In Mark's gospel, he has a short description of the Last Supper, without the washing of the disciples' feet found in the gospel of John. Today's passage has a similar message. While James and John seem to be close friends of Jesus, they obviously have not learned what it means to follow him. But they think this is the time to ask for their share in the glory of Jesus' Kingdom.


Jesus doesn't make any promises of worldly glory, but he does promise a share in his suffering. When he goes on to remind them of how Gentiles rule over people, they probably thought he was going to let them do the same. Imagine their surprise when he told them that the greatest of

them would be the ones who served the rest.

They still did not understand that Jesus had to suffer and die to complete his life mission. They probably did not know what Jesus meant about their being baptized in death as Jesus would. But then how many people today know that leadership is a form of service? Whether you are head of a family, or of a nation, you were given that authority by God. And God expects leaders to not only direct those under them, but inspire and encourage them to do better. Parents do more than correct their children: they also guide them, love them, protect them, and sometimes even let them learn from their mistakes.

This connection of leadership and service is all inclusive. A manager is called to help his employees do their jobs better, not by badgering, but by giving the support they need. Government leaders are called to serve all constituents, not just the ones who donate to their election fund. Military leaders must support their troops with respect as well as discipline. God calls Church leaders in a special way to service of their flock: to protect the weakest members, to give an example of Jesus' love to all, and to be open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in both clergy and laity. Anyone who lives a life of loving service can be "greatest" in the Kingdom of God.

Dear parishioners,

The conversion of the world takes place one heart at a time. With humility we recognize that our own conversion is far from complete, but with courage we follow Jesus to proclaim the Good News. Our Nation has tilted towards hostility more in the last 60 years than in the 182 years that preceded it. As people of faith we want to be engaged in the life of our Nation for the common good. We want to foster a society that honors the rights and freedoms envisioned by our founders.

APOSTOLIC LETTER ON THE MOST HOLY ROSARY

St. Pope John Paul II wrote a beautiful and instructive Apostolic Letter on the Rosary in 2002, one of his last letters before his death, entitled *Rosarium Virginis Mariae* (English: Rosary of the Virgin Mary). It was in this document that the Luminous Mysteries were introduced to the faithful. Consider prayerfully reading this letter of the late great Saint John Paul II. It can be found online.

"The Rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer. In the sobriety of its elements, it has all the depth of the Gospel message in its entirety, of which it can be said to be a compendium. ...Through the Rosary the faithful receive abundant grace, as though from the very hands of the Mother of the Redeemer."





Canonized October 14, 2018

Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the Life of the Church: St. John of Capistrano: 7east Oct. 23




Many people in the United States might recognize the term "Capistrano" more so than the "St. John of" that precedes it through the Mission San Juan Capistrano and what has become known as the miracle of the swallows. The Mission San Juan Capistrano is a Spanish mission Church located in present-day San Juan Capistrano, Orange County, California. The 'miracle of swallows'

takes place each year at Mission San Juan Capistrano on March 19th, St. Joseph's Day. Swallows migrate 6,000 miles from Goya, Argentina to San Juan Capistrano in large groups. The town of San Juan Capistrano welcomes visitors from all parts of the world to witness the return of the swallows, a tradition that has been celebrated since the early 1930s. There is information and videos all over the internet about this natural-(supernatural?) occurrence. Even singers the likes of Bing Crosby have sung songs about "When the Swallows Come Back to Capistrano." While this phenomena inspires wonder of God and the natural world, the life of St. John of Capistrano himself should inspire even more wonder. What an amazing life, history and impact of the soldier saint, St. John of Capistrano.

In terms of this "mysteries, marvels and miracles" that this article seeks to highlight, we mention a recent book that

has been published about this 15th century saint. <u>The Miracles of St. John Capistran</u> is the title of a book that was published in the year 2000. A synopsis states, "The author analyses the miracle collections promoting the canonization of the popular fifteenth-century Observant Franciscan preacher, St. John of Capistran, who was a victorious Crusader at Belgrade in 1456, and died



thereafter in Ilok" (a city located on the periphery of western Christianity in Croatia).

Based on a thorough study of the widely scattered manuscripts on Capistranean miracles (in Naples, Rome, Venice and Paris) and with the help of a microscopic philological analysis, the author has managed to reconstruct, for the first time, one of the most complex miracle collections in the history of medieval hagiography. The accounts provide an unparalleled insight into the history of everyday


