

Where are the Grapes?

Jesus' parable is a little different from the one in the first reading. Isaiah has the vineyard under good and faithful care, but still it produces wild grapes. In the Gospel, the vineyard presumably had a good harvest, but the workers refuse to give any of the grapes to the landowner. The question for us is, which parable is about me?

Do I ignore all that God does to help me be a good disciple? Am I too busy to take time to pray or read the Bible? Do I hold onto grudges instead of forgiving and releasing them? Do I only go to church when someone drags me there, or only at Christmas and Easter? (If that were true, I probably would not be reading this bulletin.) Do I decline the invitations to go on a retreat? Am I afraid to share my faith with someone who needs encouragement? If any of these are true, I might be like the vineyard in the first reading, producing no fruit despite all the opportunities God has given me.

Or we may be the other side of the coin. We had our children baptized when they were babies, sent them to the parish school or religion classes. We went to church every Sunday and took them with us. We gave them as good an example as we could, teaching them to love others and be generous with what they have. Yet they grew up and drifted away from the faith. Then we have to remember how patient God is with us, God's people who don't always produce the fruits of faith.

The Gospel is a little more difficult to relate to. The tenants in the parable refer to those who mistreated or killed the prophets sent by God or the people who would have Jesus crucified. Yet the kingdom of God is still being proclaimed in spite of them. God is patient with them. Look what happened to Saul, who persecuted many Christians before he became one himself. In our second reading he tells us to follow his example as he follows Christ. Then, he says, the peace of God will be with us, too (Philippians 4:6–9).

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus told this parable. "An owner leased his vineyard to tenants for a share of the crops. At harvest time, he sent his servants to collect the share due him. But the tenants abused and killed them. Then the owner sent other servants, but the tenants did the same thing. Finally, the owner sent his son. When the tenants saw the son... they grabbed him. . . and killed him. [The owner then punished the tenants.]" Matthew 21:37-39

In Jesus' parable, the vineyard owner stands for God; the vineyard, Israel; the tenants, Israel's leaders; the servants, the prophets; the son, Jesus. The parable illustrates both God's patience and God's justice. God dealt patiently with Israel's leaders. But when they refused to respond, God passed judgment on them. In what area of my life especially has God dealt very patiently with me?



This will be our last "recommended" post about videos and items for Fatima during this 100th anniversary of the Apparitions there. The apparitions in 1917 concluded with a confirming Miracle on October 13, 1917, what is now known as the Miracle of the Sun. Here are two movies on Formed.org (Parish passcode is 04c2dc) which offer some amazing commentary and animations of the miracle of the Sun.



In a world torn apart by persecution, war and oppression, 3 children in Fatima, Portugal were chosen by God to offer an urgent message of hope to the world. Based on the memoirs of the oldest seer, Lucia Santos, and many thousands of independent eye-witness accounts, **The 13th Day** dramatizes the true story of three young shepherds who experienced six apparitions of Our Lady

between May and October 1917, which culminated in the final prophesied Miracle of the Sun on October 13th. Abducted from their homes, thrown into prison and interrogated under the threat of death in the government's attempt to silence them, the children remained true to their story about the crucial messages from Mary of prayer, repentance and conversion for the world.



Produced by the award-winning filmmakers of the highly acclaimed feature film *The 13th Day*, **Finding Fatima** is a powerful and in-depth documentary that combines archival footage, dramatic reenactments, original interviews with Fatima experts and stunning visuals to tell the whole story of the apparitions of Our Lady of Fatima. With high production values and a beautiful look,

artists and filmmakers lan and Dominic Higgins present a compelling docu-drama on all the crucial details about the appearances and messages of Our Lady in Fatima in 1917, a message of prayer, penance and conversion that is desperately needed in our modern world. From the initial apparitions of the Angel who prepared the children for Our Lady's coming, to the Miracle of the Sun, including moving film footage from *The 13th Day*, this illuminating and inspiring film will impact all those who see it to personally take heed of the critical messages of Our Lady of Fatima.



Five First Saturdays



In Reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary By Fr. Donald Calloway, MIC

As we end our reflections during this 100th anniversary, we might ask, "How does one respond to the call of Our Lady Fatima? The simple answer is to do what our Lady specifically requested. She is the Queen of the Prophets. If God sends a prophet, people ought to listen. What about when the Lord sends His own Mother? One can read about the specifics of our Lady's requests in such good books as "Fatima for Today." (This is found on Formed.org) Bottom line: it is to turn to God in prayer and in penance. It is converting our lives. The stakes are high when it comes to our souls and Our Lady comes as a mother to guide us to light and life in this life leading to the next. The alternate is darkness and death in this life and in the next. In terms of world peace, peace in our nations, neighborhoods and homes, our Lady asked for the Rosary to be prayed as individuals and in families,



groups. Specifically, she asked for the five "First Saturdays" as a concrete plan for peace and as reparation for sin. (There are first Saturday devotions and events both here and at St. Gianna parish that you

might consider). When such a message goes unheeded or is delayed, whether by Popes or by God's people, there are consequences. One only has to see what Our Lady tried to warn us in regard to WWII. As it has been said, "If at first you don't succeed, do what your Mother told you." Our Heavenly Mother still has come, in modern apparitions since then. Medjugorje is probably the most well known modern apparition site, and while there has been favorable reports from the official Church commission of several years ago, there still is a pending "what to do" situation



in this site in which Our Lady is alleged to have said is "a continuation of what she began at Fatima." During the same year that Medjugorje "began", however, in 1981 another series of visions were alleged to have taken place in Kibeho, Rwanda. This apparition site has since been approved. It came as a warning to conversion for the peoples of Rwanda, ten years before the horrific genocide began. Note: For those interested, on October 13 at 7 pm at St. Gianna Church, they will be watching a movie about these apparitions, told through the experience and witness of Immaculee Ilibagiza. It is called "If Only We Had Listened." Immaculee will actually be in person as St. Gianna later this year to give a mini-retreat. One last thing as we conclude our reflections on Fatima. Our parish is named and linked with Fatima under the title of Immaculate Heart of Mary. Let's keep striving to follow the call of our patron and keep our families and our parish under the heavenly mantle that God has granted, she who is our Mother in the order of grace.

Every PSR class has a chosen patron saint which catechists help students learn about. After 8 years, students will have learned more about 8 folks in God's Holy Hall of Fame. Meet the First grade patron. St. Francis of Assisi. The struggles St. Francis endured in his life, starting with the struggles with his family, followed by his struggle to rebuild the Church. The story includes his love for God and his desire to follow God's will in all he did from starting a community of Brothers, Sisters, and Preaching. The story not only includes St. Francis' spiritual acceptance of God's will but also his acceptance of the wounds Jesus suffered on the cross.

There are thousands of support groups across America helping women overcome the emotional toll of abortion.

However, many pro-abortion advocates still claim that women do not regret their abortions. This flies in the face of both the facts and common sense.

But even if their claims were true, it does not make abortion defensible. The famous Nazi, Adolf Eichmann went to his execution saying he did not regret his participation in the holocaust. Lack of regret goes to the conscience of the person, not to the rightness or morality of the action.

If we really want to know the role regret plays in the abortion issue, we need to consider how abortion-minded mothers later felt about the decision they made. What we would find is that for every woman who might say that she regretted giving birth to her child, thousands would say that they regret aborting their babies.
