Welcome

On behalf of the pastor and staff of Immaculate Heart of Mary, we are glad to offer this little booklet containing both practical and spiritual information concerning the life, faith and practices of the universal and local Church here at IHM. This booklet also includes personal contacts and numbers regarding ministries and works for you to generously consider. We offer all these prayers, works, joys and sufferings to the Lord through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, whose intercession as our patroness we prayerfully seek.

Regarding an overview “vision” of our role as Church, few texts summarize it as eloquently and succinctly as the opening articles of the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

THE LIFE OF MAN - TO KNOW AND LOVE GOD

CCC 1 God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life. For this reason, at every time and in every place, God draws close to man. He calls man to seek him, to know him, to love him with all his strength. He calls together all men, scattered and divided by sin, into the unity of his family, the Church. To accomplish this, when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son as Redeemer and Savior. In his Son and through him, he invites men to become, in the Holy Spirit, his adopted children and thus heirs of his blessed life.

CCC 2 So that this call should resound throughout the world, Christ sent forth the apostles he had chosen, commissioning them to proclaim the gospel: “Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age.” Strengthened by this mission, the apostles “went forth and preached everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the message by the signs that attended it.”

CCC 3 Those who with God’s help have welcomed Christ’s call and freely responded to it are urged on by love of Christ to proclaim the Good News everywhere in the world. This treasure, received from the apostles, has been faithfully guarded by their successors. All Christ’s faithful are called to hand it on from generation to generation, by professing the faith, by living it in fraternal sharing, and by celebrating it in liturgy and prayer.

With this unifying vision laid out by the Catechism, we present various opportunities for works of mercy and parish involvement here at IHM, past, present and future. These offer some of the principal ways that, as a parish, we have sought to respond to this call of the Lord and His Church.

Registration with the Parish

New families are asked to contact the Parish Office – or stop by the IHMformation Station after weekend Masses - to register and get information about the parish. Official registration with the office insures that you will receive mailed communications and envelope packets, if requested.

Registered parishioners are asked to keep the Parish Office informed of any contact information changes (i.e., moving, disconnecting old phone numbers, new cell numbers) as well as changes in family situations (i.e., marriages, a new birth in your family, older children who have left home, a death, or a divorce.) We also ask that if you are transferring to another parish that you please inform us of that life change as well.

“The Sunday celebration of the Lord’s Day and his Eucharist is at the heart of the Church’s life. “Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in light of the apostolic tradition and is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church.”

The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin.

The Seven Sacraments

The Sacraments are encounters of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, through which Divine life is given. The seven Sacraments span all stages of natural life and all important moments of the Christian life. Sacraments are classified as Christian Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist), Sacraments of Healing (Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick), and Sacraments of Service (Matrimony and Holy Orders). The Eucharist occupies a unique place as the Sacrament of Sacraments, and all the other Sacraments are ordered to it as to their end.

[CCC 1131, 1210, 1211]

Sacrament of Baptism

The Sacrament of Baptism is the foundation of Christian life, the entrance to the life in the Spirit and access to the other Sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from original sin, become heirs to the Kingdom of God, are incorporated into the Church and become sharers in the Mission of the Church. **[CCC 1213]**

Baptisms of infants and young children are celebrated for families who are members of the parish, usually on Sundays after the 11:15 am Mass. Parents must attend a preparation session before the baptism can be celebrated.

Appointments for the preparation session and baptism should be made with the Parish Office at 636-398-5270.

Baptisms of school age children and adults need to be arranged through our religious education program and/or a faith formation process called RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults).

Sacrament of Confirmation

The Sacrament of Confirmation perfects Baptismal grace, and through the gifts of the Holy Spirit helps us grow to Christian maturity. The Sacrament strengthens our bond with the Church, associates us more closely with her Mission and helps us bear witness to the Christian faith in words and deeds. **[CCC 1316]**

Confirmation is offered annually to eighth grade students. Candidates for this Sacrament are prepared through our weekly PSR classes and special events (i.e., retreats). (See PSR section in this booklet for more details.)

