

Prepare the Way of the Lord

Saint Peter shows us a characteristic of God that we normally do not think about. He tells us that for God, "a day is like a thousand years and a thousand years like one day" (1 Peter 3:8). Somehow, God is not restricted by time as we are. Taken literally, that seems to violate the laws of physics. Of course, God made those laws, so if anyone can ignore them, God certainly could. More likely, because early Christians sometimes complained that Jesus' second coming had been delayed, Peter is trying to tell us that what seems like a long time to us is nothing to God. Like the early Christians, we may wonder how long it will take for God to answer our prayers. We may be praying for some-

one who is looking for a job, a sick relative, an end to abortion, or world peace. Some prayers just take time to be answered, especially if a large number of people need to change their hearts to make it happen. Some prayers require us to change, and we may not be ready.

What Peter means is that a thousand years is not too long for God if someone needs that long to repent. God is far more patient than we are. If someone had been fighting me for months or years, I would probably give up on them. But God can wait till we are mature enough to face our sins and be sorry for them. In the same way, God has been "waiting" over two thousand years for us to preach the gospel to all na-

tions. God has been waiting for millennia for people to give up war as a means for solving our problems. God has been waiting since the beginning of the human race for us to learn how to love our neighbor.

We might not be as patient as God but we can help. Saint Peter says that we are not just waiting for the Lord's return, we are hastening it. When we make a choice that is based on faith rather than selfishness, we make it a little easier for people to believe in God. Jesus is the light of the world; he asks us to let our light shine, so that people can see Jesus in us. May our light "prepare the way of the Lord" (Mark 1:3).

Sweet Mercy

Dear Parishioners,

Advent is all about welcoming the Lord as He comes in glory and shifting to remembering fondly and celebrating joyfully His Incarnation. These two movements make up the spiritual realities of our anticipatory faith. We live in the present moment where grace is most potent and possible for our growth as disciples of Christ. Our attentiveness to the present moment is about using our time well and not squandering



the precious time we are given. And yet while we live in this present moment, our faith is all about anticipating what is to come, in particular WHO is to come.

We long for Jesus to come to us, be it at the end of time or the end of our personal pilgrimage here on earth. Jesus is coming to us. We want to meet the Lord as His free and faithful servants. We long to be brought into His presence to make a return on the gifts that He has entrusted to us. No one is more committed to your personal growth and maturity in holiness than Jesus. Holiness is not the treasured possession of the few, but meant to be the transformational reality for all of humanity. The Holy Trinity, Our God and the Love of our life, is personally committed to our future communion with them. The only path to that blessed communion is conversion and spiritual maturity, also known as holiness.

While we live in the present and joyfully anticipate the future, many of us are haunted by the past. The past is meant to remind of us two things, and two things only. We remember the past with gratitude for the blessing of God and the goodness of people in our past. The other lesson of the past is to grow beyond our sins and avoid those paths in the future. Unfortunately, many of us are trapped by the past and often haunted by sins and memories of the past. How do we address this reality?

If our sins are still haunting us because they have not been brought to God's mercy, get to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and celebrate God's immeasurable mercy. Don't take it to your grave, give it to the One who has conquered the grave! Find a good Confessor and seek him out for a more complete and cleansing review of life. In the Sacrament of Reconciliation we are minister's

of mercy, not your "betters" entitled to pass judgment. We priests witness to the Lord who went to Hell for all of us so that we might be spared that terrible end to our life. We profess the work of the Healer who can soothe any wound or expunge every disease. No one is more patient, more understanding, and more hopeful about our future growth as holy disciples than our Lord. The Father wants us to become His beloved sons and daughters, and the Holy Spirit longs to dwell within us to accomplish the works of mercy.

If by chance you are haunted by sins you have confessed but still regret, ask for the Lord's continued healing. Sin always wounds us; the longer and greater the sin, the deeper the wound. Only mercy and gratitude can fill that wound with life and hope. Ask the Lord to help you remember past offenses and failings in the light of His mercy. When we do that, regret can be replaced by genuine thanks. Shame can be replaced by eternal hope. Jesus sees the whole person that we are, and loves us more than we will ever know until we stand before Him.

What's your Catholic Catechism IQ?

It is the 25th anniversary of the publication of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, under (now saint) Pope John Paul II, who wrote, "The Catechism is offered to every individual who asks us to give an account of the hope that is in us (cf. 1 Pet 3:15) and who wants to know what the Catholic Church believes." Every adult Catholic is asked to prayerfully "digest" the Catechism. These questions (which will cover the whole CCC during this year) can help break it down in small bites.

THE CREEDS

- Early on, the Church wanted to gather the essential 1. elements of its faith into summaries, intended especially for candidates seeking this.
- 2. Professions of faith summarize what Christians believe, on account of what is usually their first word in Latin, they are called this.
- 3. Symbolizing the fullness of faith by the Apostles, it is customary to reckon the Articles of Faith as this number.
- 4. Two Creeds hold a special place in the Church's life. The Nicene Creed, and this Creed, which the CCC follows.
- 5. Formulated in 325 and 381 AD, the Nicene Creed draws its great authority from the fact that it stems from the first two Ecumenical .





What is an Advent Wreath?

PSR Corner We recently spoke of the Jesse Tree. Now we ask, What is an Advent wreath? The Advent wreath is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the liturgical calendar of the Western church. It is usually an evergreen wreath with four candles, sometimes with a fifth, white candle in the center. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading, devotional time and prayers. An additional candle is lit during each subsequent week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit. Many Advent wreaths include a fifth, Christ candle which is lit at Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. The custom is observed both in family settings and at public church services.

DETROIT — On Nov. 18, 2017 a cold and relentlessly rainy Saturday here, the Catholic Church beatified Fr. Solanus Casey, Detroit's most beloved and famous Capuchin friar, moving him a big step closer to canonization. Casey, who died in 1957 at 86, was a Wisconsin native, the son of Irish immigrants. Because of struggles in Capuchin seminary classes taught almost exclusively in German, he'd been ordained a "simplex priest" in 1904. That meant he was denied the priestly faculties of preaching homilies and hearing confessions. Consequently, priestly assignments meant mostly simple jobs: serving as the monastery door-

keeper, training altar boys, moderating the Ladies Altar Society.

Nonetheless, in New York, Detroit and in Huntington, Indiana, where he served, people found a readiness to listen and a deep faith in the priest who answered the door. They also found that when Casey prayed for their intentions, prayers were answered with amazing frequency. As the years went by, healings were reported, dangerous surgeries averted, alienated people mysteriously reconciled.

By his beatification, six decades after his death, it was clear that many Solanus stories from the 1930s, '40s and '50s had never dimmed or died. Detroit, which had unofficially "canonized" him during his lifetime, remembered his unflagging support for the Detroit Tigers, his love of hot dogs with onions, his sense of humor, his devotion to his large Irish family.

In addition, the Motor City never forgot that during the Depression when the city's automobile factories closed, Casey helped to start the Capuchin's soup kitchen to feed the hungry. The kitchen is still operating today.

The beatification rite preceded the liturgy for which Cardinal Angelo Amato, prefect of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints and papal delegate, was the presider. After Detroit Archbishop Allen Vigneron read a formal request for beatification, an apostolic letter from Pope Francis was read.

Then Amato held up the decree declaring that Venerable Fr. Solanus Casey would now be known as "Blessed Solanus Casey." Applause rocked the stadium where, on any other day, the only heroes are those who score touchdowns or field goals.
