

DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

When we were baptized, we were baptized into Christ's death. Take a moment to ponder these profound words. We were baptized into death. In every sense of the word, we are asked to die. This is not just about our final death but about daily deaths due to inconvenience, discomfort, pain, loss, or others' needs. This is an incredible epiphany given the way we very often approach our lives. We do everything to avoid death, let alone encounter it! Many avoid pain, discomfort, inconvenience, uneasiness, change, interference, and suffering of any kind. We put a lot of energy into finding the easiest and least inconvenient way through many things. Even holding the door open for a stranger or saying hello to someone in the store can be major undertakings.

We are called to die. One of the biggest wake-up calls we can have is realizing that life is not about us! There are millions of other people sharing life on this planet with whom I have a relationship. Does my life celebrate those relationships? The most distracting question we can ask is, "What do I want to do?" The more focused, faith-filled question is, "What do I need to do?" What I need to do may not be what I want to do. However, asking this question more frequently will teach us how to more purposefully and intentionally live so we can be a life giving vessel for others. When we learn to live more sacrificially, to put the needs of others before our own, and to not always seek our own self-interest, we become aware of what baptism into Christ's death is really all about. These are the roots of virtue and the seedbed for

justice, tolerance, solidarity, love, and peace.

Learning how to accept all the "small deaths" and sacrifices life calls us to teaches us how to approach our final death. All deaths ask us to empty ourselves into something or someone else. Whether we empty ourselves into the heart and soul of another human being or empty ourselves into God at the moment of our final death, new life is always received and nurtured. A heart that exclusively seeks its own interest is a heart that is closed to love. A heart that pours itself out to others and is content with being emptied is a heart that has been touched by and open to mercy. It is a heart that overflows with joy.



PROPOSAL FOR UPGRADE OF CAMERAS AND INSTALLATION OF PROJECTOR IN THE CHURCH



We are interested in upgrading the cameras that are mounted in church AND install a ceiling mount projector.

We have been blessed with the use of Stan Kostecki's HD camera since the first week

we started livestreaming. We have decided to upgrade our in-house system to HD cameras and new controls, computer, and monitors so we can continue to live stream our Sunday Masses, and the weekday Masses as long as the social distancing continues.

The ceiling mounted projector will allow us to control it from the same system as the cameras, and incorporate projecting the worship aids onto the screen as well as on the streamed video, at least while the hymnals are not in the church pews. Then beyond that we can produce better quality videos of weddings and other special occasions.

The cost for all the materials needed for these upgrades comes to about \$13,000. We hope to do the installation with volunteer labor.

I am certainly many of us have benefitted from our ability to livestream our Masses during the Covid-19 shutdown. We are asking for donations from our parishioners in order to make this project happen sooner than later for us.

ATTENTION EMPLOYEES & VOLUNTEERS

This includes those new to service and those who are currently in service. In addition to attending a live Protecting God's Children workshop, all clergy, volunteers and employees will register for an updated background screening, view two new online training modules on abuse reporting and the Code of Ethical Conduct, and agree to the updated Code of Ethical Conduct. 

A SUMMER FAITH/REASON RESOURCE FOR HIGH SCHOOL FOLKS AND UP: CLARITASU.COM

Many people have heard of Bishop Robert Barron and of his website <u>WordonFire.org</u>. A gent who is lesser known but is behind the scenes as the content director for the website is Brandon Vogt. Brandon is following in the footsteps of Bishop Barron to help spread and bring clarity to the Catholic faith. Check out the website at **ClaritasU.com** and get a trial run for only \$1. Brandon discusses hot button topics of the day in user friendly ways.





Brandon recently wrote a book called *What to Say and How to Say It – Discuss Your Catholic Faith with Confidence and Clarity.* It is based on some of the topics covered in ClaritasU such as "Answering Atheism, Evil and Suffering, Trusting the Gospels, Explaining the Eucharist, Abortion, Same-Sex Marriage and Transgenderism." Here is an extended quote from the introduction that is worth pondering.

The Pew Research Center recently polled thousands of adults across the country, from all different religions, asking, "What do you personally think it the best thing to do when someone disagrees with you about religion?" They were given three choices: 1. Try to persuade the other person to change their mind (i.e., evangelize). 2. Try to understand the other person's belief but agree to disagree (i.e., just listen) 3. Avoid discussing religion (i.e., ignore the topic).

Around 67 percent of Americans chose the second option, to just listen. In other words, the large majority of us are fine hearing what other people think about religion, but we definitely don't want to share *our own* views, or defend those views.

Another 27 percent chose the third option, meaning they don't want to talk about religion *at all*. They prefer to just ignore it. They don't want to listen *or* speak about it. They're likely afraid the discussion will get heated or produce hurt feelings.

This leaves only 6 percent of Americans who chose the first option, meaning just 6 percent of adults are open to discussing their own religious beliefs and even, perhaps, trying to persuade other people to change their mind.

Now, as a Catholic who thinks the Catholic faith is true and that everyone should consider it – indeed, my last book was titled *Why I Am Catholic (and You Should Be Too)* – that number is depressingly low. But the result gets even worse for us Catholics. When you filter the responses by religion, you find that only 2 percent of Catholics chose the first option. Among all religious groups, including nonreligious groups like atheists and agnostics, this put Catholics at the absolute bottom. In other words, Catholics are the *least likely* of any religious group to try to persuade people to change their mind about religion. Just think about that: 98 percent of Catholics do not want to talk about their own religious views with people who disagree.

Now, to be sure, most Catholics love their faith. We love the Mass and the sacraments. We love God. We embrace the Church's moral teachings. But for some reason, we're afraid of openly discussing these things with friends, family, and coworkers, especially those who reject Catholicism. Why is that? Well, after struggling with this myself, and then talking with hundreds of other Catholics, I'm convinced it's because nobody taught us how to talk about these things.... That's why I wrote this book. My goal is to get you clear about each of these subjects, because clarity breeds confidence. The more clearly you understand each topic, the more confident you'll be about it. And the more confident you are, the *more willing and happier* you'll be to discuss these things."