Adults wishing to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation are prepared according to a process designed specifically for their needs. This can take place via RCIA or personal instruction culminating in reception of the Sacrament at the Easter Vigil. Also, every year, on the Feast of Pentecost, the Archbishop confers the Sacrament of Confirmation at the Cathedral-Basilica for those adults who have requested and are sufficiently prepared to receive this Gift of the Spirit.

Sacrament of the Eucharist

The Sacrament of the Eucharist has its origin at the Last Supper when, on the night Jesus was betrayed, He instituted the Eucharistic Sacrifice of His Body and Blood. This He did in order to perpetuate the sacrifice of the cross throughout the ages until He comes again. In this Sacrament, Jesus entrusts to his Church a memorial of His death and Resurrection, the Sacrament of Love, a Sign of Unity and a Bond of Charity, in which Christ is consumed, and our minds are filled with grace and a pledge of future glory. The Eucharist is the sum and summary of our faith through the actions of the Holy Spirit and the Real Presence of Jesus; His Body and Blood become present under the form of bread and wine. It is through the Eucharist that each of us are nourished by Jesus to seek God's Will. **[CCC 1323, 1327]**

Children are generally prepared to receive their first Holy Communion when they reach the second grade. They are prepared via weekly PSR classes and special events (i.e., retreats). Older children may be prepared separately from the second graders.

Adults who wish to be initiated into the sacrament of Holy Communion should contact the Parish Office about the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults).

The Blessed Sacrament may be brought to anyone unable to attend Mass, due to health problems. Please contact the Parish Office at 636-398-5270.

Sacrament of Reconciliation

The Sacrament of Reconciliation or Penance was instituted by Jesus, the physician of our souls and bodies, who forgave the sins of the paralytic and willed that his Church continue, in the power of the Holy Spirit, His work of healing and salvation. Jesus has willed that the life and actions of his Church be a sign and instrument of forgiveness and reconciliation. **[CCC 1442]**

Children are generally prepared to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time when they reach the second grade. They are prepared through the weekly PSR classes. Older children may be prepared separately from the second graders.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is offered at IHM on **Saturday mornings after the 8:00 am Mass** for as long as is needed and also on **Wednesday evenings from 7:00 to 8:30 pm**. Extra Reconciliation times are offered during Lent and Advent. Please see the weekly bulletin for extended times that Father Tom will make himself available for the Sacrament. Individuals may also call the Parish Office at any time to arrange for a personal appointment to celebrate the sacrament.

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

The Sacrament of the Anointing the Sick has as its end the conferral of a special grace on people experiencing a grave illness or old age. The Church exhorts the Christian who is ill to unite with the Passion and Death of Christ. **[CCC: 1511, 1499, 151]**

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may be received by any Catholic who is facing a serious illness or is of advanced years. Individuals who are planning to enter the hospital are particularly encouraged to receive the Sacrament before their admission by calling the Parish Office to arrange for an appointment with the priest. The parish priest, deacons, pastoral staff members and volunteers will visit those who are in the hospital, nursing home, or confined to their own home. **Please notify the Parish Office at 636-398-5270** whenever someone enters the hospital or desires a pastoral visit. Four times during the year the parish offers a Communal Anointing of the Sick following the weekend Masses.

Sacrament of Matrimony

The Sacrament of Matrimony signifies the union of Christ and the Church. It gives spouses the grace to love each other with the love with which Christ has loved His Church. The grace of the Sacrament perfects the human love of the spouses, strengthens their indissoluble unity, and sanctifies them on the way to eternal life. [CCC 1661]

To celebrate the Sacrament of Matrimony, couples must contact Fr. Tom or one of our deacons at least six months prior to the wedding date for proper assistance.

One of our helpful Wedding Coordinators will be assigned to you to assist in making your special day run as smoothly as possible. Our Wedding Coordinators are Kelly Meyer and Pat Gentry.

