Passing the basket and not the buck

Dear Parishioners,

Last week as we began the Advent season we made a change in the procedure of one of the aspects of our worship. Under the recommendation of the Stewardship Committee of the Archdiocese and in discussion with our Finance Committee there was a decision made to try baskets that can be passed within the assembly rather than continuing with the baskets on a pole handled by the ushers. Passing the basket within the assembly is being done on a trial basis. I'd like to give this an honest try for two months. If the general feedback is not favorable I am more than happy to return to our basket on a pole. I do have a number of post change comments to share with you.

First of all I would like to offer you my apologies for not communicating this change before it took place. Overall I think that I do an adequate job communicating such changes; however I think this is one where I dropped the ball. A simple announcement in the bulletin or after Mass that a change was being tried would have better prepared all of you for it. Our ushers received an e-mail about the coming change and a few have offered feedback and raised some valid questions about the procedure.

Feedback and comments are essential in our life as a community. I welcome your comments and thoughts on just about anything in our parish life. The most common concern expressed by a few of our ushers is that the procedure will be difficult because we possess such a large church. There are many gaps in the seating at most of our Masses so it will require individuals to take the basket to someone at the other end of the pew or pass it behind them. Since I don't have to participate in this process it is not easy for me to assess what type of impact it is having on your worship. Over the next month or two I hope you let me know what you think about it.

Not all feedback is offered equally. Some feedback like what I mentioned above is actually helpful and appreciated. It identifies a potential problem and offers a solution. How big of a problem (if one at all) will be assessed over the next two months. I pray you can be patient and give the change an honest try. Some have expressed that they simply don't like it. They are opposed and that is all that matters. Of course one can maintain that type of posture, but all it really communicates to me is personal displeasure. While I have no desire to increase personal displeasure for any of us, I am inclined to wonder how much personal displeasure passing the basket causes? None of us are excited about changes in life unless we are in pain or unhappy. Only under those two circumstances is change desired and welcomed. Otherwise many of us are fans of the status quo. I can appreciate and respect that. I also appreciate and respect the ability to be patient and adaptable.

Any-whose-it, Advent is all about the biggest change in creation —its end. With that end in mind, I realize that my life is incredibly blessed as I await His return. We have the luxury of being concerned about collection procedures when so many others in our world face much more serious issues of life and death.










A "New Year's Plan" beginning in Advent and extending through the "Year of Mercy" The Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy

2015 - November 20, 2016) in which he is directing the faithful to reflect and act on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. He writes, "It is my burning desire that, during this Jubilee, the Christian people may reflect on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. It will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty. And let us enter more deeply into the heart of the Gospel where the poor have a special experience of God's mercy. Jesus introduces us to these works of mercy in his preaching





so that we can know whether or not we are living as his disciples. Let us rediscover these corporal works of mercy: to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger, heal the sick, visit the

imprisoned, and bury the dead. And let us not forget the spiritual works of mercy: to counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners, comfort the afflicted, forgive offences, bear patiently those who do us ill, and pray for the living and the dead."

Throughout this year of mercy, we will be offering reflections and concrete action suggestions to help stir us on in thought and deed to respond to this call. Here are three resources you or your family might consider to start. The first is a great video called "Little Boy" - a heartwarming story in which a priest directs a young boy to follow "the ancient list" of the corporal works of mercy to increase his

faith. The second is a Matthew Kelly book called "Beautiful Mercy" in which various noted authors comment on the works of mercy. The third is a simple booklet found in the pamphlet rack of the narthex called "Works of Mercy." A practical idea for individuals or families to consider would be to (like in the movie Little Boy) to write out a check-list of the works of mercy and seek to cover all of them in a variety of ways throughout this year. The above guides will help get the works rolling.





- **1. b)** European Catholics in the Middle Ages "Christianized" candled wreaths and incorporated them into their Advent preparation for the coming of Christ, the light of the world (John 8:12).
- **2. d)** Unlike the civil calendar year, the Church begins her liturgical calendar at the beginning of Advent.
- **3. d)** On Christmas Eve in 1223, Francis recreated the birth of Christ in a cave with live animals and people. He hoped to inspire Christians to recognize Christ in their midst.
- **4. c)** Matthew 2:1-2 describes how the magi came to Jerusalem after seeing a star in the east that indicated the birth of a great king.
- **5. b)** Churches decorate for Advent with purple altar cloths, vestments, and candles. On Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent, the candle is rose, signifying the joy of Christians awaiting the Messiah.
- **6. a)** The Feast of the Holy Family celebrates Jesus' family and every family. The Church calls the family a "domestic church," the first place of prayer, catechesis, and moral teaching. The family is where the gospel is brought to life. The Feast of the Holy Family is celebrated between Christmas and New Year's Day.
- **7. c)** Gold represented Christ's role as King. Frankincense represented his divine nature, since incense was used to worship God. Myrrh represented his sacrificial death for the sins of humanity, since it is a perfume for embalming the dead.

- **9. b)** Gabriel appears in Luke 1 to announce the births of John the Baptist and Jesus. Tradition suggests that Gabriel also was the one who spoke to Joseph in his dreams (Matthew 1:20; 2:13, 19) and to the shepherds in the field (Luke 2:9-10).

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

By now, trees are beginning to appear in living rooms throughout the parish. To a complete outsider to our culture, it must seem an odd thing indeed. The "roots" of this custom are in liturgical drama: religious plays performed in the churches and town squares of medieval Europe. The favorite theme for this time of year was the "Paradise Play," a dramatic history of the human race from the Garden of Eden to the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. The language and music varied from place to place, but one feature was always in place: a great tree decorated with apples. As a prop, it provided lots of material for the actors: the temptation, shelter for the manger, and a reminder of the wood of the cross. Soon people began to bring "paradise trees" into their homes, decorating them with gifts and lighted candles.

Many Germans give credit to Martin Luther for transforming the "Paradise Tree" into the evergreen Christmas tree. Walking home on a starry Advent night, he was so awed by the beauty of the night that he hauled a pine tree inside and decorated it with lighted candles. Americans were holdouts. It took until 1856 for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to decriminalize Christmas decorations, the old Puritan dislikes falling before the waves of Irish and German immigrants with traditions firmly in hand!—Rev.
