
INFORMED ~ HOSPITABLE ~ MOTIVATED

POPE FRANCIS RELEASES APOSTOLIC EXHORTATION FOR FAMILIES

Amoris laetitia (Latin for The Joy of Love) is the post- (Synod on the Family) apostolic exhortation by Pope Francis. Dated 19 March 2016 (Feast of St. Joseph), it was released on 8 April 2016. It is a rather large document; the English text runs to about 250 small-format pages with almost 400 footnotes. Pope Francis himself states early in the document that it is not to be a "rushed reading." There have been many commentaries on the document, some positive, some cautious. All are encouraged to read the document itself, but for some initial good insights, check out Fr. Robert Barron's commentary.

Here are some random quotes to stir some interest:

123. After the love that unites us to God, conjugal (marital) love is the "greatest form of friendship". It is a union possessing all the traits of a good friendship: concern for the good of the other, reciprocity, intimacy, warmth, stability and the resemblance born of a shared life. Marriage joins to all this an indissoluble exclusivity expressed in the stable commitment to share and shape together the whole of life.

126. In marriage, the joy of love needs to be cultivated. When the search for pleasure becomes obsessive, it holds us in thrall and keeps us from experiencing other satisfactions. Joy, on the other hand, increases our pleasure and helps us find fulfilment in any number of things, even at those times of life when physical pleasure has ebbed.

135. It is not helpful to dream of an idyllic and perfect love needing no stimulus to grow. A celestial notion of earthly love forgets that the best is yet to come, that fine wine matures with age. As the Bishops of Chile have pointed out, "the perfect families proposed by deceptive consumerist propaganda do not exist. In those families, no one grows old, there is no sickness, sorrow or death... Consumerist propaganda presents a fantasy that has nothing to do with the reality which must daily be faced by the heads of families." It is much healthier to be realistic about our limits, defects and imperfections, and to respond to the call to grow together, to bring love to maturity and to strengthen the union, come what may.

"I GIVE YOU A NEW COMMANDMENT"

Last week, the Good Shepherd declared, "My sheep hear my voice." This week, we hear Jesus loud and clear: "I give you a new commandment: love one another." In case we wonder, "What's new about that?" Jesus specifies exactly what he means. "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." Jesus loved us more than himself! Paul explained, "Jesus emptied himself, taking the form of a slave; humbled himself, obedient even to death on a cross." Nearly seventeen hundred years ago, Saint Cyril of Alexandria preached: "To love as Jesus loved us? That really is something new: for our love to go that far! Nothing can come before the love we have for our brothers and sisters. No possessions. Not our reputations. Not even our lives! For our neighbors' salvation, we should be ready to die, as Jesus' first disciples did!"

"BEHOLD. I MAKE ALL THINGS NEW"

Two of those disciples, Paul and Barnabas, describe their trials as something we should all be ready for: "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." But that suffering pales compared to the success they never expected: God "opened the door of faith to the Gentiles." Their do-and-dare zeal dares us to make their story ours. True, Revelation's "new heaven and new earth," with "no more death or mourning, wailing or pain," isn't something we can accomplish. But "Behold, I make all things new," says Jesus—present tense. For Jesus can indeed work in us and through us to begin conquering human malice with gospel goodness. So Jesus calls us, Pope Francis says, to put a smile on our faces as we reach out to embrace all who live a marginalized existence, call each of them by name, care for the frailties of the weakest, and support first tottering steps on shaky knees, certain that whatever we do for the very least of our brothers and sisters, we are doing for Jesus himself.

LIVE THE GREAT COMMANDMENT In today's Gospel reading, Jesus challenges his followers, "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." (John 13:34) This great commandment of love lies at the heart of our Catholic faith. Each of us is called to love others—especially those in need—as God loves us. The ACA is an important way to witness the love of God to others in our community. Through the many ministries, agencies and apostolates supported by the Appeal, we reach out to those in need, extending the love and mercy of Jesus to the least among us. During this Easter season, prayerfully consider making a gift to the Annual Catholic Appeal. Your gift will ensure that others receive Christ's healing love so that "all will know that you are my disciples" (John 13:35).


