Saying, Doing, or Being?

St. Paul tells us in his letter to the Ephesians that we are saved through grace: God's actions of sending his Son to die for us, and raising Jesus from the dead show the love God has for us. It comes entirely from God. We are saved by our faith in Jesus, but even that faith comes from God. So when Paul says that no one can boast about being saved, he means that we can't add up our good deeds like reward points for heaven. He also means that we can't brag about our faith because we can recite the creed or answer an altar call. So if being saved is not a matter of saying the


right things, or doing good deeds, what is it?

The answer comes from the gospel. Jesus tells us that he will be lifted up, or crucified, so that we can believe in him and have eternal life. Notice he doesn't give a list of facts about God that we are required to believe. When we "believe in" someone, we put our love and trust in that person. We want to be with that person as much as we can. We know that we are loved and so respond by giving love. Our response of love is not just a happy feeling. It inspires us to stop being selfish and start noticing that others need our help. Jesus de-

scribes it as living in the light: we are not ashamed to help someone, forgive someone, or comfort someone. While we do not force our faith on others, we don't hide it either. Our life is in the light, open to anyone who wants to see what God has done for us.

That brings us back to the question about salvation: it is not something we do or say. It is what God does for us. Our response of faith is also his gift. So when we recognize all that God has done for us and believe in his Son Jesus, the Spirit will guide us to live that faith and share it with others.

Cemetery Update

Dear Parishioners,

As part of our ongoing discussion and discernment within the Finance Committee we have come to the decision to remove the sale of any acreage from the process as we move ahead with the expansion of the cemetery. It is my thought and that of the Committee that we can accomplish the expansion without the necessity of selling the land to help fund any of the cost.

A handful of you either sent in your comments in the form of a letter or talked with myself or other Committee members as we continued our deliberations. I want to thank all of those who did so, even the one or two anonymous letters that we received at the beginning of the process. I place more value on signed letters that open the door to dialogue and conversation, but even anonymous ones can let you know where at least one person stands with their opinion.

In the future we may reexamine the issue of land sales and have to request the guidance of the Archdiocese. Known or unknown, the land actually belongs to the Archdiocese and we use it at their discretion. The Archdiocese is not some sort of tyrannical landlord that is watching our every move or interfering in daily operations. Rather they connect us to the larger Church in a unity of belief and loving obedience. The Archdiocese, and our Archbishop, want each and every parish to thrive and bear fruit abundantly in Christ. As Archbishop Carlson was fond of saying on his arrival, he desires all of us to be "Alive in Christ!"

In the next few years we will have to examine a much weightier issue than just expanding the cemetery. Replacing Founders Hall will be a massive commitment, if that is the direction the parish is going, in terms of growth and capital improvements. Such a building would probably be a multimillion dollar structure that will take as many years to finance as our church. For those with short memories, fund raising and payment of the debt went from 1997 until 2017, so it was a twenty year jog of extraordinary fundraising and giving on the part of the parish. Such a commitment would have to be discerned and planned for accordingly. If policies remain the same within the Archdiocese, we will have to raise half of the funds of the building before the Archdiocese considers lending us the other half as they did with our new church and facilities.

That day will come, and there will be a variety of opinions and ideas on the best course to plot. I suspect there might be rather intense disagreements on the numerous decisions to be made. It will do more to reveal the character and integrity of individuals more than the quiet periods of implicit agreement. Such is the nature of things. You and I strive to be like Our Lord. We are in it for the long haul with one another. We pray to overcome the temptation to "take our marbles and go home" when faced with disagreement. We strive to overcome the pull of sin to form "sides" on an issue of importance and work for consensus rather than division in the hopes of "getting our way." It's not easy, because all of us suffer from massive amounts of unexamined and unchallenged pride. Pride always divides, always separates, always seeks its own end. Pride takes solace in being "right". We all need to pray for a daily increase in humility.






PSR Corner

The month of March is traditionally dedicated to St. Joseph, the patron of the universal Church, the foster father of our Lord, the head of the Holy Family. When one thinks of his role in salvation history, we can be confident of his desire to bring “our own history” to salvation. Consider ways to seek the intercession of St.

Joseph in your family life and in your family prayer. St. Teresa of Avila wrote: “It seems that to other saints our Lord has given power to help us in only one kind of necessity; but this glorious saint, I know by my own experience, assists us in all kinds of necessities....I only request, for the love of God, that whoever will not believe me will test the truth of what I say, for he will see by experience how great a blessing it is to recommend oneself to this glorious Patriarch and to be devout to him....Whoever wants a master to instruct him how to pray, let him choose this glorious saint for his guide, and he will not lose his way.”



Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the Life of the Church: St. Patrick (Feast: March 17)



How does one convert an island of people? Preaching?
Acts of Charity? What about signs and wonders
that accompanied both to confirm the message of the Gospel?
This is what is personally attested in the great life and ministry of
St. Patrick, the Apostle of Ireland.

“Patrick’s miraculous encounters with the druids were so spectacular that modern historians discount them as legends. But as extraordinary as the miracles were, the earliest documents reported them as facts. Patrick’s wonders set the stage for the conversion of Ireland. Why should he not have expected divine interventions at such significant moments in his missionary venture?


“Even though Patrick had exposed the emptiness of Laoghaire’s religion, the ruler did not become a Christian. He made two decisions, however, that significantly advanced Patrick’s work. He gave Patrick permission to preach the gospel in Ireland, and he ensured Patrick’s personal safety.

“From that time, Patrick crisscrossed the island, making disciples everywhere he went. In a relatively short time, he baptized tens of thousands of converts and built hundreds of churches, staffing them with Irish priests and deacons. He founded many monasteries and schools to care for the passionate youths who decided to follow him to Christ. In 444, scarcely a dozen years after Patrick arrived, he established Ireland’s first cathedral church at Armagh, which quickly became a center of Christian education and church administration.

“By the time of Patrick’s death around 461, he had completely dislodged the ancient paganism. The whole island had become thoroughly and permanently Christian. Now that’s a miracle I challenge anyone to dismiss.”


