



MEDITATION ON TODAY'S GOSPEL

THE UPPER ROOM AND THE WORLD

Blessed Pentecost and Happy Easter one final time!

Our Easter Season comes to a conclusion this Sunday with the Solemn Feast of Pentecost. Today we celebrate the hidden force at work in the lives of holy men and women. Today the Holy Spirit reveals His presence to the Blessed Mother, Apostles and all those gathered in the Upper Room. Hard to believe such foundational things happened in one room — the Last Supper, the Resurrection appearances and finally the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. In this one simple room the work of the Kingdom is passed from Jesus to the Church with the Holy Spirit being the animating agent and the bond of communion between Jesus and each of us.

The Upper Room is a place of prayer, formation and mission but it is not a place to stop and stay. Those filled with the Holy Spirit pour forth from the Upper Room with the astounding news that we all too glibly call the Gospel. Jesus patiently prepared His Apostles and Disciples for this moment. While they often seemed obdurate and a tad dense to Jesus' teaching and preaching, the Apostles are supercharged by the Holy Spirit. They go out to all the world to proclaim the Good News of our faith: Jesus is Lord and He has conquered sin and death by the power of His Cross and Resurrection.

Much like the Upper Room our parish is meant to be a community that is a place of prayer, formation and mission. We come together at Eucharist to be taught by the Gospel and fed by the Risen Lord with His own Body & Blood. However, the main work of our parish is not centered upon ourselves, but to prepare us for our mission in the world. All of us share in the evangelistic mission of the Church. While certain groups may focus on particular concrete elements of evangelization, every baptized member is called to share their faith in one way or another.

We are blessed by the vision of our Archbishop and challenged to make this year one of deepening prayer. Only in prayer will the events remembered from the Upper Room become something more than an historical reality. Prayer is the doorway through which we experience by the power of grace those events as living and real to each one of us. Only in prayer is the person of Jesus able to become our Living Lord, our Divine Savior, and our Surest Friend. Seek Him anew each day so that His peace and joy will lead you to life in the Spirit.

We ended our regular 2014-2015 IHM school religion program on May 7 with a May crowning followed by an ice cream social. On Thursday, May 14 Archbishop Robert Carlson crowned the year by coming to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation for our 8th grade students. We give thanks for the joys and trials that hopefully have helped us to become better disciples. Student registrations for the 2015-2016 year will be sent out in June.



Top Ten List: Fr. Tom gave a homily in which he listed the "top ten" spiritual priorities that all of us are called to prayerfully put in place. This week we look at # 2.

1. Go to Mass every Sunday & Holy Day of Obligation 2. Make more frequent Confessions, at least quarterly. 3. Pray with Sacred Scripture as part of your daily activities. 4. Develop a daily habit of examining your conscience. 5. Pray the Rosary weekly if not daily. 6. Be generous with your blessings through charities and tithing. 7. Give of your time to the faith on the parish level or within the local Catholic community. 8. Continue to form yourself in learning as a disciple of Christ. 9. Examine your conversations. Are we criticizing or complaining more than we are praying? 10. Go to Mass more than once a week and find time to pray before the Blessed Sacrament.

2. Make more frequent Confessions, at least quarterly

Archbishop Robert Carlson once wrote that every 3,000 miles or so, we change the oil in our car. There may not be any major problem with our engine. But slowly, over time, minor impurities have been building up. If we leave those impurities unattended, they will eventually result in major (and costly) problems for our car. The sacrament of

penance is like an oil change for the soul. And one more analogy: brushing your teeth. If you forget to brush your teeth tonight, it's no big deal. If you forget to brush your teeth tomorrow morning, it's no big deal. If you forget to brush your teeth for three months – or 10 or 15 years – there are going to be big problems!

 You will grow in sincerity, humility and self-knowledge.

 Hoping to convert on your deathbed? Not likely. Most likely, you will die as you lived.
 It is itself a serious sin to go to Communion if you have serious sin on your soul and have not asked for forgiveness in confession.
 Don't be scared to death of confession. Be scared of death without confession. And remember: If it's been a while, the priest will help you. Regarding any embarrassment of sin, you're not going to tell the priest anything he hasn't already heard. Some question that since God knows everything we do already, then how come we have to go to confession? This is like asking why we need to go to a doctor if we are bleeding from a gunshot wound.



Capital Campaign Annual Report

(June 2014—May 2015)

A year ago on Pentecost Sunday, June 8, 2014, our parish celebrated the end of the "active phase" of our current capital campaign, *Many Gifts, One Heart*, which began in November of 2013. We are now at the end of the first year of the "collection phase" of the campaign, and we thought it fitting to roll out a report on Pentecost Sunday 2015 to let our parishioners know of the success that has been continuing as a result of the immense generosity of our parish.

Reason for the Campaign

At the start of the campaign, our parish had approximately \$750,000 in building debt to retire. This was costing \$132,000 a year, or 1/5 of our annual operating budget at the current rate of payment and interest rates. This debt has hampered our ability as a parish to meet our growing ministry and facility needs.

Goals of the Campaign

Our minimum goal was to raise \$800,000 in pledges to cover the cost of the debt plus the cost to run the campaign with Walsh & Associates. Our challenge goal was \$900,000 in pledges to allow us to have \$100,000 above the debt elimination to establish a maintenance fund and address some critical short-term facility needs as our buildings age. With the elimination of the debt, money currently spent on the debt can be budgeted for larger capital improvement projects such as replacement of Founders Hall and investing in needs that we assessed in our recent surveys.

Where were we a year ago?

At the end of the "active phase" of the campaign, we had not only reached our minimum goal, but had also EXCEEDED the challenge goal! We did this through prayer and generous sacrifice. We currently have approximately \$298,000 to pay off on the original loan. We hope to accomplish this by the end of this campaign which officially ends in two years in June of 2017.

Where are we headed?

As you can see, we anticipate another \$495,419.27 to be collected over the next two years of the campaign. This will obviously cover our remaining debt and leave us with a healthy fund from which we can draw for the needs we originally meant to cover by meeting our challenge goal. We currently have the need to resurface our parking lot, and we are sure to have other unforeseen maintenance items over the coming years. We have ministry needs that we would also like to attend to as well.

What is the reality of collecting over a million dollars, you ask?

Currently, we are now **one-third** of the way through the collection phase of the campaign, but we have collected **over half** of the money needed to cover our goal! We are in really good shape to make it to a million. Walsh & Associates statistically predict that 95% of the pledges will be collected if we follow their method of sending out pledge reminders and doing an annual appeal each year.

This year's annual appeal...

Due to the tremendous success that we had in the active phase and the continued success of the collection phase, we opted not to do an all-out annual appeal. We chose instead to reach out by mail to our new parishioners who had not been included at the time of the active phase in order to inform them and give them an opportunity to join in the success with the rest of the parish.