Sacrament of Holy Orders

Through the Sacrament of Holy Orders, the mission entrusted by Christ to his apostles continues to be exercised in the Church until the end of time; thus it is the sacrament of apostolic ministry. (It includes Bishops, Priests and Deacons). [CCC 1536]

For additional information on the Sacrament of Holy Orders, or for consecrated religious life for either men or women, **please contact Fr. Tom or call the Vocation Office of the Archdiocese of St. Louis at 314-792-6461. Deacon Chris Ast** of the parish is Director of the Permanent Diaconate, responsible for the overall formation of the men who will be ordained deacons for the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Prayer and Devotion

“What is needed is a Christian life distinguished above all in the art of prayer. Inasmuch as contemporary culture, even amid so many indications to the contrary, has witnessed the flowering of a new call for spirituality, due also to the influence of other religions, it is more urgent than ever that our Christian communities should become ‘genuine schools of prayer’.” (JP II, Letter on the Rosary, 42.)

Eucharistic Adoration

Join members of the parish as they respond to the Lord’s question, “Could you not watch with me one hour?” (Mt 26:40) by spending an hour each week before the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament in the St. Joseph Chapel. Currently, members are united in this prayer around the clock, Monday through Friday, what we jovially call “the largest prayer group in the area.” **Contact Shawn Mueller in the Parish Office at 636-398-5270**, if you feel the call to take an hour or be on a substitute list. Keep an eye out in the bulletin for requested hours.

“The Church and the world have great need of Eucharistic adoration. Jesus waits for us in this sacrament of love. Let us be generous with our time in going to meet Him in adoration and contemplation full of faith. And let us be ready to make reparation for the great faults and crimes of the world. May our adoration never cease.”--Pope John Paul II Dominicae Cenae.

The Chaplet of Divine Mercy (Friday)

The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is a prayer devotion made popular by the apparitions of our Lord to St. Faustina in the 1930s. **Our parish Eucharistic Exposition typically ends on Friday at 11:30 am with the sung Chaplet of Divine Mercy followed by Benediction.**

The Prayer of the Rosary

A part of the Rosary (5 mysteries) is prayed Monday-Friday after the 8:00 am Mass in the St. Joseph Chapel. The Joyful Mysteries are prayed after the morning Mass on the first Saturdays of the month (at the request of our Blessed Mother to the children at Fatima), as well as prior to the 4pm Mass on Saturday evenings. All are invited to join others in prayer at these times.

“The Rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer... With the Rosary, the Christian people sits at the school of Mary and is led to contemplate the beauty on the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love. Through the Rosary the faithful receive abundant grace, as though from the very hands of the Mother of the Redeemer.” (JP II, Letter on the Rosary.)

Stations of the Cross

Praying the Stations of the Cross—alone or with a group—while traditionally a Lenten practice, is also recommended as a fitting devotion in the spiritual life. Devotional books are available to pray the Stations as you walk to their depictions throughout the Church. As a private devotion, the Stations can be personally prayed at any time.

Prayer Chain

Our parish has a very active Prayer Chain. Requests for prayers are passed on via phone calls or email to the many Prayer Warriors in our parish who then pray for each specific request. If you also wish for the prayer request to be public, you can ask that the name be included in the Prayer List in the bulletin so that others can pray for you as well. **Requests for prayers can be made by contacting Rita Langford at ritalangford4@gmail.com or 636-399-6083.** Rita sends all requests down the chain to all participating Prayer Warriors. If you would like to participate in this Spiritual Work of Mercy, contact Rita, and she will see that you are included on the Prayer Warrior list.

Prayer Intercession/Jonah Team

Legion of Mary

The Legion of Mary is the largest lay apostolic organization with over three million members worldwide. We pray and perform Works of Mercy under the banner of Mary. With Father Tom as our spiritual director, some of the Works of Mercy we do are visiting shut-ins, senior homes and hospitals to pray and bring Holy Communion. We encourage and teach the prayer of the Rosary. We also evangelize in many different ways to encourage those that have been away from the Church and those that don't go to church. We meet in Weber Hall every Tuesday morning at 9:00 am. We also have a group that meets at St. Gianna every Tuesday evening at 6:45 pm.

Conferences/Recollections/Retreats

Men and women of the parish are encouraged to participate in spiritual renewal opportunities throughout the year as provided by various conferences, days of recollection and retreat centers, such as the White House Retreats or the ACTS retreats. The bulletin publicizes evenings of recollection, day and weekend retreats and upcoming conferences as they become available. Watch the bulletin, or call the Parish Office for upcoming information or a handbook of opportunities.

