

The Prophet's Profit

It's no coincidence that the first reading shows the prophet Elisha feeding a crowd of people like Jesus in the gospel. If you want to compare miracles, Elisha did his first, but Jesus did it better. Elisha had a hundred people to feed with twenty barley loaves and a handful of fresh grain. Jesus had five thousand people and only five loaves and a couple fish. So was Jesus trying to show up Elisha?

Neither Jesus nor Elisha ever did a miracle for their own benefit. The very next story in 2 Kings about Elisha is the one where he cured Naaman, the king's servant, of leprosy. (2 Kgs 5:1:19) When Naaman

realized he was cured, he came back to Elisha and offered him a gift in thanksgiving. Elisha refused the gift, because it would imply that Elisha did the miracle, while the prophet knew that God had cured him. Jesus also refused to benefit from feeding the crowds. They came to take him away and make him king, but he went up to his place of prayer on the mountain.

Jesus' miracle of feeding the five thousand was not done just for the crowd. He was using it to teach the disciples something important. He knew there would be times when they felt they were not holy enough or good enough preachers, to spread the gospel over the world. So he showed them what God can do with our meager abilities.

There are millions of people hungry for the good news that Jesus brings to the world. Remember the miracle of the loaves when you only have a few dollars to give to the missions, when you're not sure you know enough to teach someone about Jesus, when you don't know how to invite someone to come back to church. And remember that you do those things, not to make you look holy, but to let God show his loving power.

There are places where you can peek into Seaven —here's how to find them

These "thin places" are all around us, if we know how to look.

There are places where the veil between heaven and earth is stretched thin. These thin places are where we build shrines and Churches. We make pilgrimages to get to them, hike up mountains to find them, and go on retreat to encounter them. We also find them in rare moments when transcendent beauty crams itself into a single instant that seems to last forever. They echo back to us in music and through art. They may surprise us by showing up in the cooing of a baby, a child slipping her hand into yours, or in a quiet, early morning cup of coffee on the back porch. God's voice whispers to us in these special moments and places.

For me, the place where the veil is almost translucent is in a church during Mass. From there, an infinite number of thin places spill out into the wildness of the world where we stumble upon them as we round random corners. They descend upon us like a sunset and spill out over the horizon. They're the sort of places we want to take a picture of to save forever but the photo can never do it justice. Maybe the fact they're impossible to save for later is what makes them so precious.

Afterwards, the experience of being in a thin place is hard to describe. What was it you felt during Mass? What made you spontaneously applaud when you saw the sun melt into lake Michigan? Why did your heart leap when your early morning walk wandered through fog that hung like incense over the landscape? These experiences are difficult to describe not because we're not good with words, but because they're mysteries that touch the infinite and words cannot contain them.

Thin places are often a specific place or at least a type of place. For instance, the cathedral downtown, a mountaintop vista, or a starry sky. But we may encounter one in a surprising location or circumstance. The places themselves aren't magic, though; they're more like a window that provides a better glimpse of heaven.

How do we find "thin places"?

The difficulty I have is that I'm often too distracted to look through that window. I miss so many of these places because I'm in the thick of my own anxiety, staring at my phone, or simply being careless with how I use my time.

The way to find thin places is easy to explain, but hard to carry out in real life. It's easy because all it requires is to be willing and ready to look. This means patiently cultivating inner silence and waiting for the mystery to unfold. If I know that Mass is one of those places, I cannot allow my attendance to become spotty or allow myself to be distracted while I'm there. Or if I know that once a year I need at least a few days in a secluded spot in the middle of nature to be alone, I have to protect those few days on my schedule. We've all felt a sense of the sacred in any number of places – heaven is closer than we think – but we all too easily neglect to make the effort to return with any regularity.

Once we know where a thin place is, and how to recognize one when we encounter it, it's as easy as just being there and having an open heart – which is also the hard part.

The benefits

The effort is worth it, though, because as human beings we require moments in the presence of the divine. This is because we're more than our bodies and we need to feed our souls, too. Our lives are not purely material and we need to spiritually renew ourselves on a regular basis.

Spending time in a thin place resets our perspective on what's important in life. What truly matters is the calm, still place around which the busyness of daily life circles. That's where we rediscover ourselves by renewing our connection with God. The longer we stay in the center, the further our anxieties and distractions spin away.

Thin places are most of all created out of love. When our love reaches out and touches God's love, that's when the spark happens, and it's a spark that can light your soul on fire.





Dear Friends in Christ,

Since 1956, we have sent over 45 Archdiocesan priests to serve the people of Bolivia, one of the poorest countries in South America. This year, we offer praise and thanks to our Lord, as Fr. Patrick Hayden and Fr. James Michler both celebrate 25 years of missionary service to the apostolate. Their perseverance and endurance in an Archdiocese where there is only one priest for every twenty-thousand Catholics is an outstanding testimony to their faith and to the support and encouragement they receive through the faithful of our local Archdiocese.

As Pope Francis reminds us, "the drive to go forth and give, to go out from ourselves, to keep pressing forward in our sowing of the good seed, remains ever present", and so our mission continues (EG 21). He goes on to say that, "new evangelization calls for personal involvement on the part of each of the baptized. Every Christian is challenged, here and now, to be actively engaged in evangelization." (EG 120). While we are all called to be missionary disciples to our friends, family, and neighbors, we are also called to evangelize to all the ends of the earth. Although many of us do not serve in the mission field, we can and should support those who are evangelizing to the marginalized and forming missionary disciples in global communities, including our priests in La Paz, Bolivia.

Without the prayers and sacrifices of the people of the Archdiocese of St. Louis, Our Latin America Apostolate could not offer formation, catechesis, social services, and pastoral care to the parish community of Maria Reina. Ask God how He is calling you to participate in this mission financially. Please pray for our Latin America Apostolate, missionaries, and all involved with this ministry. 
Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the Life of the Church: St. Jgnatius of Loyola (Least: July 31)

St. Ignatius Loyola (1491-1556), gave to the world the original Company of Jesus, or the Jesuits. There are various testimonies of mystical phenomena associated with St. Ignatius. Several of these are recorded in the book, <u>Mystics, Marvels and Miracles in the Lives of the Saints</u> by Joan Carroll Cruz. These include eyewitness testimony of Ignatius levitating on one occasion as well others witnessing him being surrounded with brilliant light and even with a flame of fire. Below is an account from the book "Saints Who Raised the Dead" Tan Publishing (pages 122-223)

Ignatius had many supernatural visitations and was accomplished in discerning spirits and fighting the devil (see famous artwork below "The Miracles of St. Ignatius by Peter Paul Rubens). Ignatius is famous for his Spiritual Exercises which have influenced countless people for centuries. Bartoli's biography of Ignatius gives the history of 100 miracles attributed to the saint. One time in Barcelona, about 1524 or so, Ignatius was returning from the convent of the Dominican nuns. Passing through the street of Belloc he heard loud cries and lamentations. A man named Lessani (Lasano), in a fit of despair for



having lost a lawsuit against his brother, had hanged himself. Ignatius, a practical, active and decision-making man, quickly cut him down. Efforts were made to revive the man, but they were in vain. Ignatius prayed in tears, sorrowfully lamenting the fact that a man should die in such a manner. The bystanders joined in. Then Ignatius arose and pronounced the Holy Name of Jesus over Lessani. He instantly opened his eyes, came to himself, and ex-





pressed sorrow over his action. He then made his confession, received the Sacraments, and soon afterward expired. This account is taken from the official Acts of Canonization of St. Ignatius Loyola. Bystanders and John Pasquale verified that Lessani had really been dead. The miracle caused a great stir in the area.
