

THE APPROACHING SEASON OF LENT

Dear Parishioners,

As we approach the Holy Season of Lent I would like to share with you the various opportunities for personal growth that are available. We are all striving for personal growth and maturation as disciples of Jesus Christ. Much of that happens in the realm of our spiritual pursuits, but is not limited to that. Personal growth embraces every aspect of our being, but is fueled and focused by an awareness of the primacy of the spiritual in our lives. Here are some of the varied opportunities that Lent affords us.

- Sacrament of Reconciliation: I will be offering the Sacrament of Reconciliation Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday throughout the Lenten season from 7:00 PM until 9:00 PM. If it's been a while, please know that I am happy to walk you through the Sacrament. It is not an easy Sacrament to celebrate for many, but it is the most humbling one for me to celebrate as a priest. Many are tempted to think that I see people only at their worst when they come to the Sacrament, but the opposite is true. I see you at your best as you seek God's mercy. His mercy far surpasses any of our sins, and His healing is greater than any of our wounds.
- Daily Mass: Prepare your hearts for the Risen Christ by celebrating the mystery of His Passion, Death and Resurrection with our daily Mass community. One of the best fruits of daily Mass is the deepening awareness of Our Lord's humble gift of Himself to each of us. God call us to communion through Him, with Him and in Him. Jesus is our path to communion with Our Father, the Holy Spirit and our neighbors.
- **Eucharistic Adoration:** Monday morning through Friday at noon Our Lord is adored in our chapel. This is not something limited to Lent. However, Lent is a good time to consider praying in our chapel once a week for a hour before His mysterious presence. While we can find Our Lord in a variety of ways because He is so present and available to us, the Eucharist is the only Sacrament where He abides with us. Every Sacrament is an encounter with Our Risen Lord, but in the Blessed Sacrament He is present to us in a way that surpasses all the rest. The combination to our chapel door is **145**.
- Stations of the Cross: Every Friday during Lent we will have Stations of the Cross in our chapel at 7:00 PM. This wonderful devotion given to us by God through the love of St. Francis of Assisi invites us to reflect on the Passion and Death of Jesus. We are called to walk with Jesus and witness His life offered up for our Redemption. On Good Friday the Stations will be in church and in the afternoon.
- Rediscover Jesus: During Christmas we provided copies of this book for interested readers. If by chance
 you did not have the opportunity to pick up a copy, please call the office or contact me through e-mail,
 askpadre@aol.com and we will try our best to get you a copy for Lent.

One note of caution- better to pick one thing to do well than to try and undertake too many things that are then done poorly. The Lord is not looking for us to become spiritual busy-bodies during Lent, but to develop hearts that are more attentive and responsive to His grace. There are so many opportunities. Pray and discern well as we enter into this season of grace.

The Jubilee Year of Mercy

PILGRIMAGE

In the Jubilee Year, the experience of pilgrimage becomes a tangible sign of the choice of an individual to



journey toward Christ, through sacrifice, penance, and prayer. In the course of the Jubilee Year, the faithful are invited to make prayerful pilgrimages to one or more local churches that have been designated by Archbishop Robert Carlson. Your pilgrimage visits should include: Participation in Holy Mass or another liturgical service such as Morning or Evening Prayer or acts of piety such as the Stations of the Cross, praying the Rosary, or visits to the Blessed Sacrament - Spending time in prayerful meditation - Concluding your visit with prayer for the Holy Father: the Our Father, the Apostles' Creed or the Profession of Faith from Mass, and a prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary - One Plenary Indulgence may be gained daily by visiting designated pilgrimage sites.

