

# Corporal Work of Mercy: Clothe the Naked IHM Blanket and Coat Drive





We have been (and will be) highlighting various works of mercy in the bulletin in light of Pope Francis' call for this Year

of Mercy. Last week we highlighted the Work of Mercy "Clothe the Naked" and gave a few suggestions for people to consider. A couple from the parish took the suggestion to heart and would like to extend an opportunity to make this work of mercy simple for folks at IHM.

The Plan: A Blanket and Coat Drive. Simply bring a new or (clean used) blanket or coat that we can give to someone in need. There is a drop off bin by the coat rack (left side of narthex by Weber Hall). You can drop off blankets or coats anytime from now until January 31. These items will then be taken to a local organization to be distributed to those in need.

- **1. b)** Saint John Vianney (1786-1859), also known as the Curé of Ars, emphasized the benefits of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, often hearing confessions for hours on end.
- **2. a)** These words form the refrain of the song "To Jesus Christ, Our Sovereign King" a song of praise based on a traditional Latin chant.
- **3. d)** The Baptism of the Lord is traditionally seen as one part of a three-part "epiphany" of Jesus: the coming of the magi, the Baptism of Jesus, and the wedding at Cana.
- **4. b)** This line is from the Hail, Holy Queen (Salve Regina) prayer and is also recited as part of the Angelus, a prayer traditionally prayed three times a day (6:00 a.m., noon, 6:00 p.m.), that recalls the Annunciation.
- **5. c)** Perjury, or lying under oath, is a transgression against the Eighth Commandment: You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- **6. d)** Marriage and Holy Orders are known as the Sacraments at the Service of Communion because they serve to build up the Body of Christ.
- **7. c)** Concupiscence, referring to our tendency to sin, comes from the Latin word concupiscere, which means "to desire ardently!"
- **8. c)** The Church celebrates the feast of St. Thomas Aquinas on January 28

In the early church, the lay disciples of Jesus, empowered by the Holy Spirit, used the prayer gesture of the laying on of hands with intercession in His name. Christ promised then, as



He does today, that when 2 or 3 are gathered in His name, He is in our midst, and when 2 or more agree in their prayer, He will answer (Matt. 18:19).

For the past 15 years, the Jonah Teams have been inviting IHM parishioners to come to Jesus in a very personal way through the gift of healing prayer. We have been trained to pray briefly, confidentially, and without judgment (after a designated Mass) for anyone in need of prayer, and that's everybody! Broken hearts, damaged relationships, diseased bodies, anxiety, financial problems—no problem is too big or too small to take to Jesus! We are here with this ministry to pray with confident expectation, and strive to do so in an atmosphere of love and openness to the Holy Spirit, to encourage and tend lovingly to people who present themselves for prayer.

The Jonah Teams are presently available the first week-end of the month after the 4:00 p.m. and 9:30 a.m. Masses in the Eucharistic Chapel. Our future goal is to have enough ministers trained that we can be available at all Masses. We are also available, upon special request, to meet with you for prayer at the parish or in your homes or hospital.

January 30 and 31, after all Masses, members of our Jonah Teams will be available in the Narthex with hand-out information. We will personally share with you anything you would like to know about this ministry, whether it's wanting to know more about coming to us for prayer, or if you want help discerning if the Holy Spirit is calling you to be a Jonah Team member.

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As Roman Catholics, our marriage practices have their pedigree in ancient Rome. One of the major players in shaping our practices was the warfare involved in building an empire. Soldiers vanished and sometimes never returned. Women began to manage their lives and to make decisions. The old family values were replaced by patriotic ones, and religion was more attuned to the gore and glory of battle, a religion of the state, not of the family. Weddings were still family celebrations, but had a public face. The bride wore a white toga and a red veil and walked to her new home. There, she and her husband joined their right hands and gave consent to each other, not relying on her father to give consent for her. Religion was optional: a pagan priest might be invited or not, and even without the ceremony, society agreed by common law that a year of living together equaled marriage consent. By the same token, marriage by consent also meant divorce was on the same legal footing, and did not require the courts or civil declarations. This is the world-view the first Christians inherited, and it was up to them to determine what was good and to hold marriage up to the light of the gospel.
