

Jesus' rejection by the people of his hometown previews what will take place often in the days ahead: people will reject Jesus-even violently. Today, people still reject Jesus and his teaching. When asked why he didn't follow Jesus, a high school boy said bluntly, "Because if I did, many of my friends would reject me- just as many of Jesus' friends rejected him. And I couldn't take that kind of rejection right now." How much has peer pressure influenced my following of Jesus in the past? How much is it influencing it right now?

PILGRIMAGE In the Jubilee Year, the

experience of pilgrimage becomes a tangible sign of the choice of an individual to journey toward Christ, through sacrifice, penance, and prayer. In the course of the Jubilee Year, the faithful are invited to make prayerful pilgrimages to one or more local churches that have been designated by Archbishop Robert Carlson. Your pilgrimage visits should include: Participation in Holy Mass or another liturgical service such as Morning or Evening Prayer or acts of piety such as the Stations of the Cross, praying the Rosary, or visits to the Blessed Sacrament - Spending time in prayerful meditation - Concluding your visit with prayer for the Holy Father: the Our Father, the Apostles' Creed or the Profession of Faith from Mass, and a prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary - One Plenary Indulgence may be gained daily by visiting designated pilgrimage sites.

THE HOLY DOOR

One of the traditions for a Jubilee Year is the ceremonial opening of the Holy Door in each of the four great basilicas in Rome. The opening, passing through, and sealing of the Holy Door at the end of the Jubilee Year have become significant elements in the Church's Jubilee Year celebrations. Most Catholics will be unable to make a pilgrimage to Rome during this Jubilee

Year; however, you can make a pilgrimage at the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Louis or at another local pilgrimage site. The Holy Doors of pilgrimage sites are significant because they're the signs and instruments of real things unseen -- the graces of the Jubilee Year, said Ed Hogan, director of the pontifical Paul VI Institute and associate professor of systematic theology at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. Normally, a door would represent Christ. In the Gospel of John, Jesus said, "I am the gate (the door). Whoever enters through me will be safe" (John 10:9). But Hogan stressed that in this case, the sealed doors aren't symbolic of Christ. "After all, we would never seal shut the door to salvation," Hogan said. Rather, the sealed doors represent the graces of the plenary indulgence associated with the Year of Mercy. (See below) "These graces are not available at every time, in every place, in the same way," Hogan said. "These specific graces, like the door, (unsealed) are only open during a Jubilee Year."

JUBILEE INDULGENCE

What are the "Prescribed Conditions" for Receiving an Indulgence?

In addition to the acts of charity, penance, and pilgrimage that are particular to the Jubilee Indulgence, the Church prescribes three "usual" conditions: • Sacramental Confession • Reception of Holy Communion • Prayer for the Pope's intentions.

The Jubilee Indulgence is a plenary indulgence. The plenary indulgence can be applied once a day in suffrage for one's self or for the souls of the deceased. The Church's usual conditions for gaining an indulgence apply in connection with the Jubilee Indulgence.

1. b) Joel 2:12-18. In the fifth century B.C., the prophet Joel called the people of Judah to repent with fasting and weeping, seeking deliverance from a terrible invasion of locusts that threatened their very existence.

2. c) The omission of the Gloria and the Alleluia during Lent drew our focus to the penitential nature of the season and deepen our desire and longing for the celebration of Easter.

4. c) Saint Athanasius, Bishop of Alexandria and Doctor of the Church, is credited with arguing effectively against the Arian heresy at the First Council of Nicaea in 325. His feast day is May 2.

5. d) Junipero Serra was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1988.

6. b) Saint Damien of Molokai, who was a priest of the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, is best

known for his compassionate ministry to people suffering from leprosy (Hansen's disease) on the island of Molokai in the nineteenth century.

7. d) Numbers 787-798 in the Catechism provide images that help us better understand the Church. Jesus uses the image of the Sower and the Seed to describe the Word of God (Matthew 13:3-23).

8. b) The Sacraments of Penance/Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick are referred to as Sacraments of Healing in the Catechism (n. 1421).

9. a) In referring to the Eucharist as the "heart and summit of the Church's life" the Catechism is reminding us that the Eucharist is the most perfect way that we encounter Christ himself.

10. d) Matthew 4:2 and Luke 4:2 tell us that Jesus fasted (ate nothing) during his 40 days in the desert. In the Bible, the
