

He Alone is Lord

When I hear the line from the first reading about not molesting or oppressing an alien, I think of the movie E.T., in which the children help the extraterrestrial just because he needs help. What the reading calls aliens are immigrants or newcomers. They lived among the Hebrews but were not Jews themselves. The Lord reminds the people that they were once aliens themselves. They should not make the same mistake the Egyptians did when they mistreated the Israelites. God uses the same logic in commanding them to take care of widows and orphans. Treat them like family, or else your own wives and children will be in the same situation. Immigrants, widows, orphans, borrowers—all must be treated with compassion.

The reason for such compassion should be deeper than just fear of punishment. "Do to others as you would have them do to

you," Jesus said (Luke 6:31). Today's Gospel has a similar saving: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). Jesus called this the second commandment. The first is to love God wholly and completely, heart, mind, and soul. If the second commandment is the Golden Rule, the first might be called the Diamond Rule. If you think about it, in order to keep the first commandment, you have to be keeping the second as well.

Jesus said that whatever you do for the poor, the homeless, the sick, or prisoners, you do for him (Matthew 25:31-46). Mother Teresa could see Jesus in the poorest of the poor. Jesus himself showed compassion even to sinners. We can't really say we love God if we don't love the people God created.

So that gives us two reasons to love our neighbor. First, because God lives in other people, so loving God means loving God wherever God is found. Second, God loves them, so if we are to be holy, we must be like God. What does that mean? Remember the saying that "charity begins at home"? That is only true because it is easier to love family and friends, but charity doesn't end there. If we truly love God, we will extend our charity to those outside our homes. People are probably still rebuilding after the earthquakes in Japan, tornadoes in America, floods in India, and other disasters, and every city has some kind of homeless shelters. You say you love God? Let's see you love your neighbor.

Heaven—Hell & Purgatory

Dear parishioners and friends,

The month of November is marked by two great Feast Days: All Saints and All Souls. All Saints celebrates all of the holy men and women who have gone before us and share in the glory and communion of God. The Church promotes our devotion to the saints as a way for deepening our communion with them and drawing inspiration from their life and help through their intercession. The Saints are not capable of answering our prayers, only God can do that. But the Saints are yearning to pray with us and for us. When we "pray to saints" what we are really doing is asking them to intercede for us. If you don't have any favorite saints, I would invite you to do some more exploration and develop a friendship with them. My spiritual friends are the Blessed Mother, John the Baptist, St. John Chrysostom, and Gregory the Great as a well as a few others. Cultivate a new friendship with someone who loves God and wants you to share your eternity with them.

All Souls and all of November is marked by praying for all of the faithful departed. Few things are as important as praying for the dead. None of us knows an entire person's life story, and we are not privy to all of their struggles and possible sins. Sin is so pervasive in our lives that more than half our Sacraments are directed at healing us of our sins. If by chance we go before God without all of our sins reconciled by God's mercy and our atonement, Purgatory is there to help complete the work of our conversion. Our prayers help the Poor Souls in their final act of conversion. Only those free from all ef-

fects of sin will go to Heaven. For those of us still wrestling with sin and grace, we can hope that Purgatory will offer us the merciful opportunity to complete the work of atonement for our sins and the conversion of our hearts. Please pray for the dead and perhaps even visit their grave to lift them up to the mercy of God. Since we don't know the fate of the departed, don't prematurely consign "Uncle Tom" to heaven and never offer a prayer for him again. I hope all of my beloved dead are in heaven, but I pray for them every day that they will be genuinely sorry for their sins and seek God's immense mercy.

Sadly, it is likely that not everyone will be sorry for their sins. Those of us who remain unrepentant and unconverted to God's love and truth will go to Hell. The damned are not consigned to Hell because God is some kind of sadist. The damned will be there by their own free will. I pray no one puts themselves in this permanent state. God has done everything to insure our salvation short of violating our free will. We have a choice to make: live like future citizens of the Kingdom, or live like wretched creatures that have forsaken their Creator. There will be no sorrow in Hell. If that were the case, sorrow would open the way to repentance. Hell will be a state of unfettered pride, anger and envy. It's not pleasant to think about Hell, and it shouldn't be. We should be striving for personal holiness so that we receive our adoption completely as God's beloved sons and daughters.