THE HOLY

Cathedral Basilica of Saint Louis One of the traditions for a Jubilee Year is the ceremonial opening of the Holy Door in each of the four great basilicas in Rome. The opening, passing through, and

sealing of the Holy Door at the end of the Jubilee Year have become significant elements in the Church's Jubilee Year celebrations. Most Catholics will be unable to make a pilgrimage to Rome during this Jubilee Year; however, you can make a pilgrimage at the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Louis or at another local pilgrimage site. The Holy Doors of pilgrimage sites are significant because they're the signs and instruments of real things unseen -- the graces of the Jubilee Year, said Ed Hogan, director of the pontifical Paul VI Institute and associate professor of systematic theology at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. Normally, a door would represent Christ. In the Gospel of John, Jesus said, "I am the gate (the door). Whoever enters through me will be safe" (John 10:9). But Hogan stressed that in this case, the sealed doors aren't symbolic of Christ. "After all, we would never seal shut the door to salvation," Hogan said. Rather, the sealed doors represent the graces of the plenary indulgence associated with the Year of Mercy. (See below) "These graces are not available at every time, in every place, in the same way," Hogan said. "These specific graces, like the door, (unsealed) are only open during a Jubilee Year."

JUBILEE INDULGENCE

What are the "Prescribed Conditions" for Receiving an Indulgence?

In addition to the acts of charity, penance, and pilgrimage that are particular to the Jubilee Indulgence, the Church prescribes three "usual" conditions: • Sacramental Confession •

Reception of Holy Communion • Prayer for the Pope's intentions. The Jubilee Indulgence is a plenary indulgence. The plenary indulgence can be applied once a day in suffrage for one's self or for the souls of the deceased. The Church's usual conditions for gaining an indulgence apply in connection with the Jubilee Indulgence.





- **4. b)** Although violet often is associated with wealth, power, and royalty, during Lent this color invites Catholics into a deeper consideration of our sins and the price Jesus paid on the cross to save us.
- **5. False**. Although tradition holds that Mary visited the various sites of the passion, the practice of the Stations as we know it today developed over centuries to accommodate Catholics who could not visit the Holy Land. The popes in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries encouraged this devotion by attaching an indulgence to it and directing the local pastors to erect stations within their churches.
- **6. c)** All the Gospels identify Judas as Jesus' betrayer, but only Matthew 27:3-8 and Acts 1:16-19 mention the death of Judas.
- **7. b)** Because Christ's passion, death, and Resurrection are so closely linked, some parishes and devotional booklets include a Fifteenth Station reflecting on Christ's rising from the dead.
- **8. a)** The confusion over the meaning of the Anglo Saxon word lencten—which literally means "spring"—results from the fact that in both Greek (tessarakoste) and Latin (quadragesima), the word for Lent means "fortieth" and "forty days" respectively.
- **9. d)** "Christian prayer loves to follow the way of the cross in the Savior's steps. The stations from the Praetorium to Golgotha and the tomb trace the way of Jesus, who by his holy Cross has redeemed the world" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2669, emphasis in original).
- **10.** a) The Triduum begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday and ends with vespers on Easter Sunday. The celebrations of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil are the most solemn of the liturgical year.

THREE PILLARS OF LENT: PRAYER, FASTING AND ALMSGIVING

- Prayer: please read Fr. Tom's column in today's bulletin. Mass is offered on weekdays at 8:00 am in the chapel. On weekends Mass takes place in the church at 4:00 pm Saturday afternoon and on Sunday morning at 7:30, 9:30 and 11:15. Saturday morning Mass is at 8:00 in the church. Opportunities for retreats and other prayer experiences abound, and private prayer may be as simple as picking up a rosary or visiting the adoration chapel.
- Fasting: all are expected to reduce their intake of food on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by eating 2 small meals and one larger one, with nothing in between. Liquids are permissible. This applies to all between the ages of 18-59. No one may excuse themselves lightly in this regard except in cases of ill health. Abstinance: all are expected to refrain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and all Lenten Fridays. This applies to everyone over the age of 14.
- ◆ Almsgiving: Again there are many opportunities to share. The St. Vincent DePaul Society has a box in the narthex by Weber Hall for donated nonperishable food items. Often we are encouraged to donate for a second collection, by envelope or online. Our Lady's Inn in Defiance and Mary, Queen of Angels in O'Fallon always need money to continue their ministries to pregnant women and their children. One particular Lenten tradition is the Rice Bowl, sponsored by Catholic Relief Services.