Stewardship

This Parish was established in 1945 through the commitment of time, talent, and treasure of our founding families. The Parish continues with that same vision even now as we number approximately 900 registered families. Stewardship is more important than ever before. Financial support of the parish is made through donations using envelopes or by electronic payments.

Principle of Stewardship: Parishioners of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church are asked through Prayer, Participation, and Generosity to share their time, talent, and treasure because of their baptism into the Catholic faith, and their most basic call to Christianity.

1. Everything we have is given to us by God. Regarding financial stewardship, we ask parishioners to prayerfully consider giving financially to the parish as they have been given in their lives. A practical goal has been suggested as 5-7% to one's parish and 3-5% to other charitable causes. Regardless, there should be no minimum or maximum set amount when it comes to generosity. Conversion of heart can be both irritated and tested when it comes to money matters. Paul's advice still presents to us the challenge, 2 Corinthians 9:6-8

The point is this: he who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must do as he has made up his mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that you may always have enough of everything and may provide in abundance for every good work."

Our Parish Budget relies on your support. The budget is formed by the Finance Committee by carrying out the Mission Statement of our Parish and our Archdiocese.

2. The Lord has graced us with time and talents to share with others. There are many ministries in which we may share, ministries outside the Parish as well as those within the Parish. We have many ministries in which our talents are very much wanted and needed. Parish History

On June 24, 1945, in the presence of twenty-five people, ground was broken by Father William Pezold, the Pastor of Saint Joseph Parish in Cottleville. The cornerstone, of what is now called St. Joseph Chapel, was placed on August 26, 1945, by Monsignor (later Bishop) Leo Steck, with the Most Reverend John J. Glennon, Archbishop of St. Louis, presiding. It was Archbishop Glennon who designated the parish to be named “Immaculate Heart of Mary,” the first parish in the Archdiocese with that title.

Fr. Pezold’s care of the parish extended from 1945-1956. On April 5, 1956, the mission was raised to the status of a full parish, and a rectory was built for a resident priest. Father Arthur Bromschwig was appointed as administrator, while also serving at Duchesne High School in St. Charles. Father Bromschwig later supervised the construction of the new St. Dominic High School in O’Fallon, while still serving as Administrator of this parish.

Pastors that succeeded Father Bromschwig (pastor here at IHM from 1956-1966) have been Fr. James Komaska (1966-1979), Father Charles Burgoon (1979-1982), Father Wenceslaus Klaric (1983-1992), Father Joseph A. Weber (1992-2001) and Fr. Richard Stoltz (2001-2011). On December 16, 2001, having outgrown the “little Church” (Mass now being offered each Sunday in the infamously named “Chall”), ground was broken for a new church to be built. Building upon the planning and vision of Father Joe Weber, the new Church was completed through the leadership and fine touch of Father Stoltz. Archbishop Justin Rigali dedicated the building on May 4, 2003.

On February 22, 2009, the Dedication of The Grand Hall (Church’s lower level) took place. This was a special celebration, not only because the final phase of the Church building was completed, but because so many of the parishioners had contributed their time and talent, in addition to their treasure. Our Grand Hall has since been renamed Stoltz Grand Hall in recognition of the work of Fr. Stoltz throughout the whole construction process. In 2009 Fr. Stoltz renamed the old original hall “Founders Hall”, in honor of the founding parishioners of Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish.

A meeting room within the new Church was dedicated as “Weber Hall” in honor of Father Joe Weber.

In January of 2012, Fr. Tom Miller was appointed as the pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary. Under his pastoral guidance the parish embarked on a capital campaign to finally pay off the parish loan. It was a great success, not only in the pledges received, but also in the early payoff of our loan, making us debt-free after 20 years! We are now building a fund in anticipation of a new Parish Center which would be used for PSR classrooms and parish dinners. Eventually we will have a survey of the faithful to determine desire and support.

Echoing Daniel Webster’s quote, “History is God’s providence in human affairs,” we are grateful to God’s providential care in our history here at Immaculate Heart of Mary parish, and we entrust ourselves to that same care for our present and future.
