

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A Lot of Nerve

I always thought it took a lot of nerve for Elijah to beg that poor woman for a meal. Even though, during a long drought, she has only a bit of her food to give to her son, he still asks her to make a little cake for himself. It would be easier to understand if we heard the verse before this reading begins: God tells the prophet that he has "commanded a widow...to feed you." (1Kgs 17:9)

Now the widow was not aware of this command. But she does as Elijah asked. That took even more faith than Elijah showed. She was afraid for herself and the boy. But she had enough faith to risk the last of her food to help someone else. She shows us that we are obeying God's commands when we trust him. Most of those commands come not from a vision, but from someone's cry for help.

I wonder how many good people have passed up a chance to do God's will because they didn't hear directly from God what to do. When you hear that a tornado destroyed a nearby neighborhood, do you hear God asking you to help? Do you hear God's voice when you read in the bulletin that the food pantry is running low? When a storm knocks out the power on your block, do you think God is asking you to check on the elderly widow next door?

And if you do hear God calling in these examples, how do you respond? You can be like the rich people in the gospel and just give your ten percent. Or do you have the faith of the woman whose few cents were all that she had. It takes a lot of courage to trust God completely. Do you have what it takes?

Why Do Catholics Light Votive Candles?

Is it some sort of superstition?

Almost nothing says "Catholic" like votive candles, especially if they are placed before images or statues in a church setting. When a film or television show wants the audience to know a character is Catholic, a confessional or a rack of votive candles is sure to turn up.

Confession, of course is a sacrament, but what about those candles? Are they a superstitious practice?

Actually, just the opposite.

"I am the light of the world; he who follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12).

At our Easter Vigil, when the deacon or priest enters the darkened church with the single Easter candle, he intones, "Christ, our Light." To which the congregation replies, "Thanks be to God." This recalls how Jesus came into our world of sin and death to bring the light of God to us.

Besides being used to illuminate the places where the early Christians celebrated Mass, candles were also lighted at the tombs of martyrs. Father William Saunders explains that "there is evidence that lit candles or oil lamps were burned at the tombs of saints, particularly martyrs, by the 200s, and before sacred images and relics by the 300s."

In this context the "light signifies our prayer offered in faith coming into the light of God. With the light of

faith, we petition our Lord in prayer, or petition the saint to pray with us and for us to the Lord." The word "vigil" comes from the Latin *vigilia* and refers to keeping watch. The vigil candle that is lit remains so for a period of time (either a certain number of hours or a few days) and symbolizes how the person desires "to remain present to the Lord in prayer even though we may depart and go about our daily business." It also reminds the individual how the saint is constantly praying for their petitions.

Another word for these candles is a "votive" candle and comes fro the Latin *votum*, meaning promise, dedication or simply "prayer." It reinforces the idea that the candles represent our prayers before God.

As humans we are body and soul and our prayers often need to be expressed in a physical, tangible way. This helps our soul be at rest and is a way to deepen our spirituality. Similar to incense, the light of the candles is a physical reminder that points our souls to God. We light them not because we believe our prayers will be better heard by God, but because we need something visual to connect our body and soul. In our St. Joseph Chapel we have 7-day candles (suggested offering is \$3 each) available in the front at the Holy Family statues and also in the back by the painting of Our Lady of Fatima. Also in the back are smaller 8-hour candles (offering of \$1 each). The code for the Chapel door is 145. Please put your offering in the envelopes provided and place the envelope on the counter in the sacristy.

Mysteries, Marvels and Miracles in the life of Christ and His Church St. Francis Xavier Cabrini (Feast— November 13)


Mother Cabrini was canonized in 1946, the first American saint.

Four miracles had been credited to Mother Cabrini since her death on Dec. 22, 1917, at age of 67. The first two miracles essential to beatification, Nov. 13, 1938, were Sister Delfina, miraculously cured of intestinal fever after

doctors had given up hope, and the saving of the sight of Peter Smith, a child, in Columbia Hospital in New York after he had been accidentally given a blinding solution of nitrate of silver. Both miracles occurred after prayers requesting intercession of the dead Mother Cabrini.

The two additional miracles both occurred in Lombard, Italy, near where Mother Cabrini was born. The first was the curing of Paulo Pezini, a chauffeur, of a chronic disease after doctors had given up hope. The other was the recovery of Ettore Paggetti, a locomotive engineer, from burns after medical assistance had been declared futile. Prayers for Mother Cabrini's intercession were offered in both instances.

In the book, <u>Nothing Short of a Miracle</u>, author Patricia Treece writes about the healing of the infant Peter Smith mentioned above. Almost immediately after the miracle (of his restored vision), the baby comes down with pneumonia. His jubilant doctors plunge back into fear once more, for infant Peter's temperature, in this pre-antibiotic era, is so high at 107, it appears he will die. This time the summoned Mother Bacigalupo practically laughs at the anxious doctors as she says, "Mother Cabrini did not restore his vision for him to die of pneumonia." But again the Sisters spend the night in prayer. By



morning, another miracle: fever down, pneumonia gone.

In 1938 Mother Cabrini is beatified by the Catholic Church, Several miracles are cited as signs from God in favor of this step, one being the healing of Peter Smith. Seventeen years old, he attends the ceremonies in St. Peter's, Rome, where onlookers notice his striking and expressive eyes that need no glasses and his smooth-skinned face. Only those who know to look carefully for them make out the two tiny scars where deadly nitrate solution once burned a furrow down his cheeks.

All the way to his death in 2002, Fr. Peter Smith will love to talk about Mother Cabrini, whose prayers to God when he was an infant, as he put it, "show the age of miracles has not passed."

It's an excellent balance between character development, keeping pretty faithful to the story, and teaching the audience something they perhaps forgot.