30th Sunday in Ordinary Time—October 29, 2017

Every PSR class has a chosen patron saint which catechists help students learn about. After 8 years, students will have learned more about 8 folks in God's Holy Hall of Fame. Meet the 4th grade patron: St. Katharine Drexel. Katharine Drexel was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on November 26, 1858. When Katharine grew up, she was a very active Catholic. She directed her energies and her fortune to helping the poor and forgotten. Her work for Jesus would be among the African American and Native American people. In 1891, Katharine began a new religious community of missionaries. They were called the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. Katharine became known as Mother Katharine. Mother Katharine inherited her family's great fortune. She used the money for wonderful works of charity. She and her sisters built schools, convents, and churches. In 1915, they established Xavier University in New Orleans. Mother Katharine died on March 3, 1955, at the age of ninety-seven. She was de-



clared "blessed" by Pope John Paul II on November 20, 1988, and canonized on October 1, 2000. She is the second native-born United States citizen to be declared a saint. The story of Saint Katharine will help children rethink the value of money and how it is best used, and value treating people with compassion.

A Healing Miracle Through the Intercession of Katharine Drexel

The miraculous healing of Bob Gutherman's eardrum provided the first of two miracles which led to Katharine Drexel being declared a saint.

St. Katharine Drexel (1858-1955) is founder of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament and is known for founding schools and missions to serve blacks and Indians. She was beatified by Pope St. John Paul II in 1988 and canonized in 2000. Bob Gutherman of Bristol Township, Pennsylvania was present for both ceremonies. Not only is he personally devoted to Mother Katharine, but it was the miraculous healing of his eardrum through her intercession which provided the first of two miracles which led to her being declared a saint.

Bob tells the story: "I was 14 years old and in the 9th grade in 1974, when I developed a severe ear infection. I had been to a series of different doctors, who were treating it as a normal

ear infection. I was in severe pain. It affected my right ear. Some of my brothers had done work at the motherhouse of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament in Bensalem, Pennsylvania, where we lived. They performed maintenance and janitorial work, and helped out in the library. They had told the sisters that I was not feeling well. One of the sisters spoke to my mother, telling her 'we believe that Mother Katharine is in heaven. We'll pray to her, and we want you to say this prayer that Bob's pain will either become more tolerable or go away completely.'"


"Not long after, I went into the hospital for an exploratory operation. The doctor told us that there were three bones in the ear that you needed to be able to hear, and two of mine in the right ear had been destroyed by the infection. He said I'd never hear in my right ear again. A few days later, I told my mother that I could hear fine out of both my ears. The doctor gave me a hearing test and confirmed it." "Was the pain gone?" "Yes. It stopped after I had the exploratory operation." "What did the doctor say to this?" "I went back for a check-up. The doctor was talking to himself and writing notes. He was saying, 'I don't believe what I'm seeing. Your body is reconstructing its anatomy.' There had been a lot of damage to my ear, and he expected to do reconstructive surgery. But he told us that if my body continued to heal, he wouldn't have to. He didn't. My mother told him that the family had been praying to Katharine, and thought it was a miracle. He responded, 'Well, I have no other explanation for it."

"And you told the sisters?" "Yes. We went knocking on their door, saying 'We have a story to tell you.' The sister we spoke to listened, and then asked us to write the story down and send it to her. Sometime later, we got a call from our Archdiocese of Philadelphia, wanting us to come in to tell the story again. We were told that an investigation was beginning, looking into my healing as a possible miracle. The investigation continued for the next 14 years. There was a series of tests and doctors I saw. In Rome, their doctors reviewed the findings. In 1988, it was declared to be a miracle attributed to Katharine's intercession."

"The miracle being that two of the bones in your right ear had been miraculously restored and you could hear normally without any pain?" "Yes. My doctor testified that those two bones were gone, and then returned. I mean, say you lost an arm in an accident. Would it ever grow back? No. Well, two bones in my right ear did." St. Paul Library / Lighthouse CD Resources






Discussing moral issues with family and friends can be a challenge in a culture that strongly promotes the idea that there is no objective truth. 


