the Jewish law. Elsewhere, Gamaliel counsels the Sanhedrin to stay away from the Apostles, who were arrested for proclaiming the Risen Christ (see Acts 5:34).
- 10. d) Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton founded the Sisters of Charity of Saint Joseph and established a network of schools that became a model for parochial schools throughout the U.S.
